

New Witch's Hat at West Knoyle Village Hall

With all Victorian buildings comes the task of maintenance and repairs and for the last couple of years we have seen the distinctive Witch's Hat cowling on the chimney stack deteriorate. The rust was eating away at the metal structure and the high winds had put the Witch's Hat at such a jaunty angle that it was cause for concern.

This, together with it being a prime nesting site for ravens, squirrels and hornets, something had to be done!

So, to our rescue came West Knoyle's builder, PFP Build, who did a fantastic job in organising the fabrication of the Witch's Hat, through Gillingham's Magna Metal Craft, and installing it to make a perfect fit. Work was done to make the chimney stack secure for the Witch's Hat to sit snugly



on top. The two vents are covered inside with mesh to allow for ventilation whilst preventing access to unwanted nest-builders.

The simplified designed certainly looks the part and is in keeping with the building - we are sure that this Witch's Hat will last for the next 100 years!

Mere Town Council

It is difficult to comprehend, as I write my report this month, the appalling situation in Ukraine. Once again, the volunteers from our wonderful Resilience Forum and other members of the community have stepped forward helping with collections and donations for the humanitarian appeal. The Town Council agreed, unanimously, to purchase and fly the Ukrainian flag on Castle Hill and we have received many favourable comments about this poignant show of support.

Life goes on in Mere. At the March meeting, we discussed the ongoing situation at Lynch Close. The Vice Chair and I, along with ClIr Jeans, attended a meeting at Lynch Close, with Wiltshire Council officers and residents. The consultations are still in the early stages and nothing has been decided yet but I must congratulate the residents committee, led by Geoff Sams, who very effectively have ensured that Wiltshire Council are committed to keeping the residents informed with developments and ensuring that the views, needs and requirements of residents will be considered. I realise that some change is inevitable but a seamless transition is important. The Town Council is committed to supporting Lynch Close residents.

With the help of grant funding from the Wessex Water Environmental Fund, the Town Council has installed a water bottle refilling station in Salisbury Street Car Park (outside the public toilets). By installing this bottle refilling station, we are hoping to save plastic bottles from landfills and make the town more sustainable by reducing the cost and waste associated with disposable plastic water bottles.

Some of you will have noticed that works are underway at Mere School. Upstairs rooms that used to be part of Mere Children's Centre are being re- furbished to allow for more class rooms. A planning application for the new car park layout, at the school, was considered by the Town Council at the last meeting. This will make entering and leaving the grounds considerably safer by car and on foot.

Cllr John Jordan has, once again, organised a Litter Pick in April as part of the Great British Spring Clean. There is more about this in further on. Also, in April, is the Annual Town Meeting on the 20th. It will be held in The Grove Building at 7-30pm with refreshments from 7pm. On the agenda will be: - Mere Resilience Forum & Community Support- past, present and future; The Queen's Platinum Jubilee Celebrations; Cropping of Yew Arch in Mere Cemetery; Cemetery Rules and Regulations & their enforcement; Car Club and/or EV charge points in Mere; Climate Change Strategy for Mere & suggestion for a dog ban at the Recreation Ground. All are welcome so please come along and share your views.

Wiltshire Councillor ~ George Jeans Writes

Covid appears to be prevalent at present in Mere. I was informed at the area board an officer attended a meeting in Mere, where many were missing because of Covid, one in twenty persons the media informed nationally. I think it worth noting that those with Covid can self-test after 5 days and if two negative test returned over 2 days the person should not be infectious, however I note it is advised not to get into close contact with the vulnerable for 10 days.

The South West Area Board has awarded grants to the Mere Division, one for Brownies to help with the provision of free badges and further a health and wellbeing grant to help principally the older and vulnerable in Mere to have a tea party during The Platinum Jubilee at the start of June.

I understand and hope the mechanism of reporting highway and other issues will be revisited; officers seem aware of the problems. The My Wilts App for instance, you the electorate are asked to report on The My Wilts app and this can result in no real feedback, sometimes exacerbated when you get a message to the affect that no action will be taken without giving understandable reasons. I have recently had the same experience when I reported 4 highway items, all on The My Wilts app with no subsequent action.

Wiltshire Council is encouraging local groups and organisations to take part in the **Great British Spring Clean** this year, from **25 March-10 April**. Groups across the county are urged to sign up on the Great British Spring Clean website and join in to help clean up the county from unsightly litter.

Litter picking equipment has been provided by Wiltshire Council to town and parish councils and local community groups across the county, so people should contact their local town or parish council see if they have any equipment to borrow and if they are hosting a clean-up event to support.

Where possible, volunteers should dispose of bagged waste in their usual household black bins or a public litter bin that has sufficient capacity.

For large events that could collect more than 10 bags black bags full of waste, the council can arrange single collection following the event. To arrange this, people should email streetscene@wiltshire.gov.uk a minimum of 10 days before the event with as much information about the event as possible and contact details of the event organiser. Any large items or suspected fly-tips should be left where they are and reported to the council on the My Wilts app.

30 beacons for The Platinum Jubilee have been registered in Wiltshire, it is hoped for 70 across Wiltshire. The Lord Lieutenant will send a representative if requested, when possible, I assume.

In our Warminster area "speed traps" are now set in chosen areas once every two weeks. Those who speed may now hear about it more often than they did!

I said last month The Wiltshire Climate Strategy has been approved at Full Council, I also stated that one of the three actions of the strategy, for the South West Wiltshire Area Board was to help pursue an Electric Car Club in Mere which would include public charging points. I am pleased to report The Mere Town Council have now agreed space for a car and public charging points in the Mere Salisbury Street Car Park. It now looks more certain that Mere will now benefit from the above. Perhaps driving oneself to hospital when able, trying to get a feel for an electric vehicle, giving people travelling a reason to stop and spend time in our town and so on.

The Mere Day Centre at Lynch Close will have its Wiltshire Council funding removed. A new scheme is available to bid for, which looks like it is only for those with a care plan, I intend to question this as the work involved etc., may make it not worth applying for in some cases.

Development of the old Fives Court site in Mere will probably go ahead for older persons accommodation. We were informed at a meeting of Lynch Close residents with Wiltshire Council officers, words to the affect the "National Health" had not requested an opportunity to give input for the site. The future of Lynch Close is certain for a few years however consultation will cause changes in the future, I am sure.

Several in Mere have received requests for Gigaclear to cross land, to expand a Full Fibre, Ultrafast Broadband network throughout the local community. I have been informed by a Kilmington Parish councillor that if procurement has started between Wiltshire Council and BDUK local voucher schemes such as Stourhead implementation will not be able to go ahead until any such Wiltshire intervention Ultrafast Broadband plan is implemented. I have been informed by a Wiltshire Council officer that this is an interesting question and they will report back to me.

A light will now be fitted at the top of the steps from Dark Lane to the Salisbury Street car park at the very end of March. This is now happening after I have had many complaints regarding the darkness when using the steps.

Mere Town Council have shown support for Ukraine by flying the Ukrainian flag on Castle Hill. Whilst being personally involved in this I would also like to thank the Town Council operative who did most of the work. For information regarding refugees from Wiltshire Council email refugees@wiltshire.gov.uk.

The Beaumonts site in Mere have submitted a viability plan regarding the site, which could impact on the quantity of social/affordable housing provided in Mere.

Wiltshire Council has a Family and Community Learning Service that has been in existence for 18 years, Wiltshire Council deliver courses to encourage those 19 years old and over, back to learning.

Link Scheme

It is really nice to see some sun and blue skies as I write. Long may it last.

We saw a reduction in trips in February when we made 68 journeys. These helped people get to medical appointments (at hospitals,

surgeries, dentists, opticians and the physiotherapist) and other appointments including trips for visiting at a care home and hairdressing. We also did our weekly run delivering prescriptions from Mere and Silton surgeries to people living outside Mere.

Disappointingly, we have heard of a rumour in town that there is no point in ringing the Link as they can't help. This is simply incorrect. Whilst we are looking for





Mere Rivers Group Quarterly Nature Notes (covering April - June)

We do hope you enjoyed the photo of one of our much loved Water Voles from the Shreen on last month's Mere Matters cover!! They have been much in evidence throughout the Winter and those of you who are on Facebook can still see photos and videos on the Mere Rivers Group page - along with footage of the kingfisher which has also been present!!

As we now move into the mating season the kingfisher is likely to move downstream to find banks to burrow into for nesting. The chiffchaff, willow warbler, swallows, house martins and swifts are some of the birds that are returning to our area. These birds will be building their nests and, if you watch carefully, you can often identify where they are nesting as they come and go. Of course, nests should be left well alone to ensure they are not abandoned and the eggs/babies left to perish!

Other creatures to look out for are our insects, including the likes of orange tip, brimstone and peacock butterflies, dragonflies including demoiselles and beautiful demoiselles and mayflies. In the rivers as well as the many small invertebrates, the red bellies of male sticklebacks can be seen as they also prepare for mating. Our many Bullheads (or Millers Thumb) are much harder to spot!

In the plant world we will see hawthorn and apple blossom, wild sage, wood anemone and our wonderful bluebells. As the season progresses, the verges will fill with frothy cow parsley, also known as Queen Anne's Lace! If you venture up onto the Downs you will see the classic chalk plants including cowslips, milkwort, purple and white violets and wild thyme.

We have not, previously mentioned the solitary bees, of which there are many species. These are also building their nests at this time of year. Did you know that solitary bees:

Are non-aggressive, do not produce honey, do not have a queen, do not live in hives, and are very important pollinators?

These important creatures are under increasing threat through loss of hedgerow, fewer

wildflower meadows and wild areas in our gardens. Each of us can help them in our own gardens by leaving wild and unmown areas, more varied planting of bee friendly species including single bloom flowers. We can also help by putting up bee hotels which can be easily bought or made. You can get more information on the buglife website at <u>www.buglife.org.uk</u> or from the RSPB at www.rspb.org.uk.

The ones we are most likely to encounter are the Masons Bee and, and you can help all of these by putting out bug hotels which can be bought or easily made.

Letter from the Churches ~ Rev Ben Rundell-Evans writes:

'Proud pied April dressed in all his trim'

Finally - sun with some warmth! It is amazing how fast blubs begin to poke out of the ground, leaves begin to sprout, and the garden furniture emerges once more from the garage. Spring has well and truly sprung and what a relief to see it! We are inextricably linked with the seasons, in a way that we simply cannot avoid. As much as we use artificial light to keep us working into the night, we are tuned into the sun, the length of days, and the warmth of an afternoon, almost as much as we are tuned to our stomachs and their appetites! We always have varied weather in our part of the world, however, when the weather is good, anything is possible.

Such weather makes it harder to comprehend the challenges that we see throughout the world, and particularly at the moment in Ukraine. In the face of the beauty of creation, it is hard to discern why we allow ourselves as humans to 'lord it over' one another. We are all born equal, and yet... In a life of faith, what is central is the understanding of giving glory not to ourselves, but our creator. Not gilding the lily, but admiring the creation we have, and sharing it with those around us. On a spring morning when there is such life coming from the depths of the ground, it makes one wonder how, when we have the gift of breath and life, we can sometime use it in such selfish ways.

In the face therefore of new life that we are offered in the springtide of creation, may we have generosity to those in need, and compassion and concern for those who wish others harm.

Giving to Ukraine
