As we embark on 2023, I wish you all a better year ahead. The weather has already made a harsh statement with copious rainfall as well as being very cold. The Council is not aware of any domestic flooding but we have had some drain blockage, which we have reported to Wiltshire Council

I have today spoken to our library. The library is a designated Warm Hub, where everyone is welcome. The staff were eager to point out that visitors are not expected to sit and read a book and keep quiet. There are puzzles, games and magazines and conversation is encouraged. There is no restriction on how long you stay. Also available is a free Warm Pack consisting of a blanket, hot water bottle and thermal cup. The library is open on Monday 10am -7pm, Tuesday 9-30am -5pm, Wednesday 10am-2pm, Thursday 9-30am-5pm, Friday. 9-30am -5pm and Saturday 9-30am-1pm. Please use this excellent warm facility.

The end of the year is a particularly busy time for the Council. Our Clerk prepared all the necessary facts and figures for our interim internal audit and I am pleased to say that an independent internal auditor was satisfied with the result. Also, in November, we held our annual Budget setting meeting. This is always a challenge and especially this year with such rising costs. After much analysis we agreed on a 6.5% increase on our precept. This equates to an annual rise of £9 on a Band D property. In order to do this, we had to resort to using some of our reserves. We are aware that other local councils have applied far larger increases but for this year, at least, we have managed to keep it down. The Council has since approved the Budget recommendations.

At the January meeting we considered a planning application (no.PL/2022/09365) for the siting of a new factory with associated offices, car parking, access and landscaping on the site adjacent to the Quarryfield Industrial Estate. The applicant is Godminster, the cheese manufacturer. Mere Town Council recommended approval of this planning application but the site is actually within the parish of Zeals and Zeals Parish Council will also be submitting a consultation response to the Planning Authority.

I must thank Cllr. John Jordan, who has applied for funding from the Wiltshire Town's Programme which can be used to attract more visitors to Mere. If successful, we hope to use some of the funding to provide wider internet information about Mere and enhance the Red Arrows Trail as well as amenities for visitors. Some funding may be offered to groups to attract more participants to events which they have planned. Groups will be contacted, with information, once the funding has been approved.

As you may have heard the Palace has issued its official agenda for the weekend of celebrations for the Coronation of King Charles. The Coronation ceremony will be at Westminster Abbey on May 6th. On Sunday May 7th there is to be a concert at Windsor Castle and also on the 7th, A Coronation Big Lunch of street parties up and down the country. It will be followed on Monday 8th, the Bank Holiday, by the Big Help Out, a volunteer scheme devised in tribute to His Maiesty's many decades of public service. People will be encouraged to join volunteer projects, dedicating a few hours to help create a coronation legacy.

Mere Town Council is asking for volunteers to form a working group to organise Mere's Celebrations. Anybody interested, please contact the office (01747) 860701).

I am pleased to inform you that we have a new PCSO- Neil Turnbull. Neil will also cover the Tisbury area and I understand that there are at least 28 or so Parish Council's in his patch. He will try to attend some of our council meetings and hopefully we shall see him about town regularly. In an emergency or to report a crime, please ring 101 or 999.

Congratulations to Pat & Geoff Sams, who this year won the trophy for an outstanding display of Christmas lights and decorations.

Wiltshire Councillor ~ George Jeans Writes

In April 2022, the Elections Act 2022 was passed by the UK Parliament. The Act will require voters in Great Britain to show photo ID before being issued a ballot paper in polling stations. For more info see

https://www.electoralcommission.org.uk/i-am-a/voter/voter-id?gclsrc=aw.ds. The voter ID provisions are due to be in place for local elections in England May 2023 and at any UK Parliamentary election held after that date. The types of ID

2023 and at any UK Parliamentary election held after that date. The types of ID to be allowed are set out in section 5 of the Act. These include passports, photographic driving licences, biometric immigration documents and some concessionary travel passes. A new free voter document, to be called a Voter Authority Certificate (VAC), will be made available for those without any other form of photographic ID.

I have been informed in the past that if ten percent or more of a family income is spent on fuel they are in fuel poverty, with this in mind plus inflation, interest rate rises, the need to keep Wiltshire Council's proposed services budget for 2023/24 and the next three financial years is as follows:-

An additional £69m, before savings, added into the 2023/24 service budgets to cover inflation and demand for services. Over £42m of that additional spend will go towards services protecting the most vulnerable in society. The council's proposed budget for 2023/24 stands at £465m. It is legally obliged to set a balanced budget.

The most significant spending in 2023/24 will be on: Whole life pathway (mental health, autism spectrum conditions and learning disabilities support services) - £96m, an increase of £11m. Living and aging well (adult care) - £83m, an increase of £15m. Families and children -£63m, an increase of £2m. Environment (which includes waste and recycling services)- £48m, an increase of £4m. Highways and transport - £41m, an increase of £3m. Education and skills - £29m, an increase of £6m

The council is also in a position to release £13 million of reserves to spend on business priorities, particularly in supporting housing provision during the cost of living crisis.

Wiltshire Council is proposing a 2.99% general increase for the council's element of council tax, plus a 2% levy to be spent solely on adult social care. This will mean an increase of £1.57 per week for those in a Band D property. Around 84% of the council's core funding comes from local taxes, business rates and council tax. The majority of funding goes towards the council's statutory services, which include adult social care and children's services - with continued pressures and demands in those areas.

A number of other measures are proposed by the council during 2023/24, including an increase in some fees and charges for some council services such as leisure and garden waste collection; making better use of the council's own buildings, including letting space out where appropriate; and a more streamlined

Street Scene service. Staffing savings have also been identified across the next three financial years, and steps to deliver these will include the deletion of some vacant posts, managing spend on agency staff, and holding other vacancies temporarily. In addition, a freeze on incremental pay progression remains, as agreed last year with the recognised trade unions.

The council will continue to invest in the improvement and maintenance of the county's infrastructure, with almost £200m due to be spent on capital projects in 2023/24. Examples as follows

Fitness equipment for leisure centres - £986k
Council house build programme/refurbishment - £30.580m
Schools maintenance and modernisation - £8.268m
Installation of contactless parking machines £127k
Ultrafast broadband - £1.011m
Drainage improvements - £500k

The proposal of a balanced budget not just for 2023/24 but is over the three years of the Medium-Term Financial Statement.

The proposal sets out the Housing Revenue Account (HRA) budget for 2023/24 with associated increases in rents, service charges and garage rents, as well as the position of the Dedicated Schools Grant (DSG).

That the Council Tax requirement for the council be set at £332.187m for 2023/24 with a Band D charge of £1,719.90, an increase of £1.57 per week. Note Police, local Town and Parish precepts are extra to that above. A 7% increase is set for social dwelling rents, except for rents currently over the formula rent which will be capped at formula rent as per national guidance. That all service charges related to the Housing Revenue Account (HRA) to cover costs and garage rents are increased by 5%:

The Deposit Return Scheme (DRS) is where consumers will pay a deposit on in scope drinks containers which will be refunded through a national network of reverse vending machines at participating retailers and kiosks. This is expected to be in force in 2024 and will see a loss of recycling income to the council. An Act will require consistency in Recycling Collections which will stipulate that councils must provide separate, weekly food waste collections; free of charge fortnightly garden waste collection; separate kerbside collection of recyclables, and fortnightly residual waste collections. Wiltshire Council does not currently provide a separate food waste collection. Wiltshire generate £5.1m income from chargeable garden waste service which offsets costs of collection only. Separate, weekly Food Waste collections have been referenced to come into force in 2025.

Following EA guidance Persistent Organic Pollutants (POPs) found in upholstered domestic seating and managed as waste, have to be segregated at point of collection and sent for disposal by incineration and must not be landfilled. This new requirement is effective from 1 Jan 2023.

There is a proposal from Government to extend the Emissions Trading Scheme to include Energy from Waste plants. Energy from Waste plant operators would be required to buy credits to cover the fossil-based carbon emissions created by the plant. The Government is planning to tax commercial generators of electricity where excessive profits are made. At present Energy from Waste facilities are in scope. As seen nationally there have been significant increases in energy prices, and the 2023/24 budget is forecasting increases forecast at 11% for Electricity, 50% for Gas and 10% for Biomass.

The council pays Business Rates on its properties, this is forecast to increase by an average of 22% in 2023/24 due to an impending revelation which will come into effect in April 2023. The budget includes the continued resourcing of the Carbon Reduction Team, formed during 2020/21, and funding within the capital programme for specific schemes aimed at reducing the council's carbon footprint such as £4.964m investment in electric vehicle purchase.

The Council undertook borrowing of £80m in March 2022 ahead of the rise in interest rates to secure rates at around 2% to finance the capital programme and to mitigate the risk of having to borrow in future at a higher interest rate.

The new Service 3 bus to Gillingham I can recommend. Drops off and on several places in Gillingham, Zeals and Mere. Runs for much of the day, I used it, excellent. Use it or lose it I suspect.

Penny Fennon supplied me the rainfall figures for 2022 - 211.75 cm - wettest month Feb (28 cm), driest month July (3.5cm), wettest day Nov 23 (20cm). The previous years figures I have are as follows: 2018 - 283.5 cm, 2019 - 294.5 cm, 2020 - 358.5 cm, 2021 - 319.75 cm & 2022 - 211.75 cm.

Have you or someone you know considered fostering. Wiltshire Council still campaign to find more foster carers for children in Wiltshire. Fostering with your local council means all money is spent on frontline services and the child is more likely to be able to stay close to their school, friends and family networks. On my travels I note this campaign is not just limited to Wiltshire.

Cheaper Fares

Wiltshire bus users can now travel on most routes in the county for just £2 or less for a single fare until 31 March.

The fare price reduction has been funded by the Government, and is aimed at

getting more people to use buses across the country during the current cost of living challenges.

As part of the promotion, many single bus fares in Wiltshire have been capped at just £2 for both adults and concessions. If the single fare was originally less than £2, it will remain at the reduced price, and many day return tickets have also been reduced



Cllr Dr Mark McClelland, Cabinet Member for Transport, said: "This is a fantastic initiative to get more people using Wiltshire's buses, as the £2 single fare cap offers an affordable and easy way to get around the county.

"If more people choose to leave their car at home and take the bus, it will help to maintain bus routes in Wiltshire, as well as reducing congestion and carbon emissions, and improving air quality.

"As we have set out in our Business Plan, we want to have vibrant, well-connected communities here in Wiltshire, and buses are a key part of that.

"Most bus services in Wiltshire are included in this great value offer, so I'd urge people to save money and explore Wiltshire by bus this year."

The End Of An Era

Mere's only butcher traded for the last time on Saturday 3rd December 2022.



Pete Davie is the third generation of his family trading as a butcher. Pete hopes another butcher will acquire the business however after three generations Pete has decided to call it a day. Decades ago the shop boasted Birds Eye fish fingers which was quite something all those decades ago, how life has changed. The business has used the same egg supplier for around 80 years. Although it is the end of an era Pete hopes a butcher will return.

MP writes to health minister about dentistry.

Dr Andrew Murrison has written to Neil O'Brien MP, health minister responsible for dentistry, following his visit to a dental practice in his constituency on Friday and receipt of correspondence from across his South West Wiltshire constituency who have been unable to get an NHS dentist. Andrew is concerned about access to NHS dentistry in his constituency and the disincentivising caused by the way dentists have been remunerated since 2006 under a system called units of dental activity (UDAs). The current government have recognised the issue and are trying to reform UDAs to make NHS dentistry more attractive to dental surgeons. However, Andrew is concerned at the pace at which change is happening and has urged Mr O'Brien to redouble his efforts to ensure those in greatest dental need are able to find an NHS dentist.

Dr Murrison is also interested in how we can increase the number of dental surgeons in the system, noting the increase of the number of dental graduates in recent years. He has also asked the minister if dental nurses, hygienists and therapists can be trained and empowered to undertake more of the routine work currently undertaken by dental surgeons.

He said 'NHS dentistry has been in long-term decline, and we now need to ensure, particularly for those in highest dental need, that provision is improved, and that the NHS is an attractive place to work for all members of the dental professional team. I appreciate the work the government is currently undertaking to deal with the consequences of the previous government's changes to dentistry but believe there is more to be done to restore NHS dentistry to where it ought to be.'

Mere Surgery - additional services available to our patients in 2023

Our priority remains providing a dedicated team of GPs for our patients in and around Mere. For health problems please continue to call our reception (01747 860 001) who will ensure your needs are directed to the right health professional. You may remember that in 2019 our Patient Participation Group (PPG) undertook a survey of what health services our patients wanted as Mere continues to grow. The universal response was for more health and wellbeing services to be provided within Mere so that the need for travel was reduced. Despite a challenging period throughout Covid we have been working on what additional services we can offer in Mere. This work is ongoing (and must recognise the constraints of working within the modern NHS) however we are pleased to share the additional services that are now available to the patients of Mere Surgery in 2023 and welcoming back some which have returned in recent months.

Paramedic

Andy Wotton, a fully trained Paramedic has joined the surgery. You will recognise him in his green uniform. Andy manages the more urgent and acute presentations to general practice that require being seen on the same day. Andy will also be dealing with patients' initial discharge from hospital, managing minor injuries and home visits.

Hearing Aid clinic

This is held on the first Thursday of the month. It offers a service to patients for retubing/cleaning hearing aids and batteries. Patients can book appointments direct by contacting Gill Drayson on 01722 580014 or 07570 670 643

Diabetic Eye Screening

A monthly clinic offering patients a test to check for eye problems caused by diabetes. Patients are contacted direct and offered an appointment at the surgery.

Specialist Diabetes Nurse clinic

Crucial in providing good patient care and promoting self-care management, these monthly clinics take place on the third Wednesday of each month.

Breast Screening Unit

In late 2022 the unit visited for a period of two weeks and resulted in some of the highest attendance figures ever recorded in Mere.

Health and Wellbeing Coaches

Julia Cole works 2 days per week offering a Health and Wellbeing coaching service to support Mere Surgery patients in making changes to their lifestyle and behaviour. Working with patients with physical and/or low-level mental health conditions to improve their health. In early 2023 another Health and Wellbeing Coach will start to enable the surgery to provide an additional 2 days of service provision.

Elderly Care Facilitator and Age UK

Responsible for patients over 75 years of age, the Elderly Care Facilitator visits patients in their homes and liaises closely with the patient's family co-ordinating services and ensuring the patients' needs are met. In addition, the surgery has access to several Age UK staff who are able to assist completing applications for benefits or accessing different services for our patients.

Care Co-ordinator

Our Care Co-ordinator works closely with GPs in the surgery and our Elderly Care Facilitator however they mainly focus on the key younger age group.

First Contact Physiotherapist

A Physiotherapist is based in the surgery one day a week offering the opportunity to discuss musculo-skeletal problems. Following a telephone triage call, the First Contact Physiotherapist may recommend an appointment with them directly.

Pharmacy Team

As Sarum West Primary Care Network, we have appointed a team of Pharmacy Technicians to assist with monitoring medications. The team work remotely accessing patient records to ensure best practise for patients.

Online services

Patients can now use Airmid, a new App to access the surgeries online services. This is an alternative to NHS App or System Online and does not replace any of the traditional methods for contacting the surgery, booking appointments or requesting prescriptions.

Women's Health

We continue to hold specific clinics for Women's Health on a weekly basis dealing with matters such as contraception, menopause and HRT.

Minor surgery and Cryotherapy

These sessions are held on alternate weeks.

Mere Rivers Group Quarterly Nature Notes (covering Jan - March)

January to March are the months disliked by most people because they are cold and dark. However, they are some of the best months for seeing wildlife and in Mere we are fortunate in having a variety of wildlife habitats. These are the Downs, farmland, our waterways and, within a short drive or walking distance, the Stourhead woods. Last, but definitely not least, are our gardens.

Residents have said how many types of birds visit their feeders. These have included sparrows, members of the tit family, starlings, blackbirds, blackcaps and small flocks of long tailed tits. The wren is often seen scurrying amongst plants and in hedges. A sparrowhawk was seen in a garden, resting on the top of a feeder, causing panic amongst the other birds. Where people have left the seed heads on their plants goldfinches had been seen clinging to the plants, eating the seeds.

In January there was a week of beautiful bright and crisp frosty days. Hopefully there will be more of these days in both February and March. Wrapping up and walking on this type of day can be a treat. With no leaves on the trees and bushes, their shapes stand out clearly against the sky. Also, with no leaves on the trees, it is an ideal time for spotting treecreepers, goldcrest and nuthatch. All of these are difficult to see within the normal tree canopy. Listen out for the mistle thrush which has a lovely song, not dissimilar to a blackbird. The other name for this thrush is stormcock because it will even sing in stormy weather from the top of a tree.

To help cheer you up during these cold days look out the first sign of spring plants. The snowdrops bloom in February, after these come the lesser celandines and primroses, both cheerful yellow plants. Pussy willow catkins provide vital food for bees out foraging. The blackthorn will be the first blossom in the hedgerows.

Finally, back to our waterways. They are now at full flow again. Walking along the Shreen at Waterside you are likely to see the little egret and the kingfisher. Soon the ducks and moorhens will be having their young. At this time of year it is wonderful to be anticipating the joys of spring.
