His colleague, Simon Cook, has subsequently been promoted to Head Groundsman. The Town Council is currently in the process of selecting someone to fill the vacancy we now have. Inevitably, this means a tremendous workload for Simon in the peak grass cutting season and this with the preparation for the jubilee events, combines to make the workload even more so. Please bear with us over the next few weeks, we are doing our best!

I am sorry to have to report that one of our defibrillators has gone missing. Every avenue of investigation has been followed up and we now have had to concede that it has been stolen. This is a sad state of affairs. To replace the defibrillator will necessitate making an insurance claim, the premium for which has increased by £1000 this year!

Following a meeting with the contractors carrying out the work at the Duchy Manor site, I must inform you that from June 6th, parking will be extremely limited for all users of this site. After one of the driest winters and April delivering only 45% of normal rainfall it looks like a difficult summer for our streams.

Wessex Water have already reduced the abstraction amount to supply only the local area and are about to turn on "stream support" for the Ashfield. If the stream support keeps the Ashfield running and Burton pond full, in what promises to be a dry summer Wessex Water plan to do the same on the Shreen.

The boards, part of the flume on the Shreen, were removed for a short time to allow the build-up of silt to wash down stream. They are now back and the ducks and moorhens can swim and not walk. We must remember that these are wild creatures and should not be fed every day (only by small children). We have what appears to be an inbalance of drake to ducks, its easy pickings when you are fed each day.

How good it is to hear the swifts screaming overhead and watch them swirling with the swallows and housemartins.

I know we want the best of both worlds, water in the streams and warm sunny weather. We will just have to wait and see.

Wiltshire Councillor ~ George Jeans Writes

I am at currently putting up the Union Jack flags for The Queen's Platinum Jubilee, which the Mere Town Council have supplied. The masts were provided by The Hill Brush Company. .Eric Mitchell, who very sadly at the young age of 66, died suddenly on the 9th May, paid for bunting plus hand flags etc to be distributed. A lovely legacy.

I recently attended a Postmasters meeting at Stratford-upon-Avon. It has become clear that without a retail operation, the majority of Post Offices will be forced to close. As from January 2023 we may see some Post Offices performing many banking functions. Some Post Offices may diversify to include alternative mail management such as DPD. The government are still supporting Post Office Ltd financially.

I am soon to be serving on "The Pension Fund" Wiltshire Council committee which deals with vast financial investments.

Wiltshire Council are now cutting verges from September except for road junctions. I received a number of complaints last year regarding the verges not being cut sufficiently at some areas and other areas that forced pedestrians into the road etc. Junctions should be cut and visibility maintained. There has to be a balance between wildlife but safety at junctions is crucial. Please report any junction visibility problems to the My Wilts App however please inform me also if you can. I had noted when I was in Zeals a few weeks ago, a metre of the verge was cut back on the north side of Zeals and some junctions appeared to have had their visibility maintained, I had seen this compromise also elsewhere and had thought this year safety of junctions and vegetation causing wetting of clothes, pedestrians being forced out into the road by wet or volume of vegetation may be acceptable this year, now I have seen and received complaints regarding Mere Down and the Roman Road junction and other nearby laybys with obscured visibility, I have reported and hope this is a one off. I must thank Wiltshire Council for quickly responding to Fordswater's complaints regarding problems with vegetation a few weeks ago.

I have previously reported that Area Board funding for community grant funding is reduced and the South West Wiltshire Area Board will be finding it more difficult to satisfy applications. The removed funding will be used for local highway and footpath projects funded through CATG (Community Area Transport Group). The group has been renamed as LHFIG (Local Highway & Footway Improvement Group). I was hoping that funding could be found via this group in the form of a substantive grant for a B3092 Acceleration Lane at Coombe Barn Farm junction. Kilmington Parish Council have supported this. I have now been informed the cost would be in the region of £250 000.00, this is unaffordable by the LHFIG. The Kilmington Parish Council have agreed to pay about £400 towards 'slow' being painted on the road which I must thank them for. I would like to see perhaps a low speed limit and traffic calming for the safety of us all at this junction. In terms of progressing a junction realignment long-term, the idea would need to be taken forward as a strategic network improvement. The best way of achieving a junction realignment would be through its inclusion in Wiltshire Local Transport Plan 4 (LTP4) which will start to be drafted in the next year or so by the Transport Planning Team. LTP4 will be delivered on the ground from 2026 onwards.

Various changes have been made to the way Area Boards operate since the Cabinet/Scrutiny review exercises during the first quarter of this year. A presentation on all the changes will be given at the **29th June South West Wiltshire Area Board meeting**, these changes and their implications will impact on the function of the area board and Parish and Town Councils and others, especially regarding local grants. The main changes are:-

Grant applications will not be accepted after the 4 week deadline which this time is the 1st June (because of the processes involved in (5) below)

Parish Councils can no longer apply for capital "community area" grants, but they can for revenue grants from the Health & Wellbeing Budget and Youth Budget (this includes SIDs, Pedestrian Gates, and Finger Posts)

The maximum amount an applicant can apply for without needing to find match funding is £500, reduced from £1k.

The maximum amount an applicant can apply for with match funding is $\pm 5k$

The local CEM and/or local area board can refer an application to a new Grant Assessment Panel (Cabinet Member for Communities and Assoc Director for Communities) where the applicant is

Requesting over £5,000

Not from a voluntary or community sector organisation

Applying to multiple boards (more than 3)

The SWWAB's intention to cap all capital grant requests received in 2022/23 to 10% of the overall 2022/23 budget allocation, i.e. \pounds 2487 – due to the 50% reduction in this budget allocation.

The purpose of this article is to let you know that the Mere Literary Festival will in future be raising funds not just for the Mere and District Link Scheme but also for other Mere based charities.

The Mere Literary Festival was set up in 1997 by Adrienne Howell BEM to raise funds for the Mere and District Link



Scheme. The Festival has become a regular annual feature in Mere and has provided much entertainment and funding for the Link Scheme. Adrienne retired in 2018 and the Festival has since been run successfully by Gail Garbutt who is working hard on the programme for the 2022 Festival from 11th to 15th October.

The Link Scheme Trustees have considered legal advice about the link between the Scheme and the Festival and the currently healthy financial position of the Link Scheme. They have decided that from now on the Link Scheme should not be the sole beneficiary of the funds raised by the Festival.

Gail has agreed to carry on running the Literary Festival to raise funds for the Link Scheme, Mere Day Centre and Seeds for Success. Following a suggestion by Adrienne, 50% of the funds raised will be available to other charities operating in Mere on application.

Times Past

"On 3rd July 1952, Queen Elizabeth II visited Mere, but because of an outbreak of foot-and-mouth disease she could not visit any farms, and met the Duchy tenants at the Hill Brush company's premises, and at the Burton Field Nurseries. The Queen showed great interest in the manufacturing processes at the brush factory and overstaved her time. She was



presented with two miniature brooms, for Prince Charles and Princess Anne. She then drove slowly round the crowded Square, and then to the Recreation Ground, where about a thousand children from the district were gathered to see her. "

In the new edition:

"At the Recreation Ground a great crowd of children greeted her before she went to see the greenhouses at Burton field, where Her Majesty was

presented with a spray of orchids grown by Mr Walter Burden."

In the photograph: Royal visit of July 3rd, 1952. The Queen is shown in the Recreation Ground; walking beside her is the late Mr Alan Coward, then Chairman of the Parish Council, the late Mr A. C. Wardle Headteacher at the Secondary Modern School, and immediately behind her



the Rev. N. E. E. Johnson, then Vicar of Mere.
