Mere Town Council

At our September Town Council meeting the police were represented by Inspector Harmsworth who talked to councillors about how they will be working in our area. We are hoping that he will also contribute, each month, to Mere Matters to give you current information. It was pleasing to see a good police presence at the Mere Carnival and we are hoping that Mere has the reassurance of seeing police in our town and across the parish. While I mention the Carnival, a big thank you to the committee for the huge amount of work that they put in to make it happen and to all of the masqueraders, float builders and performers and majorettes who made the procession a delight for my old eyes and a great treat for the many youngsters along the route. I am retiring from the carnival team and hope that some of the people who watched the Carnival will join the committee to help with future years.

We heard from residents in the public session, which is an opportunity to put ideas and requests to all of the council. Do come to the meeting and tell the Council about what you would like to happen in Mere. After the public session there is an agenda space where we can discuss your ideas or comments. We will soon be setting our annual budget and before that looking at priorities for the coming year, so now is a good time to tell us what you think is important.

The Town Council is putting in requests for some improvements to signage and road marking to help make the flow of traffic safer for all road users to Wiltshire Council's LHFIG (Local Highway and footway improvement group) for this area. We will wait to see what can be agreed and then how much of the costs will be paid for out of our precept.

In September, I asked for residents to look after their hedges where they affect the footways and roads and it is pleasing to see some work being done, thank you. This month, I am following on from requests to help improve the state of the Shreen. I am a member of the Mere Footpath Group who have a long history of helping maintain paths around the parish for the benefit of residents and visiting walkers and know first-hand how volunteers can help improve our area. There was also a Mere Rivers Group but they are short of people to help. If you can help with some time and effort, please let me know or look further on in this issue to see their contribution and who to contact. Riparian owners (people who own land alongside rivers) have some responsibilities as well as privileges but they can benefit from some volunteers to help. Finally, we are part of Wiltshire and, like the town council, Wiltshire Council is planning for the future. The consultation for the Wiltshire Local Plan begins on Wednesday, 27th September, with in-person events being held across the county to enable communities to find out more. There are drop-in events around Wiltshire and a live webinar-style event on Microsoft Teams. People can just turn up to the in-person events, but they'll need to register beforehand for the online event which takes place between **6.30pm – 8pm on Tuesday, 10th October**. The Wiltshire Local Plan sets out the vision and framework for housing, infrastructure and land for employment growth for the next 15 years. Once adopted, all planning applications will be determined against the Plan, making it the most important place-shaping document for Wiltshire. The drop-in event closest for Mere residents will take place on Wednesday, 4th October between **3pm-7pm at The Nadder Centre, Weaveland Road, Tisbury, SP3 6HJ**. Wiltshire Councillor ~ George Jeans Writes

I am pleased to see that the dropped kerb by Mere Social Club has been reinstated along with the removal of the dip by Yapp Bros that held water, which splashed walkers. As I write the contractors are returning to further repair the area by Yapp Bros as the Wiltshire Officer who must be thanked, for noticing the contractor had not covered an area as large as was requested by Wiltshire Council, therefore the contractor must return at no cost to the council and finish the work requested.

I attended a resilience event in Tidworth, it was most interesting. I hope no flood water reaches any house however we had a demonstration that a polythene sheet is required behind the bags to make a near water tight seal. The possibility of National Power cuts was discussed, should this happen we were informed mobile phone transmission would only last for 30 minutes to 2 hours during a power cur. We were also informed copper telephone lines will now cease on 31st December, 2025. A new service called Voice can replace the traditional phone. A battery backup can be provided to all those in need. We were informed the battery would last two hours, in my opinion this is too short of a time, traditional phone lines in my experience during a power cut, functioned almost indefinitely. Kilmington Parish Council tried hard to get ultrafast full fibre broadband to all the village not just part as now is. Having entered into discussions with BDUK, Wiltshire Council have now put a hold on this. Dedicated providers were discussed, I understand Wessex will be offering a service in Mere, extending its

roll out early next year to some properties in the centre of Mere and eventually the whole of Mere, they already cover West Knoyle and other areas. Other providers may also offer a fibre service.

I stated last month "Note Wiltshire Council are now producing shared ownership properties as well as houses for rent." Wiltshire Council agreed a major investment to provide up to 250 homes to support long term housing need in Wiltshire. Some of these dwellings will be in Tisbury. Stone Circle was set up by Wiltshire Council, Stone Circle will provide these homes. Some of these will be rented and some private sale. Wiltshire Council is the 100% shareholder of Stone Circle and provides finance to the company.

Grants for highway and footpath improvements at the South West Wilts Area Board LHFIG meeting will not cover the number of improvements requested. It has now been decided that the Parish and Town Council contribution of 25% will not be increased, therefore I assume anymore highway improvement request for this financial year may not be approved. A £2.5K grant for Kilmington to provide a 30 MPH limit on The Common in effect was overlooked, however the necessary paperwork for TRO (Traffic Regulation Order) is proceeding, assurance was given at the SWWAB that the grant will be ratified from the existing budget.

The Police at the highest level were at the September Area Board, Inspector Kevin Harmsworth, Chief Constable Catherine Roper and Police and Crime Commissioner Philip Wilkinson. We hope to see improvement in communicating with the Police where its 101 for phone or reporting on the internet. The Police will make efforts to be more visible in the area. Volunteers are required for Police Stations which includes Mere. We will see a mobile Police Station (Van) in the near future. My request for a PCSO for Mere and not shared with other areas as we had previously a dedicated PCSO for Mere, appears will not materialize.

Mere Town Football Club was awarded £968.88, towards MTFC youth equipment (Youth Grant).

The 12th of December will see a Big Band Tea Party at The Nadder Centre Tisbury, celebrating age, look out for further information.

Wiltshire Council's Cabinet have agreed to invest a further £10m over the next two years into maintaining and resurfacing the county's roads. The £10m of extra funding, which is on top of the £14m the council will spend this financial year on highways maintenance, is being funded through the council's capital funding programme. The additional money will be spent on preventative maintenance and a road resurfacing programme including small, local repairs to the highways; verge repairs on rural roads and materials to support volunteers working on public rights of way. Work on potholes will continue in parallel, with £2m existing funds and the government's recent £3.6m additional grant. Wiltshire Council has dealt another blow to unlicensed scrap metal and waste collectors operating in the county as three people have been fined nearly £30,000 in total. Wiltshire Council has also issued £1,300 in fines to two businesses concerning waste related offences. On Friday 10 February 2023, Wiltshire Council received a complaint that black refuse bags of waste had been deposited in Royal Wootton Bassett High Street. Enforcement Officers attended the site and obtained evidence to a local business. The business operator was interviewed under caution and admitted to depositing the waste. They also failed to produce any waste transfer notes for their business that would have shown how they were lawfully disposing of their commercial waste. This resulted in a £400 fine for fly tipping and £300 fine for failing to produce waste transfer notes.

In May 2023, the Council received a report from a member of the public that a groundwork tradesperson from Westbury was operating in Devizes, removing waste without a licence. The business operator was apprehended and requested to produce a valid waste carrier license and all waste transfer notes relating to the business for the last two years of operating. They were fined £300 for failure to produce a valid licence and £300 for failure to produce waste documents (both were reduced to £180 as payment was made within 10 days).

If you decide to take part in The Local Plan consultation, which I shall, three areas I am aware of at present in the draft that interest me are, controlled dark night skies on new development, reduce the land supply required from 5 to 4 years in the proposed local plan which Wiltshire should be able to justify at planning appeals etc. New development to be built to very high insulation standards.

Wessex Water contacted me and have stated "The BBC specifically highlighted eight of our sites which they believed discharged sewage during dry weather. The fact is five did not spill at all and the other three were linked to high groundwater levels." I am not taking sides on this; however, it reinforces to me what I was informed when young, "read more than one newspaper".

Remember the £2 bus fare promotion is running until 31 October.

Mrs Baldock kindly provided the following rainfall figures for Lordsmead, Mere. Total rainfall for August was 64mm (2.56 inches). The wettest day was Wednesday the 2nd August and Sunday 13th, with 11mm. Days with rain 14 out of 31.

Penny Fennon kindly provided figures for Salisbury Street which contrast in places to the above. Grand total rainfall for August was 16.5 cm - wettest day was 2nd with 4cm :)

INSOLVENT DEBTORS COURT OFFICE, No 33, Lincoln"s Inn Fields.

PETITIONS of Insolvent Debtors heard at the General Quarter Sessions of the Peace, to be holden [sic] at Marlborough in and for the county of Wilts, on the I5th day October next, the hour eleven in the forenoon: JAMES BURFITT, late of Mere, the county of Wilts.

Salisbury & Wiltshire Journal, 23 September 1822

MERE, WILTS. WHEREAS on the 10th day of October, 1823, Mr. CURLING and Miss ELLA, belonging to a party of Comedians, having contracted a Debt for Board and Lodging at the Angel Inn, left at the said inn various articles of Wearing Apparel, Books, and other effects, such as are generally used by comedians :—This is to give Notice, that unless the said Apparel, Books, &c. are called for, and the said bill discharged, with the expences [sic] of this advertisement, on or before the ninth day March, 1824, the same will be Sold to pay the said debt and expences.




East Knovle Invites You

Inspector Kevin Harmsworth writes:

Local policing is supported by many volunteers who carry out essential work in keeping our communities safe. Some of those volunteers are the Horse Rider Volunteer Scheme - 55 volunteers on horseback who act as eves and ears for local policing, and provide intelligence for us to act upon. There's also the Rural Crime Partnership (RCP) which is comprised of Neighbourhood Watch volunteers and partner agencies (such as the Canal and River Trust, local authorities and the Ministry of Defence). This meets on a quarterly basis to share updates, discuss crime prevention activity and carry out proactive prevention activities, such as



signing up community members to our watch schemes. The Police Cadets support local policing at various community events where they promote the various watch schemes in the county, issue leaflets and stickers to support crime prevention, and help sign members up to our Community Messaging service

www.wiltsmessaging.co.uk. Community Speedwatch schemes continue to drive down speed and drive up safety, combatting speeding in many local communities. Our Special Constabulary have been providing tremendous support to our summer Road Safety Campaign, which is a current focus for us in response to a worrying rise in people killed or seriously injured on our county's roads. Thank you to all our volunteers.

Our Road Safety Team continue to target excess speed hotspots through their civilian enforcement officers. The Roads Policing Team continue 'Project Zero' across the county, making our local community areas the focus of enforcement activity on the main causes of serious injury/fatal road traffic collisions, supported by our Community Policing Team between their responding to daily calls for service. Operational focus on road safety remains and we are working hard to keep our communities safe. I would prefer that people were driving safely on our roads, and our efforts were not needed. I ask all our communities to make sure they are driving safely and thinking of other road users at all times. One life lost or one person injured is one too many.

Judy says "I first came across Link when I had appointments at Southampton Hospital. I found the drivers were so kind, helpful and very enjoyable to be with on a long journey. I always said that when I was back on the road I would volunteer for Link, which I did a couple of years ago. I have found it to be so rewarding driving people to their medical appointments and, sometimes, hairdressers and shopping. The people are so lovely and, like me, so grateful for the Link service. I have met some wonderful people and had so many lovely chats, all very rewarding. I am grateful to be able to repay Link for all the support they gave me."

New drivers are always welcome so, if you would like to find out more about volunteering as a driver, please call our co-ordinator on 01747 860096.

We did 90 trips in August which, is the monthly average so far this year. 35 of the trips were to Salisbury District Hospital.

Our volunteer drivers take clients to medical appointments, including Covid vaccinations, and even shopping when resources allow. Once you have an appointment please call 01747 860096 to book a Link driver. As a charity we do not charge for trips but ask for a donation. Please remember that our co-ordinators work in their own homes – we do not have an office - so please keep calls to 9-5 Monday to Friday and only use the 01747 860096 number. Also, please try to give us a minimum of 48 hours notice (not including Saturdays and Sundays) as we cannot guarantee our co-ordinator will be at home to arrange last minute requests.

Finally, early notice that the Link will continue to take people to medical appointments over the Christmas and New Year period but please note that our phone will not be "manned" on 25, 26, 27 December and 1 and 2 January 2024. So if you have a medical appointment between these dates please let us know by 24 December to give us the best chance of getting you a driver.

around the world.' It is great news that Suchana has not only been designated a Global Fund for Children 'partner' but is also the focus of their 'spotlight report' for this month. The people of Mere have been so generous in supporting Suchana over the years from its very humble beginnings that we thought you would be interested to see the report in full:

"In West Bengal, India many children struggle in school due to language barriers. While most families in the area speak Santali or Kora as their first language, formal schools conduct lessons in Bengali, which makes it difficult for these children to learn effectively.

To address this challenge, GFC partner Suchana promotes the use of native languages in education. Since 2004, the Suchana team has created study materials in Santali and Kora and recruited and trained native speakers from local communities to help build a foundation for children in their native languages.

As part of GFC's Partnership to Educate All Kids (PEAK) initiative, supported by the LEGO Foundation, Suchana incorporates creativity into the learning process with a mobile library, games, and other activities, which are even offered during summer vacations so that children can continue learning.

Suchana aims gradually to bring about large-scale development in first-language education in the area and exemplifies how community-based organizations fill gaps and take risks to bring about positive change."

The chimes are small hammers that hit the edge of the large bells, some weighing tons. The clapper is on the inside of the bell and the chimes hammer is on the edge.

Is anti-social behaviour (ASB) ruining your life? Are you scared and not sure what to do? Do not suffer in silence. Get help and advice!

ASB has many forms which are divided between the Police and Local Authority (including landlords/housing providers where applicable) to investigate as described in the Wiltshire Safeguarding Vulnerable People Partnership (SVPP) - Anti-social behaviour (wiltshiresvpp.org.uk). ASB is defined as 'conduct that has caused or is likely to cause harassment, alarm or distress to any person, nuisance, or annoyance to a person in relation to that person's occupation of residential premises, or housingrelated nuisance or annoyance to any person'. My teams continue to problem solve incidents of ASB in your local communities, but victims of persistent ASB may not have heard of ASB Case Review. The ASB Case Review gives victims of persistent ASB the right to request a review of their case, where relevant agencies work together identify any further action necessary to find a resolution. An ASB Case Review can be requested by any victim of ASB, or another person acting on their behalf, and with their consent (e.g., family member, carer, local councilor or other professional). This person is referred to as 'the requester.' A requester can be an individual, business or a community group. Formal applications for an ASB Case Review are made via the relevant local authority https://www.wiltshire.gov.uk/community-safety-anti-social-behaviour requests can also be made by email or telephone if the requester is unable to complete the online form. While ASB in general can be reported anonymously, the ASB Case Review process requires communication with the requester throughout the process, so reports cannot be made anonymously. There is an associated threshold that needs to be met consisting of 'three or more separate, qualifying reports of ASB made to the police, council or housing provider in the past six months. Each incident must have been reported within one month of it taking place'. Where the threshold is not met, a formal ASB Case Review will not take place, but the relevant agencies may review the case to determine any further actions that may resolve the matter. Where the threshold is met a case review will take place within 15 working days, and the requester has the opportunity to speak at the review. Every partner agencies response to each incident will be discussed, as well as the wider context of the issue(s) presented, with partners collaborating to identify any further actions that may be appropriate to resolve the matter. The requester is updated at every stage of the process, including on the progress of any actions agreed. The Wiltshire Council ASB risk assessment conference (ASBRAC) then ensures progress on delivery of any action plans, including any further actions agreed through continuous review. If the requester is unsatisfied with the way in which an ASB case review has been conducted, an appeal can be made within 15 working days of being notified of the outcomes/decision.

A good source of further information outside of Policing and Local Authorities is Home - ASB HELP. I encourage local communities to report all instances of ASB, which greatly helps us understand the full extent of the issue(s) and target our problem-solving activity to best effect. No one should have to suffer in silence.
