#### A Ukrainian Summer

The summer that is nearly over has been memorable for so many reasons - the endless blue skies and hot sunshine, the Platinum Jubilee Celebrations, and now of course the death of the Queen, and the succession of King Charles III, not to mention the wonderful Carnival. But the sad backdrop of all that has been the continuing war in Ukraine and the ongoing plight of its people.



As I write this, there are some reasons for cautious optimism that the tide is turning in favour of Ukraine, but there is a long way to go as yet, and the tide could easily turn again. Back in February when the shocking news of the Russian invasion hit our screens, and we saw images of panicking refugees crossing the border into Europe, many people felt compelled to act and offer hospitality. After what seemed like a long delay, the Homes for Ukraine Scheme was set up by the government, allowing people to register and take people into their homes. However, it became clear that the onus would be on individual hosts to match themselves up with people applying to come to Britain, and this made it much more daunting for some.



There was an upswell of goodwill in Mere. The Ukrainian flag was flown on the hill and a group of local people offering support or hosting got together and formed a WhatsApp group in order to communicate and coordinate assistance. Eventually, 5 family units (as far as we know) arrived in Mere and have all settled in successfully. Mere as a town has really stepped up again. Mere School deserves special mention. They took in two boys during the last few weeks of term and have made amazing efforts to welcome them, find extra classroom assistance for them, and above all have made them feel happy and secure in school. One of them has now joined

an older boy at Gillingham school where they are settling well and making lots of friends. No fewer than three people in Mere are offering the adults free English lessons, an absolute godsend to have these lessons available locally.

Other help given by the Support group has been in the form of transport from the airport and to the Job Centre in Trowbridge, and to holiday activities. There have been trips to the seaside, a bread making day, a children's camp in Semley with other refugees from the area, a week's holiday by the sea and numerous social gatherings. The young women have offered their services to local charity events, and have been warmly received wherever they go. Of course, their main priority is to find work - not easy, as everyone knows, if you have no transport. Fortunately, again, local people have come up trumps. Individuals have taken them on as

domestic cleaners, the Walnut Tree pub has taken them on as chambermaids, a Bath-based contract cleaning company gives them occasional deep-cleaning work, together with a lift to Bath. One works at the Hillbrush factory, and another in one of the food outlets. Most importantly, they are working towards being independent and integrated members of the community. Another was offered a Fellowship to Oxford University and a place for her daughter in a good school and so has moved on. Friendships have been forged and the generosity and kindness of people has been heartwarming. We want to thank everyone who has been involved and welcoming to the guests, from the most generous of offers and donations to the friendly smiles and chats so many of you have given. You have done Mere proud.

#### Mere Surgery - Breast Screening Unit Visit - Salisbury Street Car Park

The Breast Screening Unit will be returning to Mere week commencing 17th October 2022

The Breast Screening Unit provides breast screening every three years for women between the ages of 50 and 71 living within the Southampton & Salisbury area and much of it takes place using Mobile Screening units located within the community.

The Breast Screening Unit will be parked in the Salisbury Street Car park from week beginning 17th October 2022 and will remain there for approximately 5 weeks to complete the screening.

Patients who meet the criteria will be contacted direct by the Breast Screening Unit.

Nearer the time, notices will be displayed and bollards placed where the Unit will be parking. We apologise for any inconvenience this may cause.

#### Mere Town Council

At the September meeting Sandra Catley and Linden Stone were elected to the Council and will join us at the next meeting on October 3rd. Also, at the September meeting we discussed ten planning applications. If you wish to comment on any application, on the agenda, you can do so in the Public Section, at the beginning, when you will have three minutes to do so. You are not able to speak when Councilors are discussing the application. As I have stated before, we are always pleased to see the public at our meetings. If you are unable to attend, contact the Clerk on 01747 860701 and your comments will be read out to the Council.

I am pleased to say that the new car parking area at Duchy Manor is now completed. It has been very sympathetically designed to make parking much easier and safer, especially for the school. We have been informed and in fact have seen for ourselves, that there is a "rabbit problem" on the sports' field on the Duchy site. We shall be taking action to eradicate this problem.

The Council have decided to initiate a Warm Spaces Scheme for Mere and have referred this to our excellent "Resilience Forum" who we expect to hear from shortly.

The Council have also discussed whether, or not, to have an ACV (Asset of Community Value) strategy for Mere. We decided that a strategy wasn't necessary but we agreed that we would consider any such asset that we felt suitable for an ACV as it arose. Residents will recall that the last ACV adopted was The Butt of Sherry.

There is no doubt that the death of HRH Queen Elizabeth has recently been paramount in our thoughts. The London Bridge protocol suddenly became a reality. This required Mere to act in accordance with the protocol following the death of the Queen. This protocol was relevant to the whole country. I would like to thank Councilors, our Clerk and Groundsman for getting together so promptly to comply with this. I was very pleased to attend a Memorial Service, for the Queen, at St. Michael's on 18th September and I have written to the King offering our condolences on behalf of the Council and residents of Mere.

I am sure you are all aware that King Charles has served as the Duke of Cornwall for many years. This dukedom now passes to Prince William, who we hope will be visiting the Duchy Estate in the near future.

#### Wiltshire Councillor ~ George Jeans Writes

I found it hard to take in what Mere Town Council chairman Lesley Traves was saying to me on Thursday 8<sup>th</sup> of September, The Queen has died. I always had enormous respect for Her Majesty's duty and service to this country. Queen Elizabeth visited Mere in the 1950s, I have a picture of the event, with my cousin John as a small boy and his mum amongst the many welcoming her in The Mere Peace Memorial Recreation Ground. A

t the Service of Thanksgiving for the life of the Queen on Sunday 18<sup>th</sup> September, General David Leakey gave some 'Reflections of the Life of the Queen'. His address included this anecdote: "The Queen once asked a newly elected Member of Parliament how she liked her new job. The MP responded that she felt that she had little power to help her constituents. The Queen replied understandingly, "Once they find out that you lot can't help them, they all write to me"." This made me think of the number of times Councillors such as myself also cannot directly help their electorate, however often councillors can influence decision making and directly help their electorate.

I would like to thank Glen Ings and Mere Town Council staff for all their help with the Union Flag on Castle Hill recently, one morning Glen and myself met on the hill at 6-30am.

The latest news and also to ask questions regarding the future for Ukrainians who have settled in Wiltshire, were or will be discussed depending when this is read, on, Wednesday 28 September at 5:30pm and will be an opportunity for people to find out more information and ask questions on the support available in the county. Latest figures show 2875 households have registered for the Homes for Ukraine scheme and currently 609 sponsors have been matched with 1561 individuals. There have been 344 school places offered with a further 11 applications being processed.

A Wiltshire Council charity cycle-ride took place Thursday 22nd September, to raise funds for The Royal Marsden Cancer Charity and Wiltshire's Dorothy House Hospice. 50 riders from Wiltshire Council, along with public sector partners and Landmarc, took part in either a 30-mile route or a 100-mile route around Wiltshire, both starting and finishing at County Hall, Trowbridge.

Highways problems are often top of my agenda. Upper Water Street has been closed for 2 days in late September to survey and clear the drains. The workers on site informed me they had removed build up from inside the drains. Where the

B3092 meets the B3095 at "Gillingham Corner", the white lines are practically non-existent and I have requested they are repainted.

Although Mere suffer many of the traffic problems that other Towns do Country wide, I continue to ask for the best we can have. I travel a reasonable amount to varied destinations, for Council, Post Office meetings and my business, I see parking in places that were not previously used, increasing over the decades. The car is still required especially in rural areas, I am still pursuing public electric vehicle charging points for Mere and a electric car club that could benefit Mere and indeed the villages around, at present both are on track.

I received this message from Wiltshire Council, "Something to consider August 21 – September 17 you compromised your nightly recharge on 4 days last month by working past midnight. Ensure optimal nightly recharge by protecting the golden sleep time period (12am-5am) from work related activities.", best I do not comment publicly regarding this message, perhaps no more than "you are being watched". It is eight minutes past midnight at present while I write this.

I reported last month, further fibre broadband is finding itself around the area by at least four broadband infrastructure providers operating or trying to operate in the Mere area. Have you or someone you know considered fostering? Wiltshire Council still campaign to find more foster carers for children in Wiltshire. Fostering with your local council means all money is spent on frontline services and the child is more likely to be able to stay close to their school, friends and family networks.

Some Post Offices are closing or reducing the branch service around the south west, they provide a social function as well as a service including some banking services for many. I note from information I have from The National Federation of Sub-postmasters (NFSP) more banks are closing in the towns around us or reducing the days they open, for example the Halifax, Warminster on the 1st November, 2022, another reason the local Post Offices are required to provide a banking service to those that require it.

#### Removal of ITV Streaming on Humax and some other boxes

ITV are about to remove their broadcasting hub services from FreeSat and FreeView boxes. So, if you are a devotee of ITV programs you will have to get another box or stream the service over the internet via a computer. This is all because ITV are making enhancements to their broadcasts and older style 'boxes' cannot manage the new format.

#### Mere Rivers Group Quarterly Nature Notes (covering Oct - Dec)

Having stated in our last Nature Notes that we hoped the weather would be kind to us this summer, it is hard to decide whether it was kind or cruel. Certainly we had a very sunny one but it was too dry and too hot for our wildlife. People who have ponds in their gardens or bird baths were providing a vital lifeline to birds, insects, and mammals such as hedgehogs. Those of us who have wild areas including long grass, hedges and dense flower planting will have provided food and shade. As stated in our September article on the state of our streams, although they were very low they did continue to flow enabling the fish, invertebrates, mammals and insects to survive the drought.

Thank goodness the rain finally arrived in September. Anyone who went walking, just after the rain, would have smelt the wonderful freshness in the air as the soil soaked up the water. It has been wonderful to see the grass become green again and other plants put on a growth spurt.

Now it is October and autumn is here. We're sure everyone will have noticed what a bumper year it is for fruit, berries and nuts, in fact the Woodland Trust has said this will be a Mast year, which is the collective term for a bumper year for nuts and berries. This is brilliant news for our wildlife after such a bad summer. It means there will be plenty of food for the migrating thrushes, i.e. fieldfares and redwings when they arrive later in the season. Other birds returning to us after breeding are kingfishers and little egrets so look out for them when you are walking along our streams. Finally check the ivy flowers and see what insects have been attracted to its pollen. You are likely to see butterflies, including the red admiral, bees and hover flies all taking the opportunity to have a feast before winter sets in.

Autumn is a wonderful time of year for colour and wildlife activity so we hope you have the time to get out and enjoy it, both along our streams and in our surrounding countryside.

#### Letter from the Churches

The nights are drawing in. There is already more night than day, and by the end of this month the clocks will have fallen back to give us those long dark evenings. Added to this, some of us won't be able to afford to make those evenings warm and cosy. As I look out of the window the sun is bright but the shadows are long and the air has a chill to it, and it is already hard to believe in those long hot days of summer

Nationally and internationally, everything seems to be getting darker. The long summer of our Queen Elizabeth's reign is over, and what lies before us looks uncertain, fraught with many a danger. At the other end of Europe there is a war raging which could expand to engulf us all. And our hot summer, with wildfires, torrential rains, floods in Pakistan and elsewhere in the world, all indicate that global warming beginning to close its jaws; jaws that will consume us unless we take quick action.

But in a darkening world, we can still live well in caring for one another. There are, as always, temptations and opportunities. It is tempting to shut the night out, and huddle round our fires as long as we can. But the challenges that face us demand that we do the opposite, for they can only be faced in solidarity with everyone. One of Queen Elizabeth's great achievements was to establish a Commonwealth of nations that spans the earth. And one of our new King Charles Ill's priorities has been to alert us to the needs of our planet Earth. Together we can work out solutions to global warming: solutions that will partly be about self-restraint in our use of energy, and partly about new technology and developing new, sustainable energy sources.

The bright sun and long shadows bring to our gardens a different beauty from that of the other seasons. And this year there have been bright suns of progress. New telescopes have brought to light new truths about our universe, deep in space. And there have been several successes in harnessing thermonuclear energy, which is what powers the sun. One day (perhaps in a few decades) we may be able to light on earth a thousand little "suns" powered by hydrogen which is superabundant in the water of our oceans, producing helium, which is safe and inert and does not warm the globe.

The nights are indeed drawing in, in so many ways. But they are bringing closer that Christmas night when we will proclaim, "The Light shines in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it" and we will remember anew how the birth of a baby in dark and difficult times 2,000+ years ago brought the possibility of new life and new hope for all people.

Great news – we've removed the 9.30am time restriction on all concessionary bus passes, until Friday 31 March 2023.
