Mere Town Council

I hope that you have picked up this edition in time to see the Christmas Tree light up in the Square and the parents and youngsters lining up to see Santa in the Clock Tower, compliments of Mere Carnival. I know that, these days, with the comings and goings throughout the day of shoppers, deliveries and passers by, the Square can be somewhat fraught but it deserves our best efforts to keep it calm and polite. The Museum has pictures of The Square over the years and they too are often busy but in other ways. The Square was the scene, on the 12th November, of an act of Remembrance and at a well-attended ceremony, poppies were presented by representatives of many groups.

I was at the AGM of the Friends of Mere Museum and it was pleasing to hear about the funds raised and to see the latest exhibition, featuring an informative display about six families of Mere. Well worth a visit. I was able to attend the AGM of

Seeds4Success, my apologies for being late, where we were presented with the many accomplishments of young people in the area, ably assisted by the staff and trustees – my congratulations to them all.

An agreement has been signed between econetiQ, Wiltshire Council and Mere Town Council to fund and install a cutting-edge 120kW DC Fast Maxicharger in the Salisbury Street Car Park. It is envisaged that this Electric Vehicle charger will get used by the community and will also be another facility for people to use when they are travelling along the A303 and looking for somewhere to stop off and charge their vehicle. Hopefully, they will use other facilities in the town as



well and help to boost the local economy. It is expected that this ambitious initiative will come to life in early 2024, pending completion of work between econetiQ and the distribution network operators (DNO)

The Town Council meeting in November dealt with many of the regular matters but spent some time looking at setting priorities for the future. Some of these will be funded by section 106 money received as a result of housing developments in the town but others will be funded through our precept, paid by residents of the town. It is important that we get this right and make the best use of this funding. Later in the month a group of councillors will look in detail at the spending and income forecast for the coming year and come up with a recommended precept. This is a considerable task with over 400 budget headings and a report compiled by our clerk consisting of over 19 pages of information. The meeting is managed by our Vice-Chair who prepares for it well in advance. Separate groups of councillors have also met to look at the future of Mere Chamber of Trade and to look at the use of Town Council land for leisure activities and how to make it the best provision that we can afford. I detail all of this to try and encourage you to put your name forward at the next election due to be held in May 2025. It is important work, and like all important work, worth doing. In the meantime – do come along to a council meeting to see local democracy in action and, in the public session, put your point of view.

Wiltshire Councillor ~ George Jeans Writes

The Remembrance Service was on Sunday 12th November, held around the War Memorial. I felt honoured to be able to lay a wreath as Wiltshire Councillor and the South West Wiltshire Area Board chairman Cllr Nabil Najjar, was in attendance also laying a wreath. I attended the service afterwards at St Michael's Church. During the two minutes silence while thinking of others I was also aware just how lucky I have been not to have to live amongst conflict. It was nice to see many youth laying wreaths and spray.

I attended the AGM of Seeds4Success, this year was their 10th year since first being established as a registered charity in July 2012, and their first full year as a Charitable Incorporated Organisation (CIO). Jaki Farrell, Charity Director said

"Now, with the longer-term negative impact of the Covid-19 pandemic on children and young people clearly emerging, and an ongoing economic recession and cost of living crisis, we must continue to reach out to those families who are feeling the pressure the most. We know the social and educational development of children and young people has suffered and we are working hard to continue to provide opportunities which respond to these increasing needs. All families are feeling a financial squeeze but for those in rural communities this is greater. For many, running a car is not a luxury, it is essential to enable access to work or education and ongoing high fuel costs are placing additional stress on already struggling households. Social isolation, heightened anxiety and either over stretched or under-funded support services have created an environment where increasing numbers of young people are struggling to engage with formal learning and positive leisure time activities."

I personally find Jaki one of the best Youth Leaders I have ever known and we are very lucky to have her in this area along with her team. Many volunteers, trustees and peer leaders; individuals and families, town/parish councils and community groups are enabling Seeds for Success to sustain this local youth charity. The sizable grants they win is impressive.

Unfortunately, the retail outlets of Mere are declining further but that is not to say there are not many more and increasing numbers of businesses. On occasions the Mere Chamber of Trade has helped more than traders over the decades. Time moves on and the local "Jelly Group" that meets at present at Visit Hill Brush appeal to many working from home etc. I have attended a meeting where both bodies are consulting with each other. I am pleased Mere has such an active collective of business discussion.

With the government's uplift programme for Police, Wiltshire now have 150 more officers than two years ago and the most police officers Wiltshire Police has had in more than a decade. To my knowledge we have a shared PCSO for Mere and less Police than I understand could be provided. I have witnessed the damage from local vandalism which I believe is higher than it was and not all of it is officially recorded. I will continue to call for an increased Police presence in the Mere division.

Wiltshire Council is reminding residents that it continues to provide support to people during the ongoing cost-of-living crisis. Although energy prices have dropped slightly and now we are again being informed of further increases, and inflation has reduced, both remain much higher than in previous years. With interest rates continuing to be unpredictable, this will undoubtedly put financial pressure on people throughout the county. Wiltshire Council has a range of support available to help make things a little easier and to provide support and advice to those who need it, including:

- Wiltshire libraries continuing as warm spaces
- Warm & Safe Wiltshire in place to help people live in warmer, safer and healthier homes
- An updated interactive guide to help people find key support
- Household Support Fund to directly finance and support a range of programmes and initiatives
- A range of online support and sign-posting information on topics including council tax/benefits, energy advice and mental health support
- Area boards continuing to look at ways to support their local community projects
- A dedicated Wiltshire Wellbeing support line to provide advice and guidance
- The council's FUEL programme to continue this winter
- Cheaper bus fares continue until December 2024

From Times Gone By!

Serious Trap Accident.— Whilst a pony and trap belonging to Mr. Abbott of Gillingham, containing two ladies, was standing at the side entrance of Mr. Walton's store, at Mere on Wednesday, a cart drawn by two horses turned out of Castle street; the wheel of the latter locked into that of the trap, wrenching it entirely away and seriously damaging the body and shafts. The ladies were thrown to the ground and the head of the pony was forced through the shop window, smashing two large panes of glass and overturning the whole stock of Christmas groceries displayed to view. The pony was much cut about the nose. With the exception of a few cuts and bruises and a severe shaking, the ladies fortunately escaped injury.

MERE. Christmas Treat at the Union Workhouse. – On Monday the inmates of the

union were supplied with roast beef and plum pudding through the kindness of the guardians, and in the evening a large Christmas tree was provided by the master and matron for the young folks, which they thoroughly enjoyed. Miss Grove, of Zeals House, with her usual kindness was present during the meal. The aged and infirm were treated with cake, tea, coffee, tobacco, snuff, &c.

Continuing with the Editor's suggestion of hearing from some of the people who use or drive for the Link Scheme. Gwil Hitchcock who has done both, wrote as follows. "Having lived in Mere since 1975, when I retired, I was wondering what I could do to be useful to the community as well as doing a bit of travelling. I had been with British Airways for 36 years round and round the world and if I was to be at home all the time it would not suit me to stay still. My wife Honey was doing some voluntary work at Brainwave and met Pat Dence, who was a co-ordinator for the Link Scheme and suggested that I join. I had met many of the people of Mere in between flights and was always struck with the warmth and friendliness of people here but actually knew only a few of them. It was a great joy and privilege to meet so many and have a good chat driving for the next 18 years. During the past four years I have been in and out of hospital and had many appointments at Salisbury. It has been a pleasure to meet so many of the Link drivers of today who have faithfully taken me over there. The Link Scheme is a tremendous blessing to Mere and district and. for anyone who is unable to get to appointments in their own transport, it is an absolute boon. We hope and pray that the Link Scheme will continue the good work for many years to come."

The Link Scheme is a local charity and our volunteer drivers take clients like Gwil to medical appointments, including Covid vaccinations, and even shopping when resources allow. Once you have an appointment please call 01747 860096 to book a Link driver. As a charity we do not charge for trips but ask for a donation.

With the Christmas and New Year holidays fast approaching we are happy to confirm that the Link will continue to take people to medical appointments over the holiday period. However, please note that our phone will **not** be "manned" on **25**, **26**, **27 December** and **1 and 2 January 2024**. If you have a medical appointment between these dates, please let us know by **21 December** if at all possible to give us the best chance of getting you a driver.

We did 92 trips in September and 93 in October so the monthly average for this year remains at 90 trips. As usual, Salisbury District Hospital was the most popular destination with a total of 53 trips over the two months. New drivers are always welcome. Just Around Our Corner

On Friday, 3 November, Dr Andrew Murrison, MP for south-west Wiltshire, visited the proposed site of a 200-acre timber plantation in the Cranborne Chase Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty (News, 1 November).

The plantation, planned to cover grade two arable farmland, is currently going ahead having had no environmental impact assessment or any community engagement. This breaks rules set out by

the Forestry Commission (FC), the very body that is pushing the project ahead.

Dr Murrison has written on behalf of his constituents to Defra minister Thérèse Coffey and the FC, asking them to pause proceedings until they have conducted the correct impact assessments and followed due process.

In 2020 the FC chair, Sir William Worsley, admitted that the FC had made mistakes sanctioning private landowners to plant forestry at Berriers End in Cumbria. He assured the public that lessons had been learned from those failures in the consultation process.

A spokesperson for the **Save Bonham Farmland Action Group** said: "The failure of process here has resulted in a plan that is not good for the environment and brings nothing to the local community. We are losing good arable land and a distinctly beautiful, historic landscape."

<u>The Suchana project</u> in West Bengal continues to bring surprises. Having grown from a handful of local children meeting for help with basic language and literacy skills in



the house of Kirsty and Rahul Milward-Bose in 2004 it now has its own two-story building and offers classes for pre-schoolers and supplementary education for those at school at all stages, as well opportunities (not otherwise available for these children) in sport and creative activities and basic healthcare. It majors especially at present on enabling 'adivasi' children to begin their education in their own mother tongue, developing special books and teaching materials and even supporting government schools in beginning to use this approach. Suchana now reaches almost 2000 children in 25 small villages – and, indirectly – far more. The centre is open 10 hours a day 7 days a week and 340 days a year and sends out a mobile library every week to further-away villages. The people of Mere have helped a great deal in all this work and remarkable expansion through supporting our fund-raising activities which have provided a significant amount of Suchana's annual income. An example of this generosity is the £549.99 given for Suchana in donations at the excellent talk by Colonel Blashford-Snell on 1st November.

Early in 2024 – and this is the surprise – Suchana is holding a 3-day conference for teachers, parents and current and former students to take stock of all that has been achieved in the past 20 years and to make plans for development over the next 5 years. Suchana's unique approach and expertise is now widely recognised and, as a result a Delhi-based consultant who likes to cross-fertilise organisational strategies between the corporate and the non-profit worlds is coming to help with this exercise.

Although the Mere support group is winding-down its big fund-raising activities, we feel confident that the project will continue to grow and develop with more local funding and support. As we go to press, we are preparing for our Pre-Christmas Quiz at the end of October. There will then be a coffee morning at **Grove Cottage** from **10.30am on Tuesday 30th January**, and finally, our very popular **Shrove Tuesday Quiz and Pancake evening on 13th February**.
