Mere Town Council

There is no doubt that over the last few weeks, the very hot weather has inevitably changed the landscape of Mere. Following the downpour of rain that we had in the middle of August, there was some localised flooding. The Town Council would be interested in recording these locations so that we could build a picture of the areas affected and inform those authorities and organisations that may be able to help in the future. Please let us know if you were affected. There is some information on the Town Council's website on 'What do I do if I get flooded' <u>https://merewilts.org/notices/what-do-i-do-if-i-get-flooded/</u> and if you are concerned about any blocked road gulleys that may cause highway flooding, please report these on the Wiltshire Council reporting page: <u>https://www.wiltshire.gov.uk/mywilts-online-reporting</u>

Cllr Kate Symonds, who is the Council's spokesperson on all river related issues reports that this exceptional dry spell has presented an obvious challenge to maintaining the flow of our two rivers, the Ashfield and the Shreen. We have a voluntary commitment by Wessex Water to limit abstraction of water, from Mere sources, for export to neighbouring areas when the flow drops below agreed levels. However Wessex Water tells us that since mid-July, in order to meet customer demand through the dry spell and heatwaye, export to Whitesheet reservoir has been occurring. In order to support stream flow this year the Ashfield Stream Support (SS) trial commenced on June 14th with water recirculated back to the source to try to maintain the flow. 2022 is proving to be a more challenging year compared to 2021 and the rate is being adjusted to hopefully maintain a stream flow at the flume. Observationally, the Shreen is still flowing, despite these pressures, though not at a level optimum for all the wildlife we would like to see. Let us hope that some steady Autumn rain will slowly replenish the flow. It seems that Wessex Water is fully aware of the need to maintain our streams and that they are attempting to do so despite the obvious pressures of this exceptional summer. Wessex Water do not intend a hosepipe ban, at the present time.

I am pleased to report that our newly appointed Groundsman took up his post in July and is settling into the job. Also taking up his position in July, our Project Coordinator has been very busy familiarising himself with the area and preparing substantial logistical information to enable the Council to see through the projects we have and propose to have for the benefit of the Town.

I am very much aware, through postings on social media and the correspondence we receive, that there are many residents in Mere who show an active interest in the work of the Town Council. We currently have 2 Town Councillor vacancies and would be delighted to hear from anyone interested in joining us. Do contact the office on 01747 860701 for more details.

Wiltshire Councillor ~ George Jeans Writes

I am pleased the Mere area has a good functioning fire and rescue service, Kelly Aplin who has joined as a much-needed member, I hear she has had high marks for her training, well done Kelly. I understand more members are still required.

Kilmington recently had a well-attended Parish Council meeting when a planning application consultation was discussed. I did not attend as I only attend the local villages planning applications when asked, then only to give facts. I try and support Town and Parish Councils. In the case of Mere Town Council, I again try to stick to facts if I speak and abstain when voting takes place. Then in my opinion I can then sit on a Wiltshire Council Planning Committee with an open mind on the local issues. As a councillor I have known recently of several local councillors (Mere and the surrounding villages) with interest of a pecuniary (money) or non-pecuniary nature being unsure how to act at a council meeting. I am not an officer and the following is as I would do. Pecuniary I believe is simple, do not vote and do not speak and leave the room. Leaving the room or not may be influenced depending on the council's code of conduct and standing orders. The decision in all cases of council standards is with the councillor, if the councillor calls it wrong the meetings decision may be void. Non-pecuniary interest is more difficult. For instance, if a councillor knows a local person that is impacted by the council's discussion, it is how it is perceived by the average person in the street. If the councillor is good friends with the person, then its best if the councillor withdraws from the meeting and perhaps sits in the public area. However, in the above situation if the person who is impacted by the council's discussion is only an acquaintance, meeting each other sometimes when passing etc., then the councillor could declare a non-pecuniary interest and speak and vote stating he is entering into the discussions with an open mind.

I have removed some Union Jacks which were put up for The Queen's Platinum Jubilee, however I have left some around Mere Square, I have noted many places have left The Union Jack flying. I have noted businesses as I have travelled around the south of the country, that have displayed the

Union Jack upside down, this applies when flown horizontally or vertically. 40 years ago when I was initially involved with flying flags, at that time on my own property, I would have been reprimanded for such an act. Now I see product and books sometimes with The Union Jack upside down.

On the 16th of August I returned home about 6PM, to find about 8 inches of water at the rear of part of my house and shop. I thought the drain was blocked at first, however it was not. The drains just could not take the volume of water. It came under 3 doors, entered part of my living accommodation getting under carpets. Inside it was getting under some roof tiles and staining an area of ceiling. Our front door has wood panels that must have shrunk in the heat, water was getting around the joints and entering the property. The water came under the shop door, however in that area it ran away between the open floor boards. I had

never known anything like it, I have lived in the property all my life. Penny Fennon my immediate neighbour records the rain fall locally and said 16 cm of rain had fallen in 24 hours, in less than two hours most of the rain fell mid to later afternoon, it is the first time our drains for the rear of the property would not take the surface water. I am informed Wood Farm had more than 3cms, Kilmington less than than 2.5cms. I was informed by a resident of Kilmington when turning at "Gillingham corner" noticed a very dark cloud over the centre of Mere. It was a record amount of rain for me and I was contacted by several who were affected. As I have said before highway drains drain are intended to drain the highway only and not private property. The law allows for highway run off on to private property. I am now going to get storm boards fitted as a resident has done in Water Street Mere. It is a rubber type seal in front the door that a board in pushed into, in times of storm.

Further fibre broadband is finding itself around the area, it has just been installed commercially at Whitemarsh, Mere. I am aware of at least four broadband infrastructure providers operating or trying to operate in the Mere area.

An elderly resident from Stourton contact me. He said he has to walk about a metre out in the road as the verge is cambered that the growth forms on, he said he is faced with vehicles coming towards him further in the road than normal. I asked on the grounds of road safety was any cut going to be made in this area before September and I was informed no. The Wiltshire Council have been good and responded to my request for verge cutting on dangerous junctions during the summer months. Human life must come first and I still think their present verge cutting policy can be dangerous.

Wiltshire Council still campaign to find more foster carers for children in Wiltshire. Wiltshire Council's fostering team will and have been visiting key sites and enlisting the support of businesses, charities, faith leaders and organisations to highlight the need for more foster carers in the area. Fostering with your local council means all money is spent on frontline services and the child is more likely to be able to stay close to their school, friends and family networks.

At the time of writing along with the rest of southern England, our streams are struggling in this hot and dry weather.

The Shreen is dry just upstream from Steep Street and the Ashfield is only just running but only with the help of stream support. Wessex Water are now pumping 1.5 million litres a day into the Ashfield at its source which means there is water in the mill pond at Burton.

But it's not all bad news, the birds love these low flows they are finding food in areas they could not reach before, even Blackbirds are catching bannytickles (fresh water shrimp) and small fish.

Thank you to the boys who were catching Sticklebacks and Bubbleheads and taking them down stream where there was more water.

July was the 2^{nd} driest on record with only 18% of average rainfall in the Wessex area.

The storage in Wessex Water reservoirs was at 56% so we need lots of rain.

Letter from the Churches

Mere has a new Catholic priest called Fr. Francis Eyo, who is based at St Luke and St Teresa Church, Wincanton. We're delighted to welcome Fr. Francis to our community, and we asked him a few questions about his life and mission.

Q. Can you tell us something about your family, and home?

I am from a lovely family of eight girls, and four boys, and growing up in this great family gave me lots of joy. We shared a common life and benefited from the support of our parents. Originally from Nigeria, I lived with my lovely parents and siblings in the southern part of the country known as Cross-River State, a beautiful coastal area, endowed with abundant seafood and fertile land for agriculture.

Q. How and why did you decide to become a priest?

The inspiration to become a catholic priest came after I completed college. I was inspired by the faith of my parents who were committed Catholics and through them I had



contacts with some of the priests from the local parish community who encouraged me.

Q. Why did you choose the name Francis as a priest?

My parents gave me the name Francis at my Baptism. I discovered they really liked St. Francis of Assisi and his prayer for Peace. I grew up to like the prayer, "Lord, make me an Instrument of your Peace ...", often said by my parents during the family morning prayer. I felt inspired by the life of St. Francis when I read his stories, and so I retained the name Francis as a priest. My parents are now deceased and may their souls and all the faithful departed rest in peace, amen.

Q. In what other communities have you served?

I have deep interest in parish ministry, and I have a rewarding and fruitful ministry experiences in many Catholic parishes, schools, and communities where I have served in about twenty years. I worked in Nigeria, the Gambia, Senegal, Wales, and England, in Kent, Slough and London as parochial vicar, parish priest, school manager, foundation governor, youth chaplain, spiritual director/counsellor, pastoral team leader, administrator, and community project supervisor.

Q. What are your hopes and plans for the parish?

The Parish Community in Wincanton, and the surrounding communities, such as Mere, have many good and wonderful people, and I am happy to serve as the parish as parish priest since May 1st 2022. So far, my ministry in the parish is bearing fruits and I can see the joy participation of many in the weekly liturgical celebrations and other church activities. I hope for the very best with the wonderful people of the parish. There is willingness to participate, and it is my prayer and hope that the good Lord will build us into a great Eucharistic Family, united in faith, love, and service.

Q. What is your message to local residents?

We are a friendly and welcoming community of Jesus; all are welcome in this place of worship and friendship. As friends of Jesus, we have so much to learn from one another.
