

Mere Town Council

The March meeting of the Town Council was preceded by the AGM of the Carnival Committee. Unfortunately, recently, there has been real uncertainty about the future of the Carnival. Committee members were dwindling and there seem to be a lack of support, generally, for new members. I am pleased to report, however, that an open meeting arranged at The Walnut Tree, brought forth some interested parties and it has been possible to form a new committee, with all officers confirmed at the AGM, thus enabling the Carnival to go ahead this year. I must thank everyone involved, past and present, willing to give their time to organise this annual event.

The Mere Rivers Group met on March 16th to hear a presentation by Wessex Water on The Progress of the Stream Support Project, which recycles local water to ensure our rivers do not run dry in the summer. The meeting was well attended by Rivers Group members and representatives of the Town Council, the Environment Agency and the Duchy of Cornwall. Stream Support for the Ashfield has been in place for over a year - enabled by the Duchy of Cornwall who facilitated the necessary pipework to convey water from the Mere borehole up to the source of the Ashfield, just to the north of the A303. The recycled water has meant that the mill pond did not run dry through the summer. Now that it has proved a success, work will begin to do the same for the Shreen-aiming to be in place by 2024.

I reported last month that the refurbishment of the Play Park next to The Walnut Tree was due to commence next month. On the back of this, our Project Coordinator contacted the school and they agreed to organise a competition, where the children were asked to draw a playground, with the winning picture to be put on a sign for the park. There were many excellent entries, which were judged by local children's author Kathryn Lamb. Congratulations to the winner Liberty Raynes in Year 4. The picture and sign will be unveiled when the park is officially re-opened in May.

As you know, the Town Council has signed into an Environment Stewardship Scheme for Castle Hill & Long Hill which has been very successful, largely due to the goat grazing on the hills. I can report that there has very recently been a change of goat ownership and the day-to-day management of the goats on the hills will now be undertaken by Neil Maitland and I am sure that Neil will be posting some information about this in due course. In the meantime, Stephen Horn, our previous goat farmer, has written to the Council asking us to pass on his appreciation to all members of the public that have offered assistance with the goats and communicated with him to pass on information as to their frolics and antics.

Also, last month, I informed you that it was necessary for me to authorise the closing of the public toilets in the Salisbury Street Car Park between dusk and dawn, due to the abuse and vandalism of this amenity. This was to be for a trial

period and has been successful in reducing the vandalism. The longer term opening times of the toilets will be on the agenda for discussion at the next Town Council meeting.

The grass cutting season is upon us and as you can imagine this takes up a lot of the groundsmen's time over the Spring and Summer months. Every year the Council has to review the condition and serviceability of our machinery. Inevitably, even with regular servicing and maintenance, machines come to the end of the road and have to be replaced. This year it was necessary to buy a tractor and we are currently appraising the need for new mowing machinery.

Now that the events season will soon be with us, we expect to see lots of advertising posters on posts throughout the town, proving what a vibrant place Mere is. While we are happy to support anyone who needs to advertise, can we please remind whoever puts up a poster that they are responsible for taking them down once the date has passed. Anyone should feel free to remove a tatty poster.

There will be a Coronation Service at St. Michael's Church on May 7th at 11am. The Town Council has ordered bunting and flags to erect in the town for the Coronation weekend.

I hope to see you at the Annual Town Meeting at the URC on April 26th, starting at 7pm.

Wiltshire Councillor ~ George Jeans Writes

Wiltshire Council is investing an extra £333,000 each year until 2024/25 to empty gullies and help prevent flooding in the county. The investment, which is in addition to the £1.27m the council spends annually on emptying gullies, is being spent on an extra combination jet vacuum unit that allows the council's highways teams to focus on problem areas throughout the county that are at most risk of flooding. The council currently uses three gully tankers that empty gullies on main roads each year, and those on all other roads once every three years. The new tanker that is being used thanks to this extra funding features a high-powered jetting facility that can blast through thick layers of silt and debris. Wiltshire Council's budget has been approved at Full Council. The budget confirmed at £466m for 2023/24 with £69m added into service budgets. The Council also outlines its budget plans right through to 2025/26. £13m of the council's reserves to be spent on business priorities, rather than required to help balance books. £1.1bn approved to be spent on capital projects over a number of years to improve and maintain the county's infrastructure The council is in a position to be able to allocate around £13m of reserves to spend on business priorities, particularly in supporting housing provision during the cost-of-living crisis. An increase of £1.57 per week for those in an average Band D property is now in place. Around 84% of the council's core funding comes from local taxes, business rates and council tax. The majority of funding goes towards the council's statutory services, which include adult social care and children's services.

During Eco Week some schools got involved with a range of different activities that contribute to the promotion of protecting our environment and eco-friendliness, as well as promoting recycling within schools and protecting the planet. Eco Week ran from the 6th March and aimed to raise awareness about important environmental issues.

After a member of the public entered a Trowbridge establishment to 'Ask for Angela', Wiltshire Council and its partners are emphasising the importance of night time safety and the measures in place to provide people with help and reassurance should they need it. The safety initiative 'Ask for Angela' is used in bars, clubs and other licensed businesses and aims to reduce sexual violence, whereby people who feel unsafe, vulnerable or threatened can discreetly seek help by approaching venue staff and asking them for 'Angela'. Any premises that has signed up for the scheme will display a poster, normally in the toilets. The phrase was recently successfully used in Trowbridge when a male customer used it to get the attention of staff members. Staff immediately understood that the gentleman was asking for assistance and kept the man safe until the police

arrived to deal with the situation. People can find out more about 'Ask for Angela' by going to www.wiltshire.gov.uk/article/1113/Ask-for-Angela.

98% of Wiltshire families have been offered one of their three secondary school preferences for this September, with 95% offered their first preference.

The £2 single bus fare promotion has been extended until 30 June, so people in Wiltshire can enjoy cheap and convenient travel until the summer. Most bus services are included in the promotion, including services operated in Wiltshire.

Two Government schemes that have recently launched to help people who haven't yet received automatic financial assistance from any energy support scheme. Government's Energy Bills Support Scheme (EBSS AF) The Government scheme is now open to all eligible households until 31 May 2023. Support under EBSS AF may include those in the Mere Area. Applications are made directly to the Government, not to or via Wiltshire Council. For those who do not have online access, they can apply via a contact centre on 08081 753287. The Government has also announced a 'sister' scheme called Alternative Fuels Payment (AFP) for people that use alternative fuels for heating. People may be eligible for a £200.

Improvements to the Rights of Way from Clements Lane to Angel Lane and on to the centre of Mere is still progressing and a grant application for £35k has reasonable expectations of being achieved from Wiltshire Council. This hopefully will make some of the south of Mere more safely accessible to the centre.

From Money Matters to Gardening: a range of Multiply, numeracy courses are now on offer across Wiltshire. People looking for help with their budgeting, spreadsheets or basic maths skills can benefit from the latest free courses being offered as part of the Multiply programme. Wiltshire Council was awarded £2.1 million of funding from the government's UK Shared Prosperity Fund, offering tailored courses targeted at adults (over 19 years of age) who do not currently have Level 2/GCSE maths at grade 4 (previously known as a C grade). Wiltshire College are running Basic Maths Courses in a number of locations across Wiltshire. Wiltshire Citizens Advice providing support with money and budgeting to assist with the current cost of living crisis. With the Coronation of His Majesty The King and Her Majesty The Queen Consort taking place in under eight weeks, Wiltshire Council wanted to send out an update that can be shared with anyone planning events to mark the occasion. Information on the coronation is available at https://coronation.gov.uk/ There are two main events where community participation is being encouraged – Coronation Big Lunch on Sunday 7 May and The Big Help Out on Monday 8 May.

The Big Lunch is made possible by The National Lottery, that brings millions of people together annually in June (but this year moved to coincide with the Coronation), boosting community spirit, reducing loneliness and supporting

charities and good causes, with £22m raised last year. Whether it's a full-blown street party, a picnic or a small gathering over a cup of tea and something to eat, the idea is simply to meet and have fun together over food. Event holders are encouraged to register their events and claim a free Big Lunch Pack containing invites, posters and digital resources, as well as entertainment ideas at Organise a Big Lunch | Eden Project Communities and https://www.gov.uk/government/publications/your-guide-to-organising-a-

street-party. The Mere Town Council have agreed to support flags on the entrance roads and streets of Mere.

Guidance around events and the licences/applications required for events is available on www.wiltshire.gov.uk/highways-special-event-road-closures and Wiltshire are asking for applications to be sent in by 31 March, an extension of more than two weeks on the original date provided, to give the highways teams enough times to approve with the required consultation periods. Information about The Big Help Out is found at The Big Help Out, with further details released after the 20 March.

Wiltshire have a number of single adult males staying at a Home Office contingency hotel in Wiltshire. The asylum seekers are from a number of countries. The government has determined that every local authority area must take a proportion of asylum seekers. The hotel is providing accommodation with security and welfare staff on hand.

Wiltshire Council has been successful in securing more than £3.6m of Government funding, which will help go towards increasing the energy efficiency of existing housing in the county. It will be spent on retrofitting up to 210 Wiltshire homes by March 2025. This additional funding will allow the council to support retrofit for owner occupied and privately rented homes that are not connected to mains gas and are EPC band D-G subject to household income levels. Fostering with your local council means all money is spent on frontline services and the child is more likely to be able to stay close to their school, friends and family networks. On my travels I note this campaign is not just limited to Wiltshire


Mere Drama Society presented A



It is within the power of our Town Council to impose a 20 mph speed limit, yet they voted against it last year.



Mere Rivers Group

Mere Rivers Group recently held a meeting with Wessex Water, primarily to discuss the effect of stream support on the Ashfield, also the planned stream support on the Shreen. Present at the meeting were representatives of the Environment Agency, Duchy of Cornwall, Wiltshire Wildlife, CPRE and Mere town council

Stream support on the Ashfield has been in place for two years. When required the input is 1 million a day. If natural flows are sufficient this is switched off.

Through the summer of 2022, one of the driest on record, the mill pond at Burton had water, where in previous years it would have dried.

One concern in the trial was that water would be lost through the bed of the stream but this proved not to be the case, 75% of the water was still flowing at White Bridge, therefore achieving the objectives of Wessex Water and deemed a success.

The project for stream support on the Shreen is now in the design phase and projected to go ahead late summer, early autumn of 2023, ready to be operating in 2024.

This has been made possible with the support and co-operation of the Duchy of Cornwall.

We wait with anticipation that we will have a constant flow all year in both Mere streams. This should benefit and encourage more diversity of our wildlife.

It is one of my greatest pleasures showing new, potential parents around our school especially when some of these parents came to Duchy Manor Middle School for their education. We spend a lot of time talking about what Duchy Manor used to be like and how the building has changed. It makes me feel quite old!

We were so grateful to the Mere community for the patience shown when all the building works were being completed – I know there were some significant traffic issues and walking across the Duchy Manor Field was difficult also.

I am still working with the Local Authority and builders to solve several issues but on the whole the extension works have been a huge success and we have a spacious, well cared for building and excellent outside facilities.

I know that our school is the envy of many schools regionally and nationally. We have a modern building on an attractive site and our children benefit from the unlimited access we have to the Duchy Manor Field for sport. We have a large hall for gymnastics, dance and theatrical productions and our pupils enjoy hot, nutritious meals (made on site from locally sourced, fresh produce) from our school kitchen. Mere School currently consists of 9 well-equipped classrooms, a specialist languages room, a music room, a DT room, a library and hall as well as offices and staff room. Our school grounds include a hard playing surface area and an astroturfed area with a good variety of play equipment for all ages. There is a quiet area, school garden, science area, reception play area and a pond – much of which have been provided by our active Friends Association from their fund raising activities.

Many ex-pupils have expressed a wish to look around the school but this can be difficult due to safeguarding. However, members of the community are more than welcome to our termly Open Mornings when you can come and see the school 'in operation'. Easter Letter from the Churches

If you have been following the Philip Pullman trilogy "His Dark Materials" on TV or have read the original books, you will remember that the climax of it all comes as the heroine, Lyra and her friend Will resolve to cross the river into the land of Death. Lyra has to leave behind her 'daemon' Pantalaimon, the animal representing her soul, crying out to her from the shore, as she goes seeking a childhood friend, Roger. She travels through a land of soulless caverns and corridors, where people move mechanically, like zombies. She is not certain that she will achieve her goal, or whether she will find a way out from Death. But in the event, she is able to lead Roger and all the other departed out toward the light, and restore to all the worlds the life-giving imaginative power of Dust.

Philip Pullman was no friend of God. He parodied the institutional Church as the sinister Magisterium that seeks to eliminate all vestiges of freedom and imagination in order to make a land of conformity and uniformity. However, the Church is not the only regime which the Magisterium resembles. We can think of many examples today of states that worship war and death, seek to subjugate weaker states, and are careless even of the lives of their own fighters. And it is interesting that when he wishes to put forward his vision, Pullman, presumably unintentionally, uses the story of Jesus and his journey through death to new life as the basis for Lyra's similar journey.

Like Lyra, I believe, Jesus went to his death not knowing where it would lead. Many ancient songs and icons of the Church tell of his journey into the underworld, where he goes to take Adam by the hand and lead him and all his descendants upward towards the light. So through his courage in facing his own death, Jesus leads us all to resurrection and freedom. That is the Easter message the Churches celebrate at this time.

To be sure, death – our own, or that of loved ones – is a daunting prospect. Nobody knows very clearly where it leads us. But if there is any truth in the resurrection story, we do not need to be afraid. We do not need to kowtow to the regimes that threaten people with prison or death unless they conform. We can live in courage and hope, that in the darkest times there is always a way to the light, and that we have been given a loving guide to help us find it.



Night time safety measure to help keep you safe

The safety initiative 'Ask for Angela' is used in bars, clubs and other licensed businesses and aims to reduce sexual violence. People who feel unsafe, vulnerable or threatened can discreetly seek help by approaching venue staff and asking them for 'Angela'.

The phrase will indicate to staff that they require help in their situation and a trained



staff member will assist them to safety. Any premises that has signed up for the scheme will display a poster, normally in the toilets.

Bars, restaurants, cinemas, and other night-time venues are also being encouraged to sign up to the Safety at Night Charter, developed by the Office of the Police and Crime Commissioner for Wiltshire and Swindon in partnership with Wiltshire Police, Wiltshire Council and Swindon Borough Council.
