# Mere Town Council

At the September meeting of the council, we were pleased to hear from members of the public on the subjects of re-wilding, speed limits and planning. We are happy to hear from the public at meetings, about agenda items. If you are not able to attend but would like to make a comment, do contact the clerk. If you wish to comment on a planning application, be sure to submit your comments to Wiltshire Council as the planning authority but send a copy to the Town Council too.

I am pleased to report that work is due to start on **October 11th** weather permitting, to provide a roadway from Angel Lane into the cemetery. There will inevitably, be some disruption on Angel Lane but we hope to keep this to a minimum.

The council is well aware of the state of the public toilets in the Salisbury Street Car Park. They regularly become blocked which is partly due to a drainage issue and unfortunately, it has been necessary to close the ladies. However, the other toilets have been adapted and remain open for unisex usage. It has become obvious that a long-term solution needs to be found if the toilets are to be fully functional and to meet an acceptable standard.

The Town Council has been asked, by a local resident, to support a request to Wiltshire Council for a review of the 40mph speed limit on Shaftesbury Rd. The Town Council has agreed to submit the request. We have also supported The Bowls Club with their application to the Area Board for a grant to buy some new equipment and carry out some essential repairs.

Wiltshire Council is currently consulting residents, businesses and local groups in the county on their draft Climate Strategy, which will help to shape the next five years of their action on climate change. The consultation is open until **17th October**. At the same time, they are consulting on A Green and Blue Infrastructure (GBI) Strategy called 'Our Natural Environment Plan', looking to mitigate the effects of climate change through nature- based solutions. Mere is well placed, with its rivers and green spaces, to contribute to these strategies and the Town Council will be reviewing Wiltshire's consultation documents.

# Wiltshire Councillor ~ George Jeans Writes

Wiltshire Council are now cutting verges from September. I have received a number of complaints regarding the verges in some areas. Whilst I wish to see wildlife, I consider safety at and other situations iunctions paramount. I have reported junctions as I have noticed problems, in the main they have been cut back. Next season I understand the cutting will be further considered to minimise dangerous situations.

Many of us visit Salisbury. From 17 June-18 July, the council held a public consultation on the proposals to improve the three junctions at Exeter Street Roundabout, Harnham Gyratory and Park Wall Junction. At Exeter Street, the council offered two potential options for people to give their views on. To find out more about the project go to www.wiltshire.gov.uk/highways/salisbu ry-junctions

At the Licensing Committee, it was mentioned that the Government had launched a public consultation on 5th September, regarding making outdoor measures for high streets permanent. In March 2020 the Government introduced a number of temporary permitted development rights under planning legislation in response to the Coronavirus pandemic. Some of these rights were introduced to help support business in reopening and provide flexibility to encourage use of outdoor spaces. This includes marguees being put up in pub grounds, to street markets operating all year round. This new consultation. which runs from 5th September 2021 to 14th November 2021 seeks evidence of the impact of the rights as they currently exist in their temporary form, and views on the future of those rights if they were to be made permanent.

Proposed changes to the schedule of fees and tariffs for Hackney Carriages (Taxi) will take place on 4 January 2022, subject to the proposals being advertised and standard consultation processes.

Following the Wiltshire Local Plan Review consultation (The direction of development planning in plain English), held between 13 January and 9 March, Wiltshire Council have now prepared a full consultation report with the submitted responses, and have also published the statement on the Gypsy and Traveller Plan consultation, which took place at the same time. The timeline for the Wiltshire Local Plan Review is being reviewed to allow for new evidence to be prepared. Wiltshire Council will hold the next stage of consultation as soon as possible next year, once the draft Plan has been completed and approved by Cabinet and Full Council. Wiltshire are still aiming to have the plans in place by end of 2023.

While in Cornwall I noticed a display regarding the environment which is now much in the news. It stated 10% of the electricity used now is for IT and the use of computers should be reduced. It also noted for archive purposes sometimes paper should be used as it used no power and traps carbon. It seems going mainly paperless is not enough, also required is minimising IT use as much as possible and using electricity from wind and solar which goes some way to help towards the high electric needs of IT equipment.

Wiltshire want residents, businesses and local groups to have their say on their Climate Strategy, which will help to shape the next five years of Wiltshire's fight against climate change. The consultation on the draft strategy, which covers seven delivery themes: transport; built environment; waste; green economy; energy generation, storage and distribution: natural environment. food and farming; and carbon neutral council, is open until **23:59 on Sunday 17<sup>th</sup> October**. At the same time, Wiltshire Council are also consulting on their Green and Blue Infrastructure (GBI) Strategy, Wiltshire Council Natural Environment Plan, which looks at the future for Wiltshire's natural environmental assets and how Wiltshire Council can help protect and enhance them for the benefit of people and biodiversity.

I have taken interest in broadband intervention (subsidised) rollout and reported on it to the electorate. Now non-commercial intervention aid in our area has finished, it is down to individuals and commercial forces to provide what fibre broadband is provided, unless the internet service providers provide a universal service likened to the postal service, which might or might not happen. Some areas claim that they cannot get any help from Openreach or BT, these areas look to providers such as we have in our area like Wessex. Kilmington was previously flagged up as a trial area for a universal service in affect, using vouchers, this was discussed at Kilmington Parish Council with residents. This did not come to fruition however Mr Tim Davis approached Openreach, who agreed to provide him with fibre which in turn could benefit others in the area. therefore I would advise individuals to make an approach for fibre broadband.

# Mere Doctors Surgery - Flu Clinics

You will be aware from the National Press there are delays with the delivery of flu vaccinations this year and we have therefore cancelled the clinic for Saturday 9 October. Our first clinic will be Saturday 23 October and we will be holding a further clinic on Saturday 6 November.

# Adult clinics

This year we are inviting adults to book their flu appointment via responding to an SMS text message. If you have your mobile number as preferred method of contact, you will receive a text message over the next couple of weeks from Mere Surgery. By clicking the link provided you will be asked to confirm your date of birth and then you will be able to select from the drop-down menu a date range where you will be able to book into these specific clinics:

> Saturday 23<sup>rd</sup> October Saturday 6<sup>th</sup> November Monday 8<sup>th</sup> November Wednesday 10<sup>th</sup> November Tuesday 23<sup>rd</sup> November Wednesday 24<sup>th</sup> November

If you do not have a registered or preferred mobile number with us, please telephone reception to book your appointment after 20 September 2021. **Eligibility:** 

This year flu vaccinations will be offered under the NHS flu vaccination programme to the following groups:

- People aged 50 years or over (including those becoming age 50 years by 31 March 2022)
- People living in long-stay residential care homes
- Those who are in receipt of a carer's allowance, or who are the main carer of an older or disabled person whose welfare may be at risk if the carer falls ill
- Close contacts of immune-compromised individuals
- All pregnant women (including those women who become pregnant during the flu season
- Those aged from six months to less than 50 years of age, in a clinical risk group such as those with:
  - chronic (long-term) respiratory disease, such as severe asthma, chronic obstructive pulmonary disease (COPD) or bronchitis
  - o chronic heart disease, such as heart failure
  - $\circ$   $\,$  chronic kidney disease at stage three, four or five o chronic liver disease
  - chronic neurological disease, such as Parkinson's disease or motor neurone disease,
  - o learning disability
  - o diabetes
  - splenic dysfunction or asplenia

- a weakened immune system due to disease (such as HIV/AIDS) or treatment (such as cancer treatment)
- morbidly obese (defined as BMI of 40 and above)

Flu clinics will be held in the surgery but we must continue to adhere to social distancing guidelines.

- Patients must have a pre booked appointment
- Please do not attend before designated appointment time as we will not be able to let you into the building no matter what the weather.
- Patients will be instructed to queue outside the surgery as limited numbers are permitted inside the surgery in order to maintain a safe footfall at all times.
- Please would all patients attending the surgery wear a face mask or covering.
- Please wear short sleeves so that it is easy for you to be ready for your vaccination.
- To enable us to comply with social distancing regulations and to manage our delivery of vaccine, we will only be vaccinating patients in the specified clinics.

# Child clinics - 2-3 years

These clinic dates will be set up over the next couple of weeks and again you will either receive SMS text message to book your child's appointment directly or a letter inviting you to contact the surgery to book the appointment.

School age children outside of this age group will be vaccinated in School.

# Mere Surgery Patient Participation Group (PPG) - Care in our Community

I met with Helen Wotton, Care Coordinator with Wiltshire Health & Care and Gail Volney, the Elderly Care Facilitator for Sarum West Primary Care Networks, who works three days a week at the Mere Surgery. They cover a huge area Mere, Tisbury, Hindon, Silton & Sixpenny Handley. Helen also covers Old Orchard Partnership of Wilton, Fovant & Codford. We should applaud them as they both do a great deal of work, particularly for Mere, and are mostly concerned with the very elderly population and people with Alzheimer's and Dementia.

GPs refer their patients to Helen and Gail who liaise with Social Services, Age UK Coordinators and the Fire Brigade and the Wiltshire Centre for Independent Living (who have Health Trainers). They also work with the Bobby Van Trust in Wiltshire over all matters to do with home security both for the over 60s & the over 18s with a registered disability. Gail tends to work with the over 65s but Helen works with 50%/50% elderly and anybody over 18 who might be disabled in some way or have learning difficulties. They both tend to deal with peoples' social aspects and tend to get involved with occupational therapists and physiotherapists.

On the whole, their aim is to prevent hospital admission, support patient's discharges from hospital and support patient's wishes to remain at home or move to a care home.

There is a WhatsApp group for private carers. It might be something as ordinary as providing respite care for somebody in a care home, to give a carer a break. You need to register with the Surgery and to say whom you are caring for.

Helen and Gail look after about 35-40 referrals a month, besides their regular customers, so they are kept very busy.

Our volunteer drivers are available to take you to medical appointments, including Covid vaccinations, and shopping, if resources allow. Once you have an appointment please call 01747 860096 to book a Link driver. Please try to give us 48 hours notice, if possible, as we cannot guarantee to arrange last minute requests. Also, please remember that our co-ordinators work in their own homes so keep calls to 9-5 Monday to Friday and only use the 01747 860096 number. Any other number you have recorded will most likely be a co-ordinator's private number. Please do not use it.

## In Memory - Gerry Cook: 30th November 1939 - 22nd August 2021



If Gerry had his way, this obituary would be in a spreadsheet; as a statistician, he thought they were the greatest invention of the 20th century.

Born in Southampton, Gerry's fondest childhood memories were of his "aunt Hilda with the chip shop" and riding on the running boards of the cars his father bought post-war to run a taxi service.

His early education was at boarding school in Brockenhurst. Excelling at mathematics, he was not so keen on sports and put much effort into avoiding them. Gerry did keenly follow Formula One and rugby union though, and had spreadsheets to track scores through the season.

His working life was spent as a mathematical statistician for the UK government's Meat and Livestock Commission. Living near Milton Keynes, he particularly enjoyed attending club races at Silverstone and attending The Stables live music venue.

When Gerry retired to Mere in 2003, he originally planned to "do nothing", but this soon changed.

With more free time and wanting to become embedded within their new community, Gerry joined the Mere Amateur Dramatic Society, volunteered as a Mere & District Link Scheme driver and created the popular fundraising quizzes for Mere Day Centre. He was also an active member of Mere Historical Society. He gave several talks, prepared in Excel of course, and went on to become membership secretary and later Chairman.

Gerry loved Mere. He said the surrounding countryside had beautiful views and fascinating geology, and he was spoiled for choice with good local food and drink. He particularly enjoyed the sense of community, and the friendly and welcoming locals.

The Chief Interpreter at the Nuremberg Trials of Nazi war criminals, will receive belated, but permanent, recognition as from 1st October 2021. At 2.00 pm that

afternoon a Blue Plaque, conferred by Salisbury Civic Society, recording Frank's achievements and services at 'the greatest trial in history', will be unveiled on the façade of his former Mere home – the Malt House in Castle Street – which is now owned by Chalky and Cathy Chalk.



Exactly 75 years earlier, a world-wide radio audience of 400 million had listened as Wolfe announced to the most prominent leaders of the Third Reich the sentences imposed upon them by the Court – a duty that earned him the sobriquet 'The Voice of Doom'.

Following author Paul Hooley's presentation at Mere Literary Festival of his two books on the life, times and achievements of Frank (copies available from Mere Post Office), it was local resident Wendy Mitchell-Turner who suggested applying for the Blue Plaque – which is the first to have been awarded in Mere.

## Letter from the Churches ~ Christine Marsh writes.

### **October Musings**

Did you know that a word for patience in Arabic is cactus? They both have the same meaning 'to endure thirst'. Having evolved a way of conserving the energy and moisture necessary to maintain life Cacti manage to survive against all odds in the most inhospitable environments. They are an illustration not only of living in harmony with God's world but also of patience, adaptability and perseverance.

I once had the opportunity to visit the Namibian desert. Travelling along a dry dusty valley floor we suddenly came across one lone thorn bush, a Narra plant, the only sign of life in this barren landscape. Due to its bitter taste this prickly plant is not eaten but its fruit, a round melon shaped gourd, when ripe splits and disperses thousands of seeds. These in turn are harvested by small rodents which are then eaten by snakes which in turn are eaten by birds. This plant was in fact providing shelter and sustenance for many.

At this time of year we often hear sung 'We plough the fields and scatter the good seed on the land'. A hymn that acknowledges the bounty of God's gifts to us.

In his teachings Jesus made many references to farming and harvesting as an illustration of the need for us to grow spiritually and in harmony with God's word. We all have the seeds of the Gospel teachings sown within our hearts and minds. Like the cactus we need the patience and perseverance, no matter how difficult our life may become, to nourish and care for these seeds. This has been especially so in these Covid times.

In talking to his disciples Jesus speaks of the harvest being plentiful but the workers few. It is the challenge to us all to let the seeds sown in our hearts bear fruit so that we can continue to help others to share in the love of God's creation.



True to form, the Suchana project is

determinedly (but cautiously) beginning to re-open its little library and to provide a space where local children can come to read and learn. Its full programme has to wait a bit longer, as all schools in West Bengal are still closed. However, Suchana teachers and volunteers are continuing to gather groups of children together informally in their home villages to help to maintain and build on basic literacy skills until the Centre is fully open.

Like all charities, Suchana has suffered a drop in income during the pandemic, so we were especially pleased that our Quiz and pudding evening, in mid-September, as well as being a very happy event, made the amazing total of £601.55. In addition to that, a third of the very generous donations given at Mark Lillie's funeral will come to Suchana and help the project to make ends meet and continue to provide a better start in life for very marginalised children in rural West Bengal.

# Fives Court and future health and well-being facilities in Mere

Following on from the successful first meeting on 28<sup>th</sup> July, on 23<sup>rd</sup> September representatives of Wiltshire Council, Mere Town Council, Mere Surgery and Mere Surgery PPG met in Mere to discuss two key issues. Firstly, to assess current provision of affordable housing (particularly for the elderly) in Mere and secondly to consider how to improve the provision of health and well-being services to Mere and its environs. This arose from the paper presented in June by Mere PPG to Wiltshire Council which can still be read on the Mere Surgery website (PPG section).

It was decided that the next step will be to undertake an in-depth consultation with Mere residents led by Mere PPG and Wiltshire Council. Fives Court will be included in this consultation as part of the affordable housing provision for the elderly in Mere and the Council is not intending to dispose of this site.

The consultation will take place over the winter months and the partnership will continue to update you as this important project progresses. "This is residents' opportunity to have a say in the future council housing provision in Mere as well as re-shaping the way Mere Surgery is supported by bringing much needed health services back to the area," says Cllr Phil Alford, Cabinet member for Housing, Strategic Assets and Asset Transfer for Wiltshire Council and Cllr George Jeans, Wiltshire Council.

Now the really hard work really begins.
