During August this year Mere Town Council will be organising an event that promotes activity and fun.

The Activities in Mere (AIM) event will take place between 9<sup>th</sup> and 11<sup>th</sup> August and will encourage, this year, the over 50's in Mere to try or retry sports and leisure activities. Some of which will be adapted to promote participation. We hope that the event will not only encourage people to try something new, but that they may boost the membership of clubs and societies in Mere, as well as promoting health and wellbeing. We are providing this event using funds we have obtained from the Wiltshire Towns Fund.

More details will be provided in the coming weeks, in the meantime we would be grateful for any offers of assistance to help organise or provide a sport or activity. For further information please contact Roger Pipe Project Co-ordinator at Mere Town Council Tel 860701.

Each month, the Town Council looks at planning applications and we decide on our support or objection with reasons. I must make it clear that the decision is made by the Wiltshire Planning team based on planning regulations but they do take into account comments made by us and by interested parties. Your voice can be heard on planning applications so do take the opportunity to go to the Wiltshire website and add your comment.

Feedback from residents has prompted us to consider a new approach to the format of the Annual Town Meeting. This will take place on the Wednesday, 24<sup>th</sup> April from 6 to 8 pm in the foyer at Duchy Manor where we will be providing information boards with details of the various groups in Mere like the Carnival and the Link Scheme. There will be information boards, and councillors to talk to, on the work of the Town Council and how this relates to the work of Wiltshire Council. There will be boards with ideas and future plans with space for your comments and, importantly, a suggestions board where you can add your suggestions. We are hoping that this format will give residents more of an opportunity to ask questions, comment and generally participate, rather than at a formal meeting. We are required to have some formalities and so at 6:15pm, I shall give the Chairman's report and minutes from last year. Comments posted on the boards will be gathered together to form minutes and will be considered at our next council meeting.

In our last meeting we considered the implications of Martyn's Law (which relates to the protection of premises in acts of Terrorism) for Mere and commented on the public consultation website. We also took note of the Dorset and Wiltshire Fire and Rescue Authority's Community Safety plan. One interesting fact is that they are attending fewer emergency callouts and spending more time going out to residents and companies to discuss safe measure in the home and business.

As a result of a recent announcement made by Gillingham Town Council that their cemetery is now closed for new burials as they have run out of space, Mere Town Council has taken the decision not to permit any burials for non-residents. This means that if you do not live in Mere, you will not be able to be buried in Mere cemetery unless you have already purchased a plot. This decision has been taken to preserve our cemetery space for Mere parishioners. We will, however, still permit the purchase of cremation plots by non-parishioners, at double-fees as per the previous policy.

I was determined not to mention it but must say... I do hope that, after this wet winter, we are spared the April showers!

Due to the fact that the Clock Tower is a Listed Building in the centre of the town which is in the centre of the Conservation Area, the Town Council has a policy for the erection of display banners on the Clock Tower. The Town Council will only permit a maximum of 4 banners for community/charity events held within the town per year. The four banners for 2024 have now all been allocated as follows:

- Mere Spring Fair & Family Fun Day 20<sup>th</sup> April 2024
- Proms in Mere (Tower Stories project) 13<sup>th</sup> July 2024

- Activities in Mere (Activity event for weekend of 10<sup>th</sup> 11<sup>th</sup> August)
- Mere Annual Carnival 14<sup>TH</sup> September 2024

# Wiltshire Councillor ~ George Jeans Writes

Wiltshire Council's budget for 2024/25 was formally approved at a meeting of Full Council on 20 February 2024. The council is forecasting a small underspend of around £634,000 for the 2023/24 financial year. This coming financial year, 2024/25, an additional £36m has been added into the council's service budgets. Overall, the council's budget for 2024/25 stands at around £490m. More than half of that is spent on adult and children's social care services. The most significant spending in 2024/25 will be on: Adult services - £179.4m, Families and children - £70.8m, Environment - £49.6m, Highways and transport - £43m, Education and skills - £38.9m

Wiltshire Council has allocated an extra £10m over the next two years to spend on filling potholes and a road resurfacing programme that will help to prevent potholes and other highways defects in all areas of the county. The investment will also fund more small, local repairs to the highways and verge repairs on rural roads. This is in addition to the £20.7m the council receives from the Government's Highways Maintenance fund for 2024/25, plus the £5.2m from the Department for Transport's recently announced Road Resurfacing Fund. The budget puts in an additional £1m investment into extra gully cleaning work and reactive pothole filling. This is on top of the £1m that was invested into improving drainage in 2022 and will effectively treble drain-clearing work since 2021.

The rolling out of Technology Enabled Care (TEC) is a project that will revolutionise the way support services may be delivered to adults, which will deliver savings but ensure people are still empowered to live good lives.

The capital programme for 2024/25 has been budgeted at around £285m. Some of the capital spend in 2024/25 will be on: Building and refurbishing council houses - £45m, Structural maintenance and bridges - £21m, Trowbridge and Salisbury Future High Streets - £11m Highways investment plan - £7m, Property carbon reduction programme inc. solar canopies - £5m, Investment in leisure centers - £3m.

The council will also Invest an additional £10m in creating additional SEND school places including creating resource bases at mainstream schools to provide young people with access to enhanced support, spending time in the base for specialist intervention while also joining mainstream classes. There is particularly high demand for adults' services, children's social care and SEND.

Wiltshire Council has secured a multi-million-pound agreement to support special educational needs and disabilities after a five-year investment plan has been rubber stamped by the Department for Education. The agreement will mean providing an additional 500 special school places to ensure children stay closer to home in Wiltshire, as well as investment in more resource bases which provide SEND support in mainstream schools. It will also fund new teams to provide early support for children and young people with SEND, and their families.

The council receives nearly 84% of its core funding from local taxes, business rates and council tax, and is dependent on increases in these to deliver services to Wiltshire's residents, communities, and businesses. Wiltshire Council has confirmed a 2.99% increase for its element of council tax, plus a 2% levy to be spent solely on

adult social care. This will mean an increase of £1.65 per week for those with a Band D property at an annual charge of £1,805.73. A number of other measures will be introduced by the council during 2024/25, including an increase in some fees and charges for some services such as leisure, some planning services and the garden waste collection cost going to £70 per year (around £1.34 a week).

Wiltshire Council's Design Guide, which will help to ensure future developments in the county are consistently of a high-quality design, was approved for adoption by Council on 20 February and is now a supplementary planning document. The guide has been structured around the '10 characteristics of good design', as described in the National Design Guide. As a Supplementary Planning Document the Wiltshire Design Guide is afforded weight in the determination of planning applications.

Hundreds of Ukraine guests continue to find a safe place to stay in Wiltshire after the second anniversary of the invasion in Ukraine, some found accommodation in Mere. Since the Homes for Ukraine scheme was announced by the government, over 1600 Ukrainian guests have arrived safely in Wiltshire. 405 guests still remain in active sponsorship, whilst more than 600 have now moved into independent accommodation, moved out of Wiltshire or returned to the Ukraine.

Don't forget you now need to show photo ID to vote at polling stations in some elections, including UK Parliamentary elections, general elections, local elections and by-elections, Police and Crime Commissioner election – which takes place on 2 May

The Chancellor of the Exchequer presented the 2024 Spring budget to Parliament. Some points within of the budget which affect local councils etc. and may not of come to the reader's attention.

- An additional £5 million for the Platinum Jubilee Village Halls Fund to support Village Halls throughout England.
- The government will increase the cap from 40% to 50% on the percentage of the cost of a replacement home that can be funded from Right to Buy receipts.

Emergency Contact Hubs provide a place where the community can go to help each other in the event of an emergency. Primarily they are designed to enable communities to help themselves, but also to provide a link to emergency services in the local area. Wiltshire Council, Swindon Borough Council and emergency services will know where all hubs are located and how to contact them. The hubs will become 'active' in emergency situations like flooding, fires, or widespread damage to utilities. It is up to communities to decide when to activate their hub and they do not need to seek authorisation from emergency services. Communities can publicise the activation of hubs through social media, posters in community spaces and shops, and by notifying local community groups. Each hub will be different, but they will generally provide warmth and shelter, welfare provision, information, resources, and volunteers to help respond to the incident and coordinate support locally. The Local Resilience Forum (LRF), known publicly as 'Wiltshire and Swindon Prepared' is delivering this scheme. People interested in setting up an Emergency Contact Hub for their area are encouraged to contact wiltshireandswindonprepared@wiltshire.gov.uk

Penny Fennon gave February rainfall for Salisbury Street in Feruary as 31cm with 18th February being the wettest with 6cm of rain. Pam Baldock gave rainfall for Lordsmead area as 150.25mm, (6.01) the wettest being 17th February with 33mm. For Southern England the average monthly precipitation in January is 13 days in Bristol with 73mm, Positioning of rain gauges may explain the differences. The Met. Office states unusually heavy rainfall (over entire UK) in February as against last February for 30 years, (9.75mm, 0.4 inches). To help clear the highway of water, you can report blocked gullies using the My Wilts app.

Wiltshire are still short of placements for foster children and looking for those interested. There are situations that arise unexpectedly which mean young people need emergency care and support at short notice. Foster carers under this scheme provide temporary emergency care to any child or young person needing a safe place to stay until a suitable home is found. Young people in this situation are dealing with uncertainty and may also be traumatised and will need extra support. Emergency foster carers receive £900 per week per child when they have a child to stay with them and £500 per week when they don't have foster children to care for. The council would like to recruit more carers to help meet the demand.

#### Mere School

I wanted to share with readers the fantastic results Mere School achieved at the end of the last academic year.

The main headline is that the proportion of children reaching the expected standard in reading, writing and maths has consistently been above average over the last 3 years and is most often well above and in the top 20% of schools nationally. Attainment is currently significantly above average and in the top 8% of schools nationally.

#### **EYFS**

• The proportion of children reading a Good Level of Development is well above average at 81% (65% nationally).

#### **Phonics**

 93% of our children achieved the phonics expected score, this was 68% nationally

#### KS1

- Reading 83% achieved the expected standard (69% nationally)
- Maths 83% achieved the expected standard (72% nationally)
- Writing 83% achieved the expected standard (61% nationally)

#### KS2

- Reading 90% achieved the expected standard (73% nationally), and 30% achieved greater depth (29% nationally)
- Maths 83% achieved the expected standard (73% nationally), and 20% achieved greater depth (22% nationally). Our maths outcomes at KS2 are slightly lower as we had 5 children who were unable to take the test. All of the children achieved at least the expected standard.
- Writing 83% achieved the expected standards (71% nationally), and 20% achieved greater depth (13% nationally).
- Reading, maths and writing combined at t6he expected standard 80% (59% nationally).

Our children and teachers, supported by our parents, achieved these amazing outcomes. We are all incredibly proud!

# Mere and District Day Centre (The Rosemary Goddard Centre)

#### Information for Members, Stakeholders and Supporters

Mere Day Centre has been working to counter loneliness and social isolation in older people since 1988. It currently operates as an Unincorporated Association, the most basic charity structure.



With increasing pressure on Local Authority budgets, the previous funding for Day Centres and Lunch Clubs is no longer available. That means we have had to seek additional external grants and donations, to ensure the services we provide for guests in our area remain affordable.

As a result of this and other long-term considerations, the trustees recommended to members at the AGM on 16<sup>th</sup> October 2023 that it would now be more appropriate for the charity to operate within a corporate structure. A resolution to register a new Charitable Incorporated Organisation (CIO) with the Charity Commission, to replace the current charity, was unanimously passed.

That application has been approved by the Commission, and the new CIO, which retains the same name. Mere and District Day Centre (new Registered Charity No. 1207117), has been entered onto the Register of Charities.

The current charity will continue to operate until the end of our financial year on 31st March 2024, with management and assets transferring to the new CIO from 1st April 2024. There will be no change in the way we provide services, and our existing members, volunteers, staff, and trustees all remain in place.

We believe the new structure will open up further potential opportunities and help to secure our aim of promoting the health and wellbeing of older people in Mere and the surrounding area for years to come.

One of our passengers Brian Robinson, whom I had the pleasure of taking to Salisbury District Hospital on a Sunday afternoon recently, has kindly offered some comments about the Link Scheme. Brian says "since moving to Mere some five years ago the Link Scheme has been a Godsend. I have had many medical appointments at hospitals and the dentist which would have been very difficult to get to without the Link. The drivers are very friendly and they wait for you until your appointment has finished! Since using the Link Scheme I feel the drivers have become friends."

With 95 trips in February we are averaging 100 trips per month so far in 2024. As usual most trips, 25, were to Salisbury District Hospital.

We are a local charity and our volunteer drivers take clients to medical appointments, including Covid vaccinations, and even shopping when resources allow. New drivers are always welcome. You choose when you want to drive, use your own car and we pay 45p/mile to cover your costs. If you are interested in volunteering as a driver, please call our co-ordinator on 01747 860096.

Once you have an appointment, please call 01747 860096 to book a Link driver. As a charity we do not charge for trips but ask for a donation. Please remember that our co-ordinators work in their own homes - we do not have an office - so please keep calls to 9-5 Monday to Friday and only use the 01747 860096 number. Also, it is a great help if you can give us a minimum of 48 hours notice (not including Saturdays and Sundays). Our co-ordinator has to ring round to find a driver who is available to take you to your appointment and we cannot guarantee our co-ordinator will be at home to arrange last minute requests.

Greetings from Khanjanpur in West Bengal, the home of the Suchana Uttor Chandipur Community Society!

Many of you will remember when a group of Mere residents started holding events to raise money for Suchana in 2009. At that time, Suchana was a small, young organisation working with 150 disadvantaged children, exploring supplementary education inputs that could support them in their school lives and enrich their wider learning. Over the 15 years since then, the Mere Support Group has raised over £33,000 for Suchana, providing consistent, reliable funds to help the organisations strengthen and grow.

Suchana is now a well-established organisation with a loyal and hardworking local team running a number of programmes in the Centre and in more than 30 nearby villages, reaching nearly 2000 *adivasi* children. It has gained a reputation for innovative work establishing opportunities for children to access education in their first languages of Santali and Kora, and for integrating technology into the learning of children in remote areas so that they too can learn computer skills. And it has moved gradually into advocacy, contributing to progress on wider opportunities for first language education through the public education system in the local area, and in West Bengal more widely. Suchana's first students are now in their early twenties and have found their way to a variety of livelihoods, variously working for: a Japanese tech company; in local government; as welders; in motorcycle maintenance; as artisans; as farmers; and a few are working in Suchana.

These achievements would simply not have been possible without the contributions that the Mere Support Group and others have made to our work. We remain deeply grateful for the trust you have placed in our team, and hope that some of you will stay in touch even though the Mere group is formally closing this spring. Anyone is of course always welcome to make a donation or even hold an event in aid of Suchana at any time.
