## Mere Town Council

Town Councillors have a break in August, with no monthly meeting. This does not mean that nothing happens – groups of councillors meet to discuss and prepare items for the whole council and urgent decisions are made under rules of delegation by the Chair and Clerk. Most councillors have a link to some group in Mere which they regularly follow up and, I know from experience, that once people know that you are a councillor, they are keen to discuss what should be done or be undone!

I am certain that you have ideas about what Mere should be like and how Mere Town Council should help make it a better place for us all. I would urge you to find out more about our Town Council – we have a good website merewilts.org which is packed with information. Then, I hope that you come along to a Town Council meeting and see and listen to the work of councillors. Finally, I am asking you to consider being a part of this. Yes, in 18 months there will be elections for the councillors of the future and you could be a part of that next council. Find out more about the governance of Mere and consider putting your name forward for election and, hopefully, contribute to the future of this splendid town.

Well, that was for the future, what is happening now? We have been asking the various groups in Mere to bid for some of the money made available in the Wiltshire Towns Fund to support their events. This fund is meant to be used to attract people to visit Mere and use its facilities. We are looking at ways to improve and make safer the traffic flow in Mere. We are planning improvements to the public conveniences in the Salisbury Street car park. We are organising the use of the money we receive from the development at the Hill Brush site on improvements to the footpath from there into town. We are arranging for the clock tower bell to chime again. We are working with the football club to regenerate adult football and of course we continue to manage all the sports grounds, open spaces, cemetery, allotments & car parks....

I am keen on walking about Mere and also very interested in road safety. If you have a hedge or shrubbery which verges on the roadside or on the pavement, please, consider the safety of others and manage your hedge, shrubs or overhanging tress. This time of year, the birds will have left any nests and it is a good time to prune back, well clear of the pavement or road. Thank you, in advance for doing so. While I am talking walking – many people had a No-Mow May – can I encourage you to take part in a No-Drive September. For those able to do so, let us walk into town instead of driving – get some exercise, meet more people and not have to fret about where to park!

Finally, a word in support of Mere Carnival – it will be here on the 16<sup>th</sup>. I have been a part of the committee for some time and know how much work there is to putting the brilliant event together. Do come along and watch the procession,

come to the centre of town beforehand to enjoy entertainments and refreshments and please support the Carnival with donations in the collecting buckets or by buying Golden Tickets.

### Wiltshire Councillor ~ George Jeans Writes

Many are interested in the speed of traffic. Phones can do far more than make voice calls as we all know. A local resident informed me an app was available that recorded the speed of traffic, the App cost a credit each time to use, it is not 100% accurate I have found, however it gives a good indication.

Local clubs and local community events continue to raise money for good causes, it is good we still have all our community venues. Several from Mere were present on Saturday 22nd July, which saw the charity golf day presentations at Kilmington Home Guard Club which I enjoyed attending. Golfers had a wellearned rest at The Home Guard Club, Kilmington after being on the coarse at Wheathill Golf Coarse, Castle Carry, in very wet weather. Presentations were made at The Home Guard Club, Kilmington. Simon Crab won the main trophy, second was Richard Strong. The longest drive was Nick Howel. Richard Czemerda won nearest the pin. Nigel Ore won the much coveted "last" cup, he was suffering with a bad back. A great number of raffle prizes were up for grabs. Mere Social Club also hold community events as West Knoyle, Stourton and Zeals that benefit good causes, I have attended several this summer and have tried to get the events published in the local media where possible.

Thelma Ings was part of Mere being born in Salisbury Street Mere, on the 29th January 1932. Besides carrying out administration for her husband's business Thelma found time to be involved in many community functions in Mere, including The Church and Girl Guiding. Thelma eventually became a Division Commissioner in which role she also had leadership of a Ranger Unit. She was given the Good Service Award and became Divisional Vice President. Thelma was honoured by The Girl Guiding Standard being brought to her funeral by Jo Manship. The Talbot Dog was put on The Standard in 1952 and represented Mere. Thelma sadly passed away on the 18th July, 2023.

The Beaumont site was given outline planning permission in July. This will increase the traffic using Petridges Lane further justifying Mere Town Council decision to provide an alternative enhanced pedestrian route to the centre of Mere on an existing footpath, Clements Lane to Edgebridge remains with no pavement.

A briefing note has been prepared in advance of the publication of the emerging Local Plan Review (LPR), so that Members are informed about the way in which housing land requirements are calculated and any implications emerging from government changes to the National Planning Policy Framework (NPPF). Local authorities have a statutory duty to make sure that they are planning for sufficient homes to meet the need for their area. For the period 2020-2038, Wiltshire needs to provide for sufficient land to deliver 36.738 homes. The LPR will only be allocating enough land that is absolutely required. It will take account of homes that have already been built since 2020 and committed (including housing with planning permission or allocated within existing plans that are not vet built), together with other sources of new housing supply that will be provided over the plan period. Wiltshire are proposing to make changes that will take effect from spring 2023 The LPR is one of the most important strategic documents for Wiltshire Council. Local Authorities have a statutory duty to renew their Plan every five years and should have an up-to-date plan. Wiltshire's Local Plan is already eight years old. The lack of an up-to-date Local Plan is harming the council's ability to plan for the right growth, in the right locations. A new Local Plan will help the council to meet its zero carbon aspirations for all future developments. Failure to have an up-to-date Local Plan affects the council's five-year housing land supply (see below), encouraging speculative development. Lack of progress on updating the Local Plan puts the council at risk of having its planning powers removed through government intervention. A new Local Plan will allow the council to secure high-quality development, in keeping with the county's heritage and setting. The LPR will deliver a choice of housing types, including affordable homes, to meet future housing needs and not leave this to speculative housing developers. The LPR delivers much more than housing. It secures high-quality employment space for businesses, providing jobs for local people and more. The Plan will now move to the final public presubmission consultation, which will be the opportunity for all interested parties to have their say on the proposals. The consultation for the Wiltshire Local Plan begins on Wednesday 27 September until Wednesday 22 November, with inperson events being held across the county to enable you to find out more and have your say. There are 16 drop-in events at libraries and leisure centres around Wiltshire and a live webinar-style event on Thursday 10 October on Microsoft Teams. The in-person events are informal drop-in sessions where you can meet officers and find out more about the Local Plan and how to respond to the consultation. The online session will feature a presentation, followed by an opportunity to ask questions. In our area the area the closes will be The Nadder Centre, Weaveland Road, Tisbury SP3 6HJ on Wednesday 4 October between 3pm to 7pm. At Full Council it was decided in affect to reduce the land supply required from 5 to 4 years in the proposed local plan, which Wiltshire should be able to justify at planning appeals etc.

Grants for highway and footpath improvements at the South West Wilts Area Board LAFIG meeting will not cover the number of improvements requested. Debate is taking place as to how much a local parish or town should contribute where it be from the precept or personal contributions and should it be less for small villages?

Kilmington and Stourton Cricket Club applied and won a £2,600.00 grant from the board towards refurbishment of practice nets.

The £2 bus fare promotion is running until 31 October. The offer now runs all summer.

A resident from Lyneham has recently been issued with £400 fixed penalty notice (FPN) by Wiltshire Council for fly-tipping waste in the area. At £400, the FPN is the maximum amount that can be set by local authorities. Once a fixed penalty is issued, the recipients cannot be named as it is not a conviction in an open court.

A Wiltshire man has been prosecuted by Wiltshire Council for not having an identification tag on a collar or a microchip registered for their dog. The man from Trowbridge, was prosecuted under both the Control of Dogs Order 1992 and the Microchipping of Dogs (England) Regulation 2015.

Wiltshire Council hope to build 33 affordable houses at Lower Park Farm, Caen Hill, in Devizes. The application is part of the council's ambitious plans to deliver 1,000 affordable homes over a decade for people on the Housing Register and unable to afford a home on the open market. The council have also bought back ex council houses as they have done with a few in the Mere Division. To further support the council's commitment to tackling climate change, the houses would be highly insulated and fitted with heat pumps. Houses with a south-facing aspect would also have solar panels. A mix of housing, from one-bedroom flats to four-bedroom houses, are proposed and these would be a mix for rent and shared ownership. Should planning permission be granted, the site would be managed and maintained by Wiltshire Council. Please note that Wiltshire Council are now producing shared ownership properties as well as houses for rent.

Mrs Baldock kindly provided the following rainfall figures for Lordsmead, Mere. Total rainfall for July was 152mm (6.08 inches). The wettest day was Tuesday the  $4^{\text{th}}$  July, with 37mm (1.48 inches). Days with rain 16 out of 31.

## From Times Gone By!

On the 5th instant died at Mere, in this county, Mary Jane Grove, daughter of John Chafin Morris, Esq. Commander of the Royal Navy. This is the third infantile victim in his family to lament the dreadful ravages of hooping-cough.

## Salisbury & Wiltshire Journal 15 September 1828

(The child was around 16 months when she died. John Chafin Morris' father had married Jane Grove of Chantry House in Mere and was thus a relative of Julia Chafyn Grove, who gave Mere the Grove Building.)

FOR SALE by AUCTION, by Mr. Jeanes, at the Ship Inn, in Mere - All that newlybuilt and very convenient DWELLING-HOUSE ... well supplied with water, and replete with every convenience. Also, Forty-three Acres of rich Freehold Arable and Pasture land, and Forty-four Acres of Arable, Pasture, and Down Land delightfully situate, at and near Prospect Place, a short distance from the turnpike-road, and near the town of Mere... The London, Taunton, Exeter, Bath and Poole coaches pass daily.

## Salisbury & Wiltshire Journal 16 September 1833

(This is almost certainly what came to be known as Prospect Farm, the location of which is now marked by 'Prospect Place' off Long Lane in the Bramley Hill area.)

The children love sharing this information with Mrs Hyde! We have monitors who regularly patrol the classrooms telling the staff off if they have left lights on!

Wessex Water spent a few days in school talking about how we can save water and have kindly provided us with water butts to collect rain water in to water our school garden.

The Eco Club also keep our school garden tidy. They have been drying out bulbs kindly donated by Mere Town Council ready to plant. The club has also created a new 'bee friendly' patch near the car park with help from Seeds for Success and Simon, groundsman for Mere Town Council. They are in the process of filling it with appropriate plants and would appreciate any donations from the community. Each class has also raised a planter in the garden and they grow something to eat in there every year.

As well as this the children manage our recycling. We recycle food waste, paper, cardboard, glass, metal and we have a clothing bank on site which anyone (not just the school) can put unwanted clothing in. The children are also meticulous about keeping our site litter free.

A focus for our governor monitoring this term has been to consider how knowledgeable our children are about environmental issues. Our governor was most impressed – the children demonstrated that their overwhelming desire is to make our world a better place to live for future generations.

We pride ourselves at Mere School on everyone being a learner from our cleaning team to our teaching team and of course the children!

We organise regular events in school for parents to work with their children and now we have the opportunity for our community to be involved in this as well. Please do enrol on the course so we can all learn together and 'save the planet' at the same time.

## **Operation Awake - A Wiltshire Initiative to Support Women in Public Life**

Local women in public life who are at the receiving end of abusive emails and social media posts will receive additional support from the police as part of a new pilot scheme.

Developed jointly by Salisbury Soroptimists (the local club of a global women's organisation) and Wiltshire Police, *Operation Awake* will enable female councillors and other women in public life to receive support when reporting any such abuse, whether written, verbal or on social media. Once the codeword is used, police will know to ensure that incidents and offences can be analysed to identify serial perpetrators or inform patrol strategies and will support publicity campaigns and engagement to encourage



reporting. Where appropriate these will be dealt with as crimes and investigated and where the matter does not meet a criminal threshold for investigation, the information supplied will be used to help identify patterns of behaviour and ultimately to pinpoint repeat offenders. We hope that by building a stronger intelligence picture, the police will be able to deploy resources to proactively target potential perpetrators and prevent offences.

Unlike MPs, until now there was no bespoke reporting structure for female councillors or women who work or volunteer in public service. Liz Batten of the Soroptimist project group said: "We are saying 'it's not ok' to be personally abusive to any woman – but we believe that those women who give of their time and energy to serve their local community deserve to be better protected from this kind of gender-based abuse. We are pleased that Wiltshire Police agreed with us that women should be encouraged to report the gender abuse they receive so that enquiries can be made to identify the perpetrators and assess any immediate risk."

MiPermit app is quicker and easier - and there is no extra charge. Anyone who opts to use the MiPermit app can benefit from additional features including extending your stay from the app without returning to the car park, the ability to book stays over multiple days and purchase season tickets.

What a year so far weather-wise in the Wessex area.

Feb 1/3 of average rain fall.

March 1/3 wettest since records began.

April rain fall above average.

May 88% of long term average rain fall.

June Hot and dry.

July 6th wettest since records began.

All the above has a big effect on our rivers, but not in a bad way both the Ashfield and the Shreen have good flows.

Last year at this time the upper Shreen was dry and the Ashfield was kept flowing with stream support.

Next year we should be trialing stream support on the Shreen.

We have had a very good year for Water Voles with many sightings and we believe young voles, not so good for Ducks and Moorhens. The parts of the

Shreen which dried last year are gradually being repopulated with fish as frequent visits from the Kingfisher seem to indicate.

Swifts have left us for warmer climes and they will soon be followed by Swallows, Martins and Warblers which will be replaced by our winter migrants.
