Mere Town Council

In April we held what we think will be our last Zoom meeting. (At the present time, we are waiting to hear from central government on how we should proceed with holding Council meetings but it is thought that there is no wish to extend powers to hold virtual Council meetings).

Our Annual Town Council meeting will be held on **Monday, 17th May** – this is a week later than our normal scheduled Town Council meeting because, in a year of elections of Town Councillors, we are required to hold the Annual meeting of the Town Council within 14 days after the day on which councillors take office.

On the subject of elections, I'm sure I don't need to remind you all that elections will take place on **Thursday 6th May** and our polling station will be in **The Lecture Hall** – the hours of poll will be between 7 am and 10 pm. Mere Town Council has 15 seats and 17 people have been nominated to stand as Town Councillors – it therefore follows that a contested election will take place for Mere Town Council. You will be asked to vote for the Wiltshire Police & Crime Commissioner, your local Wiltshire Councillor and your Town Councillors at the same time. The elections are your opportunity to vote for councillors of your choice who will work on your behalf for the next four years. Please make time to vote.

Wiltshire Councillor ~ George Jeans Writes

Like most, I was saddened to hear of the death of His Royal Highness Prince Philip, The Duke of Edinburgh. The Union flag was lowered to half-mast on all Wiltshire Council buildings as a mark of respect. Wiltshire Council opened an online book of condolence to leave messages and share memories. Wiltshire last had the pleasure of HRH's company at The Orders of St John Care Trust's Haywood Care Centre in Devizes and the opening of the Prince Philip Barracks at REME Lyneham Garrison.

No-one wants to work on Good Friday but after receiving several complaints in regard a Greggs Food sign erected at Willoughby Hedge in a way that was a danger to motorist, I was impressed with their response to West Knoyle Parish Council Chair - Jinny Brockway and my notifying them of the potential dangers. They responded swiftly to remove the sign. Well done Greggs!

The government is proposing law changes to boost ongoing efforts to improve connectivity for people who live, work and travel in rural areas. The reforms will remove one of the biggest barriers to better coverage in the countryside by reducing build time and costs for new infrastructure while protecting rural areas by minimising any visual impact. Under the proposals, mobile companies will be allowed to make new and existing masts up to five metres taller and two metres wider than current rules permit. This will increase the range of masts and allow operators to fit more equipment on them so they can be more easily shared. Wiltshire Council already have invested in intervention to improve broadband serves across the county.

On **6 May**, registered voters will be able to have their say in the Police and Crime Commissioner, unitary, and town and parish council elections To manage the amount of elections, and to keep everyone safe, the verification and counts will be spread over four days. The Unitary results will be declared on the **8th May**. The Town and Parish Councils' on the **9th**. The Police and Crime Commissioner on the **10th**. Wiltshire Council is organising one of the biggest elections in the country. 348 polling stations, over 2200 nominations. At present over 18% of the voters have requested the opportunity to vote by post.

Bus passes in Mere now only apply from 9-30am, this could impact the Salisbury and Gillingham busses. I have asked if this can be addressed.

Chippenham Area Board, Chippenham Borough Lands Charity, Morrisons, and Wiltshire Council are working together to offer a range of support packages for community groups who are looking to re-launch as we work toward the next 'unlock' step on 17th May. These packages are aimed at the voluntary and community sector who run activities such as; coffee mornings, luncheon clubs, nit and natter, book clubs, social support groups, to name a few. I have supported that the same principal be supported by our area board.

Wiltshire Council has successfully bid for more than £4.4m from the Government's Public Sector Decarbonisation Scheme to reduce carbon emissions

by upgrading the heating systems in many of its buildings. Wiltshire Council is currently developing its Climate Strategy and a series of engagement events have been organised during May in support of this process. On **Thursday May 20th 10.00 – 11.30 am** Wiltshire are hosting an event via Microsoft Teams, dedicated to engagement with Town/City/Parish Councils. Wiltshire are asking each council to nominate one representative, potentially the clerk but not limited to this role.

The 3 questions below will be considered:

- 1. What do you feel are the 3 priorities for Wiltshire (not just the council) in becoming carbon neutral by 2030?
- 2. Does the organisation you represent have carbon neutral targets? If so, what are they?
- 3. In what way could you support the council's Climate strategy?

The issue of Dog fouling and the depositing of plastic bags with excrement in public places is high on the agenda of local concerns. I with Mere Town Council are exploring ways of providing more usable bins.

Wiltshire's policy of not allowing application forms to be printed from their web site or in some cases not providing any, for amongst other applications, blue badge applications, tree works in conservation area applications etc., has caused complaint to me. Please note if you phone customer services on 03004560100, should you have no access to IT equipment, they will phone you back for a verbal application.

We have got a couple of pieces of equipment taped off due to worn components but we called in some local play equipment contractors who will be replacing components and repairing the equipment for us. Thanks must go to Paul Yates and Marcus Randall for their work over the winter keeping all of the rest of the equipment and area in good condition. It is now also mowing season and thanks must also go to Rob Pearce for keeping the grass side of it so tidy - thanks Rob.

Since the last meeting we have had a road closure through the centre of the village whilst ash dieback trees were cut down by the playing field. It is very sad to see such lovely old trees cut down but necessary, I'm sure.

I am very lucky because my husband and I have a couple of dogs and we do a lot of walking. The sounds of the birds at the moment are fantastic. With all that this world has been going through in the last year let's hope that there is light at the end of the tunnel now with the vaccinations. I feel we must still be cautious as we certainly do not want a third lockdown but we are certainly heading in the right direction.

Mere Resilience Forum Update

Richard has been formally awarded his British Empire Medal by Lady Sarah Rose Troughton, Lord Lieutenant of Wiltshire, for service to the community. Graciously accepted on behalf of all the volunteers in and around Mere.



Things have been comparatively quiet again this month for our resilience forum volunteers, but many of them have continued to support one or two people they have come to know over the lockdowns. As one volunteer commented, "There is a couple who have, on occasion, forgotten something in their online shop and know that they can rely on me to get them whatever they need when I do my own shop." One has been regularly helping pick up weekly dosette (pill) boxes,

plus helping the Foodbank collect donations from Warminster and delivering to people in need, and is now also kindly going to help out at the Toddler group when available. Other volunteers continue to pick up the occasional prescription, or provide contact with the outside world with a friendly chat – and even a spot of gardening help!

In the last issue of Mere Matters, Blou Fenn from the Patient Participation Group (PPG) wrote an article about the Living Well Scheme at the GP surgery. As a result, one elderly resident got in touch with the surgery, explaining that they were feeling a little isolated and would appreciate some contact. The resident only moved to Mere just before the first lockdown, so hadn't had chance to get to know anyone and was reliant on a family member with a challenging full time job. They are also partially sighted and hard of hearing, and were having hearing aid issues. They were put in touch with the resilience forum, and it was very satisfying to arrange a telephone call from a volunteer within 24 hours. We were able to help them resolve the hearing aid issue, and support them to attend appointments at the GP surgery. All of this was done within a few days of initial contact – something official channels would struggle to beat, if the support was even available.

In a perfect world we'd see this community spirit all the time, so it's fantastic that several volunteers have said they'll continue helping in future. If you are struggling to support someone, or know of someone who could do with assistance, please get in touch and we will do what we can to help.

If you are interested in being involved, even on a very small scale, please do let us know. It won't take over your life, but you could change someone else's.

Wildlife Sightings for March 2021

This article was written in early April. From mid-March onwards we had very cold nights with frosty mornings but the days, although chilly, had been dry and mainly sunny. Ideal weather for getting out walking and seeing our wildlife. However, March is a time when our winter water wildlife, e.g. little egret and kingfisher, go elsewhere to breed. However we were very pleased to receive sightings of the first ducklings and the month's sightings included:

Along Waterside a duck and her ten ducklings were seen daily, from the middle of the month. Unfortunately by the end of the month there were only three ducklings left.

Either one or two mallard drakes were frequently seen near her. She was very protective of her ducklings, often sheltering with them under one of the bridges.

A pair of moorhen were seen twice and seen once were a solitary moorhen, pair of grey wagtails, a slow worm, peacock butterfly, brimstone butterfly and a stoat was seen swimming in the Ashfield stream.

People noted the calls of several birds including chiff chaff, black cap, wren and woodpecker.

Nature Notes

Although early spring can be a quiet time for seeing our wildlife it is a wonderful time for hearing our birds. We would recommend standing in a quiet area, beside one of our streams, and just listen to the birds and see how many different bird songs you can hear. Either early morning or early evening are ideal times for doing this.

During March, as we predicted, the primroses and lesser celandines covered the path edges and roadsides with their different shades of yellow. During April it will be the turn of the wood anemone, bluebell and wild garlic in the woods with the cow parsley's frothy flowers beautifying our road sides.

Next month will be our last article on wildlife sightings. We have been extremely grateful to all of you who have contributed since November 2017 and your information has helped us tremendously with the discussions we have had with Wessex Water and the Environment Agency. We will include in our last article all the wildlife sightings you will have sent us during April and early May. Please send them to mereriverwildlife@btinternet.com

In 1947, the year Mere Amateur Dramatic Society began, we ambitiously launched ourselves with a much-heralded 'Triple Bill'. This included a scene from one of Oscar Wilde's most famous plays. Four years later, in 1951 (70 years ago, almost of the month!), the



company tackled the whole play. It was, of course, 'The Importance of Being Earnest'. Described by the author as 'A Trivial Comedy for Serious People', it was first performed on 14 February 1895 at the <u>St James's Theatre</u> in London. Probably everyone reading this will have seen a production of it, on the stage or as a film. It is a farcical comedy full of sparkling wit and hilarious dialogue, but which is at the same time a satire on the ways of conventional <u>Victorian London society</u>. It marked the high point of Wilde's career and certainly also inaugurated the long life and success of your local theatre company. We are all longing to get back into action!
