#### Mere Town Council

As we progress into late autumn and winter, we are somewhat grateful for the respite we have experienced, so far, with the mild weather. The reality of colder weather around the corner, alas, has all households and businesses facing the prospect of high energy costs. Mere Town Council, along with churches and schools etc., are giving very serious thought to fuel saving solutions and shall be finding ways of cutting down on consumption. These decisions will be difficult, which, inevitably, makes the Budget setting meeting later his month, challenging. There is also some work being carried out at various levels (county and town) and involving various groups and committees in seeking to provide a warm spaces scheme.

A couple of months ago, I reported on the state of our rivers, quoting a Wessex Water report. It seems that a relatively positive state, at the time, has now deteriorated as the effect of an increase in abstraction from the Upper Shreen, coupled with a temporary stop on the stream support scheme, has had a more serious effect than anticipated. Ian Sheppard, from the Mere Rivers Group will be giving a report on this at our meeting on November 7th.

A working group of councillors will shortly be conducting a survey on the state of traffic and parking in Mere. I am sure it is obvious, to you all, that there is a real problem, especially with some "appalling" parking. I am certain that no one would want us to have to resort to more yellow lines, especially in the centre of Mere.

At the October Town Council meeting, residents of Lynch Close were able to talk to various officers from Wiltshire Council who gave reassurances that a monthly Newsletter would be distributed to keep everyone up to date with progress on any redevelopment or refurbishment plans for the sheltered housing on the site.

I would like to welcome Paul Hill to our grounds team and I would like to thank the Ground Staff for their continued husbandry of Mere and, the Footpath Group, who as volunteers, maintain our footpaths all year round.

#### Wiltshire Councillor ~ George Jeans Writes

The Remembrance Service this year will be on Sunday 13th November, held around the War Memorial. I shall be laying a wreath as Wiltshire Councillor and the South West Wiltshire Area Board chairman Cllr Nabil Najjar, will be in attendance also to lay a wreath.

At various Wiltshire Council meetings, it has been acknowledged to get those with need to attend warm spaces this coming winter, may be problematic, those requiring heat may because of pride or physical capability etc not attend. It was suggested perhaps invite a person you know and you suspect may require heat for say a cup of tea, you may then be able to further help and guide them. May be simple and common sense, however as has been done in council meetings I am simply highlighting.

At its meeting on Tuesday 11 October, Wiltshire Council's Cabinet considered a proposal to invest more money into its Parish Stewards scheme. Parish Stewards help fix minor road defects, fill potholes, and trim verges and hedges to support Wiltshire Council's highways team. They are given their priority tasks for each local community areas, through councillor and public reporting. There are currently 18 Parish Stewards throughout Wiltshire – one for each community area. The stewards focus on small jobs in their community, such as filling potholes, drain clearance and cutting hedges. All work is based on the priorities of the local town or parish council.

The council will invest a further £233,000 each financial year until 2024/25 into the new twoperson Parish Stewards team and work with contractors to source the vehicle and extra equipment. At present they are limited to oneperson jobs and only have a certain selection of tools. So to help with this, the council will employ



an extra two-person Parish Steward support team that will work around the community areas to undertake larger jobs with more equipment. The new twoperson team will be able to help with tasks that need more than one person to complete and will also carry additional equipment to complete larger scale safety and maintenance works. The new team of two will have a new pick-up vehicle, cage trailer, mechanical weed ripper, flail mower and power tools to use across the county where required.

Earlier on this year older people across Wiltshire worked with creative artists on songs, poems and artwork reflecting their personal stories inspired by Queen Elizabeth and her 70 years on the throne. Mention on the produced video is made of Mere Day Centre being one of the contributors, the voices of them signing can also be heard in one place on the video produced. This video recorded at Wiltshire Music Centre shows a recording of the 10 pieces created as

part of this work. The Jubilee Chronicles https://youtu.be/QBDQzWRjr0Q please watch if you can.

Wiltshire Council has provided an update on its committed efforts to tackle the climate emergency locally, with a vast range of projects either in place or in the pipeline to respond to the global issue of our time.

T he Wiltshire Climate Strategy was approved in February 2022 and since then the council has published its delivery plans, which set out how the organisation will become carbon neutral by 2030, and the actions it can take either on its own alone or in partnership with others, to lead the transition to a carbon neutral county.



The council's strategy is split into the themes of transport, housing and the built environment, natural environment, energy, green economy waste, and carbon neutral council – with progress made in each.

The council has carried out a tender process for provision and replacement of electric vehicle charging points at towns with a population of 10,000 or more. This will help, I have been informed most Wiltshire Council car park Electric Vehicle chargers are not working in much of Salisbury and this will be addressed. Public EV points are required, I assume some service areas will provide or expand EV points.

It will also be rolling out a grant to support town and parish councils to install electric vehicle charging points in their local area. A well-attended webinar was recently held to provide town and parishes more information.

To encourage active travel, Local Cycling and Walking Infrastructure Plans (LCWIPs) are being developed to improve cycling and walking opportunities throughout the county – working closely with town councils.

To ensure air quality throughout the county can be monitored as effectively as possible, old monitoring stations will be replaced using community infrastructure funding (CIL).

People being encouraged to use public transport – flexible on demand service being developed for the Pewsey Vale area, and concessionary bus passes can be temporarily used all day Monday to Sunday, including bank holidays. Public transport is poor in Mere, I, SWWAB and Mere Town Council are close to getting and electric car club in Mere, it will enable those who can drive access to a car.

The council's Housing Energy Efficiency Programme will retrofit 5,000 council homes by 2030, with assessment carried out on the first 800. The aim is to reduce the amount of CO2 by 15,000 tonnes which in the process will make the properties more energy efficient and help save residents money.

Lynch Close Sheltered Housing Review has produced a October 2022 Newsletter. A survey of the current sheltered housing at Lynch Close has been undertaken and staff from the Council's maintenance team and an appointed architectural consultant have visited and are helping to develop draft options for Lynch Close. A meeting with residents to present these options and feedback will take place. The original estimated when this would happen was October but is now likely to be later in the year.

The Council has committed to upgrading all its housing to improve insulation and reduce energy consumption. This will help respond to the Wiltshire climate emergency and reduce the cost of heating for residents. This is the minimum level of refurbishment to be undertake at Lynch Close. "Doing nothing" an option Wiltshire Council will consider. The timing of the review is linked with any development of Fives Court.

Wiltshire Council will develop the options further and include residents' feedback. Wiltshire Council will come back to the residents for comment again and only then will the findings of the review be put forward for decision. Regarding Fives Court in Angel Lane, Wiltshire Council have confirmed that:

- The Council wants to use the site to provide social housing specifically for older people.
- This is likely to be through the provision of flats on the site to make best use of the space available whilst being sensitive to neighbours.
- As soon as Wiltshire Council get to the stage of a detailed design, Wiltshire Council will ask Lynch Close residents to get involved in commenting on plans.

The Council wants to provide older residents with sheltered housing built to the highest standard.

If there is redevelopment at Lynch Close, homes will be built to new high standards.

Although the following may not be relevant to Lynch Close or Fives Court, for information, the council has also tendered a three-year contract to find a Modern Method of Construction (MMC) delivery partner. MMC is a process which focuses on off-site construction techniques, such as mass production and factory assembly, as alternatives to traditional building. This project will deliver 1,000 new affordable zero carbon homes.

The introduction of a new collections rounds for household residual waste has resulted in a more energy efficient service and less emissions – a review will take place later in 2022 on the efficiency of garden waste rounds.

Diverting sorted black bag waste collected at the household recycling centres (HRCs) to an energy from waste facility is estimated to have the potential to save more than 10,500 tonnes of CO2e per annum. Based on this and other data, the council is developing proposals to reduce the amount of HRC waste that is sent to landfill.

94.8% of the material collected for recycling, reuse and composting by Wiltshire Council was managed within the UK, reducing the 'waste miles' travelled

The council diverted 80.9% of the waste it managed from landfill (2021/22).

The £12m project to convert the council's streetlighting to energy efficient LED lighting is complete for all standard streetlights in Wiltshire. Any remaining units are heritage and special units. The project is predicted to be complete by the end of March 2023. The equivalent of around 1,770 tonnes of CO2 will be saved each year.

Sustained investment in solar photovoltaic technology over time, in 2021/22 the council generated over 550,000 kWh renewable electricity at its own buildings.

I have been asked to drive a mini bus for the local older persons outings at Lynch Close. I managed to keep my C3/D3 enabling me to carry on driving a mini bus. The bus is provided at a low cost by Seeds for Success (helped by Wiltshire Council) a local youth group.

Have you or someone you know considered fostering. Wiltshire Council still campaign to find more foster carers for children in Wiltshire. Fostering with your local council means all money is spent on frontline services and the child is more likely to be able to stay close to their school, friends and family networks.

Lots of fish and invertebrates have died but some have been saved and moved down stream.

As soon as we have significant rain we hope that Wessex Water will reduce abstraction to a level that will sustain our wildlife, but what damage has already been done?





One of the features of any sporting competition is that there is always the surprise team or contestant that does far better than expected. Six years ago it was Wales in the European Football Championship, when they reached the semifinals, and Iceland knocked out England. We often enjoy the triumph of the underdog as long as it is not our favourite team or contestant that is knocked out.

The story of David and Goliath (1Sam. 17 v 38/9) is often mentioned when the unexpected team or contestant wins. Looking from the outside the fight between Goliath and David is a total mismatch, Goliath towers over David and easily wears armour and weaponry that when David is dressed in, leaves David unable to move. David when he faces Goliath is sure he is going to win, this is not misplaced confidence or bravado, but a faith in God that because God is with him, it is really Goliath that is the underdog.

In Mark 4 v37-40 the disciples do not have the same confidence in Jesus that David had in God. They are caught in s storm that is threatening to overwhelm them and their boat. When they wake Jesus it is because they need every available hand to empty the boat of water. To their surprise Jesus commands the storm to stop and it does. They see and recognise the power of God at work, and the inward reality of their situation becomes the outward reality.

The true reality as Christians is that whatever our outward circumstances are, we can have confidence in the future because Jesus is with us.

#### Household Recycling Centres to

switch to their winter opening times.

From 1 November, the opening hours of all 10 of Wiltshire Council's HRCs will change from 10am to 4pm on each day that they're open. Currently they are open from 9am.

As per previous years, Salisbury, Trowbridge and Stanton St Quinton HRCs will be closed for an additional



day a week, so will not be operating on Thursdays and Fridays. The opening days of the other centres will remain as they are. Warminster closed Wednesday & Thursdays.

All of these temporary changes will take affect from 1 November and last until 31 March.

#### Highways teams getting

ready for winter weather.

Our winter maintenance teams are gearing up for the colder weather by taking the gritters out on test runs in the coming weeks. Some of the council's fleet of 24 gritters will be out across the county from 25 October to test the equipment is in



working order and to enable the crews to familiarise themselves with the routes.

Last year the crews were deployed 41 times when road temperatures neared freezing and distributed 5,000 tonnes of salt across approximately 730 miles of A and B roads.
