At the June meeting of the Town Council, members thanked the Mere Platinum Jubilee Committee for the excellent show they put on for this very special occasion. The events were very well attended and enjoyed. Many others were also involved in making everything run smoothly, so many thanks to those who gave their time, including George who placed the flags and our groundsman, Simon, who helped with the beacon and much more. It was a great blessing that the weather also complied.

The bench seat in Jubilee Gardens was repaired by two community volunteers, Mr. Tony Barrett and Mr. Cedric Tuck in time for the Platinum Jubilee weekend celebrations and our thanks go out to them for their help with this work.

We are all well aware of the parking problems in and around the town. The Town Council is, however, concerned that pram and wheelchair users are finding difficulty accessing the pavements. We do have some dropped curbs, which are there to help. Unfortunately these are regularly parked across. You may not have realised but it's actually a parking offence to block or park across or adjacent to a dropped kerb. The "Highway Code" advises drivers "DO NOT STOP OR PARK... where the kerb has been lowered to help wheelchair users and powered mobility vehicles, or where it would obstruct cyclists' use of cycle facilities... except when forced to do so by stationary traffic." Could I please ask you all to consider this when parking.

Mere Town Council, as you may recall, is in receipt of S.106 money as a result of the Woodlands Road development and more will come as the remaining houses are completed and sold. The Town Council has ambitions to deliver a number of projects across the town that will either enhance and regenerate existing public facilities or provide new ones that meet the criteria laid down in the legal agreement and also the statutory powers & functions of the Town Council. The work load in fulfilling these projects is enormous. So much so that the Town Council has appointed a part time Project Co-ordinator who will take up his post on July 18th.

To date, the Town Council has not yet been able to find a suitable candidate to fill our vacancy for grounds person and Simon is working really hard and doing extra hours to try and keep up with all the grass cutting. If you would like to register for on-line services please visit our website www.meresurgery.co.uk complete the Register for On-line services form and we will contact you. Please note if you are newly registered with the surgery you will only be able to apply for on-line services once you have received confirmation your registration is complete.

For many of you who have registered to use the NHS App, there is some overlap in functionality between NHS App and Airmid and the NHS App allows patients to access their Covid Pass.

However, Airmid's local advantage is allowing patients to send and receive communications from the Practice and to enter data such as blood pressure readings directly into their record. It is also extremely easy to use.

Please remember, although we are introducing an alternative way to communicate it does not replace any of the existing methods of communication for anyone who prefers not to use Apps.

We are grateful to members of the Patient Participation Group (PPG) who took the time to test the various aspects of the Airmid App. At their recent meeting they all agreed it was a big step forward for Mere Surgery online services.

West Knoyle

Back in 2017 there was a large fundraising campaign to get a Public Access Defibrillator installed at West Knoyle and a very large number of West Knoyle parishioners paid financial contributions. Indeed, the village raised a staggering £3250 which is an incredible achievement given that there are only 118 people on the electoral register. Anyhow, the public access defibrillator was purchased and installed at the Village Hall. The defibrillator has been included on the Parish Council's asset register and is insured by the Parish Council.

There was a surplus of donated money which the Parish Council has used to hold a seminar into the use of the defibrillator, help towards the installation and also to pay for replacement parts for the machine as and when they are needed. Please bear in mind that some of the parts need to be replaced after the defibrillator has been used but there is a requirement to replace some of the parts after a specific period of time in order to ensure that they are effective – for example, the battery has a four-year life span.

At the recent Annual Parish Meeting I was asked to provide a breakdown of this income/expenditure so that the contributors can see how their money is being used. I have asked for this breakdown to be published in Mere Matters and will also put a copy on the West Knoyle website www.westknoyle.org

Wiltshire Councillor ~ George Jeans Writes

Special Educational Needs and or Disabilities (SEND) groups and organisations have been making use of a Wiltshire Council small grants scheme to buy much needed play equipment and facilities for their communities. As an example Barford St Martin's community is creating a playground in the village and due to the Small Grants Scheme is purchasing additional SEN equipment, which means children with SEND can play alongside their peers safely.

At its meeting on Tuesday 21 June, Wiltshire Council's Cabinet will consider a new investment and regeneration plan for high streets in all 18 Wiltshire towns and its city, Salisbury, plus three large villages, Pewsey, Tisbury and Downton.

The Wiltshire Towns Programme will see £1m each year until 2025 invested into a range of different projects to attract customers and investment to Wiltshire's highstreets, to help support town centres as they continue to recover from the effects of the pandemic and rise to the challenge of online shopping. This initial extra funding will be invested into projects that will kick start the programme. including a Generating Activity Grant, which is a fund to work with town councils to drive footfall back to high streets with events and activities; a What's on in Wiltshire app, which will enable people to find out about events on their smartphones; and heritage apps, like the one already live in Salisbury, to help visitors find out more about towns. As well as these projects, each town included in the programme will receive annual funding to improve their high streets and attract visitors, so long as they produce an action plan that fulfils certain criteria and is measurable to show the success and impact of the plan. These action plans must be created by the town or parish council, in partnership with local businesses and business groups, and should be tailored to meet the specific needs of the town.

Wiltshire Council is investing £600,000 into Culver Street car park in Salisbury to carry out repairs to the facility. There will be some disruption to users of the car park while these works are carried out but we'll do our very best to keep these to a minimum. The car park will remain open for the duration of the works, but there may be some limited access to some of the floors during the build programme. There will also be some periodic closure of footpaths around the site but this will be kept to a minimum and alternative routes will be clearly signposted.

The Shared Lives Service helps people live as part of a family, within the carers home, where they receive the support or care that they need. The main purpose is to offer care or support to men and women over 18 who require support to live independently alongside other people in a family-like setting.

The service places adults who have mental health needs or learning disabilities, physical impairments, or are elderly. It's also for those who, for a variety of reasons, cannot manage to live without support. Shared Lives carers provide support with daily tasks, from personal care and accessing health services, to making decisions and learning new skills. The service mainly offers long-term

arrangements, but also offers short-term arrangements. These are usually provided as a break for other carers or as somewhere to live for a few weeks

Wiltshire Council has 65 Shared Lives carers and is always looking to recruit more. The recruitment process has been updated, which means it's now easier than ever to become a carer. Wiltshire Council has set out plans to ensure people can enjoy the Summer Solstice safely at Avebury this year, while ensuring the World Heritage Site is as protected as possible.

Wiltshire Council will be delivering its Holiday Activity and Food (FUEL) programme again this summer. The programme provides children eligible for benefits related free school meals with access to free high-quality activities, nutritious meals and food education during the school summer holidays. The FUEL programme is delivered with funding from the Department for Education and will run for four weeks during the summer holidays from 1 August to 25 August 2022. Eligible families will be able to sign up through their schools in the next few months.

Two FUEL Easter camps for young people with special educational needs and/or a disability also took place at Springfield Community Campus in Corsham and at Five Rivers Health and Wellbeing Centre in Salisbury. These sessions will be available again throughout August and individuals will be able to take part in activities such as dodgeball, dance, new age kurling, cricket and boccia.

Salisbury has become the focus of a new localised campaign to find more foster carers for children in Wiltshire. Wiltshire Council's fostering team will and have visited key sites and enlisting the support of businesses, charities, faith leaders and organisations to highlight the need for more foster carers in the area. The council has a three-year campaign to provide 100 new foster carers by spring 2023. Fostering with your local council means all money is spent on frontline services and the child is more likely to be able to stay close to their school, friends and family networks. The council recently held a high profile tour of the county during Foster Care Fortnight to encourage more potential carers to come forward. By putting the spotlight on the Salisbury area, it is hoped local people who are thinking about fostering will want to find out more. There will be an online information session for those wanting to find out more on 30th June at 7pm on this link https://bit.ly/3KOba5b Please be aware you will need to have downloaded the Microsoft Teams App to join the online meeting.

A local planning application I took to committee at the request of Mere Town Council was approved. In the officers report it was stated as one of the reasons the application should be approved was, "In policy conclusion, officers consider that in the absence of a five year housing land supply, and given that the proposal is supported in principle by the Conservation officer, the titled balance would apply to the proposal and appropriate weight should be attached to the proposal in the absence of a 5 year housing land supply." It appears the lack of Wiltshire Council to have a 5 year housing land supply is impacting on the Mere area.

Any small highways improvements presented at the local LHFIG (Local Highway and Footpath improvement group), will in future need a local Town or Parish Council representative at the meeting for the application to progress.

I am pleased to report underground conduits will be installed on the new parking area at the Duchy Manor Site ready for electric vehicle (EV) charging points to be installed when possible.

Summer Reading Challenge 2022

Children often have a dip in their reading over the summer - the Summer Reading Challenge, produced by the Reading Agency and delivered by libraries, has been proven to stop this as well as changing children's attitudes in a positive way towards reading and libraries. The challenge is for 4-11 year olds to read 6 library books over 8 weeks of the summer in return for various fun prizes, including a medal and certificate on completion. This year the challenge runs from Saturday 16 July to Saturday 10 September - there will be a registration period in the first

two weeks of the challenge, where children will receive a pack of resources; after this period (from 1 August) and once children have completed the challenge, they are invited to return to collect their final sticker, medal and certificate and to talk about their reading experience.



This year's theme, 'Gadgeteers', is all about science and innovation. Developed in partnership with the Science Museum Group, the Challenge will inspire children to use their curiosity and creativity to discover the science behind the everyday and celebrates the role of the imagination in both reading and the sciences. Although there is a science theme, children can read any six library books of their choice; they don't have to be linked to science and they can read more than six books! They also don't have to be able to read, reading with a parent/carer also counts.

Mere Rivers Group Quarterly Nature Notes (covering July to Sept)

We do hope you enjoyed Mere's various Platinum Jubilee Celebrations. We were so lucky to have good, although blustery weather for the Jubilee Party.

Now we are into July and, hopefully, the weather will be kind to us for the summer. Hopefully many of you will have enjoyed the wonderful displays of bluebell, cow parsley, red campion and buttercups in our woods and meadows. During the following months wild marjoram, wild thyme, scabious, and knapweed will be flowering on Castle and Long Hills and also on the Downs. All of these plants are loved by many pollinators, including all types of bumble bees, solitary bees and butterflies including marbled white, common blue, comma and peacock to name a few.

Has anyone else noticed that there seem to be fewer house martins nesting in house eaves around the town this year? We don't know any reason for this so we are a little puzzled! Swifts and swallows do seem to be around though perhaps in slightly fewer numbers than normal. Let's hope for a full return next year!

And we don't normally mention the fish in our streams ... but our waterways are full of fish; trout in the deeper, lower areas and bullheads and sticklebacks in the shallower upper reaches. The sticklebacks and bullheads are of particular note in that it is the male that looks after the eggs once these have been laid by the female. They spend their time fanning the eggs to give them oxygen and guarding them from predators. If anything happens to the male then all the eggs are extremely likely to be lost. So, while we do love to see the children in the streams and it is great for them to be learning about our wildlife, please do encourage them to put fish back safely (and we know that most do), particularly as the bullhead is in serious decline and is now a protected species.

Wishing you a lovely summer enjoying all the wildlife that thrives on our streams and rivers and the surrounding areas.

Patients Participation Group (PPG) of Mere Surgery

Fives Court Update

In April 2021 the PPG held a survey of Mere residents to find out our community's wishes for Fives Court. This was after Fives Court as a residential home for the elderly was closed by Wiltshire Council without consultation. Whilst the closure was perfectly legal, the PPG felt strongly that Fives Court should be retained for the community. We asked two key questions: should it be general housing or should it be a wellbeing centre offering much needed additional health services to Mere?

The vote was overwhelmingly for a wellbeing centre offering further medical services. Some fourteen months on Fives Court has been saved for our community and it is currently in pre-planning stages to deliver further homes for the elderly in Mere. Whilst recognising the health and wellbeing benefits of additional housing for the elderly in Mere, there remains the need to bring those health services we have lost back. This is the PPG's main focus. Wiltshire Council has asked us to wait until the pre-planning process at Fives Court has been completed before moving forward. Then an open consultation process with Mere will begin.

This is not perfect, but it is progress. The fact that our surgery is so good (for which we are forever grateful) masks residents' need to travel so far for support services that were previously available in the town.

The PPG has not forgotten the fantastic response to its survey for which we thank you. We remain optimistic that our fight for further health services and a wellbeing centre in Mere will be won, but these things sadly take time and limitless amounts of patience.

Have a great summer and we will update you again in the Autumn.

Letter from the Churches ~ Christine Marsh writes.

'This is the day that the Lord has made, let us rejoice and be glad in it.' Psalm 118. Verse 24

I have always loved to draw and paint but time pressures resulted in this being put to one side. I still remember the pleasure gained from receiving 'Painting by Numbers Kits' for Christmas and birthdays. I would always start by filling in the more interesting bits. These, for me, were the most brightly coloured areas. What I considered to be the duller colours, the greys, the browns, the blacks I would leave until last. When I retired from work I found myself with time to take up painting again, though not by numbers! I still, however, left the greys and darker browns until last but not because I considered them the most boring bits but because I had learned to love these colours as they brought the picture to life; for once the darker bits are added the picture takes on greater depth and dynamism.

Life is a bit like that. An ever changing canvas of light and dark, joy and sorrow. The bright bits are wonderful and of course we wish that they might last forever but when we look back at our lives we often find that it is the darker time that has brought out the best in us. We may not enjoy the shadows but they help us to put things into perspective. They make us take stock and re-evaluate our lives. Our focus changes and we prune away the trivia.

My Dad had a very simplistic faith. He accepted light and darkness, sunshine and rain as being essential for the growth of creation. His favourite hymn was *Glad that I live am I, that the sky is blue. Glad for the country lanes and the fall of dew. After the sun the rain, after the rain the sun, this is the way of life, since the world begun. All that we need to do, be we low or high, is to see that we grow nearer the sky. (A Victorian Children's hymn not sung today. Not PC!!)* . His view was simply that what we had to do through the shadows and light of our lives was simply to focus on God, and work to growing closer to him.

As Christians we have faith that God will be with us in the day he has made, be it sunny or wet, light or dark.

As we enter the holiday season of July and August we look forward to sunshine, warmth, long, light lazy days with family and friends, fellowship, joy and laughter. A holiday time to be thankful for; a time to create and store wonderful memories so that when the colder, darker, lonelier times of winter arise we may gain strength from our good summer memories. May we all benefit from this holiday season, enjoy the sunlight, the warmth, the fellowship of family and friends so be ready to take that joyful time into any colder and darker autumn and winter days ahead.

Meanwhile in West Bengal Suchana continues to make a positive impact on the lives of many 'adivasi' children and communities. It has recently received recognition and some funding from the Global Fund for Children which seeks to support and enhance grassroots organisations like Suchana working with 'left behind' and seriously disadvantaged children with the overall aim of enabling all children everywhere to feel safe, strong and valued. Suchana's First Language Literacy project, enabling children to learn to read and write I their own mother tongue fits well with this aim, and as well as developing appropriate flash cards, story books and other teaching resources ,they are sharing the results of this pioneering work with government schools beginning to work in this way.

And, of course, Suchana continues its core work of early learning classes, ongoing support, library and mobile library work, activities and using basic computer skills to enhance education. Local Government schools, having at last reopened after two years of Covid, closed again 2 months later for 6 weeks because of extreme heat. Suchana kept going by holding its classes early and late in the day when it was a little cooler.
