With the summer weather our groundsmen are kept busy with managing the growth of grass and plants on the playing fields, other open spaces and the cemetery. All of these require special equipment and are often weather dependent. I am always pleased to see the quality of their work but I am aware that work in the cemetery is fraught with difficulty. Many awkward spaces with all manner of objects to negotiate around those special places where parishioners go to be with the memories of their loved ones do mean that we sometimes disappoint, I would ask for your forbearance and hope that you appreciate our concern to get this task done with respect, care and as well as time allows.

The council has, what are called assets but are better thought of as aspects of Mere. Our attention is both to preserve and improve. This month we heard from our project coordinator about the plans to maintain and improve the play area at the bottom of Castle Hill. This is a popular space for children and picnicking families. Once this has been done, we will be turning our attention to the very much used children's area in the recreation ground. This will be a larger project and we will be consulting with all of the user groups about what they would like the space to include and how it will look.

At our June meeting we heard from both the Carnival team and the Funfair providers and other users of the recreation ground about having the funfair, which accompanies Mere Annual Carnival, take place in the recreation ground. After considerable discussion we have agreed to a trial year with the funfair situated on protective surfaces in the recreation ground.



I was proud to play a small part in the commemoration of the 80th Anniversary of D-Day Normandy landing. My thanks to Stuart Walker for the organisation and the

words he used to set the scene, and Mary Burfitt playing the last post and the many Mere parishioners who attended, which altogether meant that we shall remember those brave individuals.

Planning continues for AIM, Activities in Mere, which takes place on the 9th to 11th of August & will create many opportunities for the over fifties to try new activities or to revisit ones they used to take part in. Leaflets, with details of what will happen and what you need to do to take part will be soon coming through your door, delivered by volunteers, don't miss this opportunity!

Wiltshire Councillor ~ George Jeans Writes

Summer is here. I have attended Mere Gardening Club's 2024 Hidden Gardens open weekend of the 15th and 16th June. 19 gardens were open over the 2 days, every garden was a credit to its gardener. There were hundreds in attendance across the various open gardens and travelling between gardens, some coming from outside the area.

The same weekend was the *Mere and District Railway Modellers 2024 Exhibition*, a layout was done for the children which was well used. Many came for the exhibition from afar as well as locally.

Further it was the weekend Yapp Bros. left Mere for Sparkford, which is sad. They had helped put Mere on the map for decades.

Polling opens on Thursday 4 July from 7am and continues to 10pm.

Postal votes must be returned by Royal Mail. If people are not able to put their postal vote in the post, they can only hand them in at County Hall reception in Trowbridge by completing a form provided on arrival. People should not post postal votes directly in the post boxes at the council's three main offices (County Hall, Monkton Park and Bourne Hill) as they will be rejected. Alternatively, on polling day people can hand postal votes in at the polling station. People can only hand in a maximum of five postal votes and your own (six in total).

Don't forget to take photo ID with you to vote at a polling station. Accepted forms of photo ID include passports, photographic driving licences, biometric immigration documents, and certain concessionary travel passes. A comprehensive list can be found at www.electoralcommission.org.uk/voting-and-elections/voter-id.

Those without an accepted form of photo ID can apply for a free Voter Authority Certificate online at <https://www.gov.uk/apply-for-photo-id-voter-authority-certificate>. Applications must be submitted by 5pm on Wednesday 26 June 2024. The Voter Authority Certificate can be used at all elections and people are advised to apply as early as possible.

Fly posting is taken to be the display of advertising material on buildings and street furniture without the consent of the owner. If permission is gained from the landowner, which would include Wiltshire Council Highways, then it is not fly posting as permission is given. The council will allow advertising on the highway by charities and community groups. There are also more serious implications such as the placement of notices that could cause a distraction for drivers or effecting the visibility at junctions etc. Hence, it is important that all groups seek permission before advertising their event. In most cases with community groups it will be about the location, size and number of notices that advice may be needed before approval.

The council will publicise how community groups should apply for permission to advertise their events to avoid any problems with fly posting. Visit the website page Litter - Wiltshire Council.

Mere Appoints First Writer in Residence



Jane Borodale has been appointed as Writer in Residence for The Tower Stories, a ten month community project funded by The National Lottery Heritage Fund and supported by The Friends of St Michael's Church in Mere. The residency will run from September 2024 – June 2025.

Jane will be researching, writing and publishing fiction that interprets and brings alive the medieval 124 ft Tower of St Michael's Church in Mere, Wiltshire. Jane, who lives in Somerset is a successful published writer of historical fiction with her primary interest being in the history of

place and the ordinary lives of the past.

She says "I am keen to write a of six short stories that explore the rooms in the Tower. These would be stories plausibly rooted in the Tower which aim to flesh out and breathe life into existing clues and fragments of the everyday past in Mere, to create vivid, affecting and engaging moments".

Jane will be working closely with Mere School, Mere Museum and the entire Mere community. She will also be holding a series of writing Workshops within the community. "My own passion for history was sparked by childhood visits to local museums and by reading historical fiction, and I am particularly keen for my Tower Stories to enable children and young people to connect imaginatively with the history of their own locality. I can't wait to begin!"

Richard Nye has been appointed as Composer in Residence for The Tower Stories, a ten month community project funded by The National Lottery Heritage Fund and supported by The Friends of St Michael's Church in Mere. The residency will run from September 2024 – June 2025.

Richard will be researching, composing and workshopping music that interprets and brings alive the medieval 124 ft Tower of St Michael's the Archangel Church in Mere, Wiltshire. Richard lives in Dorset and has 22 published works and is a house composer with a UK music production company, numerous national and international concert performances, experience in orchestration, sound

recording, field recording and audio production along with experience in the latest music technology and 30 years of teaching experience. From Times Gone By!

Mr. Whitmarsh held an inquest on Thursday in Mere on the body of George Jukes. The deceased had been mowing hay and went with James Maidmen, who worked with him, to have some beer; they drank no more than about two pints each, and returned to the meadow to resume their labour; they both laid down to sleep, and James Maidment awoke, and found the deceased still sleeping; he then returned home. The following morning, he found the deceased still lying on the ground. He hastened to a surgeon, who attended, but the deceased died. The Jury returned a verdict "Died by the visitation of Almighty God." They were of opinion that the deceased had not drank enough to cause his death, but that it was owing to the extreme heat of the sun during the severe day's labour he had gone through.

On the same day, Mr. Whitmarsh held an inquest at Ridge, on the body of Sarah Gane who on the preceding evening was carried home in a dying state in consequence of having drank cold water several times during the day, being at the time much exposed to the rays of the sun and in a state of great perspiration. Less than twenty minutes after drinking the last time, she complained of being ill, and desired to be carried home, and she died shortly after. Verdict "Died in consequence of drinking cold water whilst in a state of perspiration." The day before, a man at Tisbury was found dead in consequence of drinking cold water whilst warm; and another man at Chilmark was saved by prompt measures being adopted in resisting the fatal effects of drinking cold water whilst in a state of violent perspiration. The above accounts ought to have a good effect on those who may be tempted to allay their thirst whilst warm, during hot weather.

A further Caution to Labourers Working in the Fields during Warm Weather – A few days since, a man at Charlton Marshall, whilst very hot at mowing, drank a quantity of small beer and died soon after. Another person at Sturminster Newton being very thirsty and very warm, drank a pint of cider, and died shortly after.

Marvellous Makers Summer Reading Challenge 2024

The Summer Reading Challenge is for children aged 4 to 11 to read six library books (or the equivalent) over the eight weeks of the summer in return for various prizes. The 2024 Summer Reading Challenge is called Marvellous Makers, with a theme celebrating creativity. It will run in Wiltshire libraries from Saturday 13 July to Saturday 7 September. Children can register for the challenge from 13 July and start to collect stickers and other prizes from Monday 29 July.



When registering, children will receive their own special poster to record their reading, plus a Marvellous Makers sticker. When they've read 4 books,



they'll be given an origami activity sheet and on completion a badge and certificate. It's all free and can make a real difference to a child's motivation and enjoyment of reading. Although the challenge is to read six books, there is flexibility in this number, especially for children who struggle with reading or read longer books.

For children who want a further challenge and those older than 11 we have the Story Adventurers' Club, a personal reading challenge where children set their own reading goals, the target to read 100 books. For children aged under 4, in the early summer we will be launching a new book sharing initiative called 'Story Sharers', more information to follow.

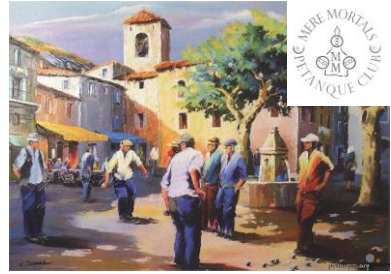

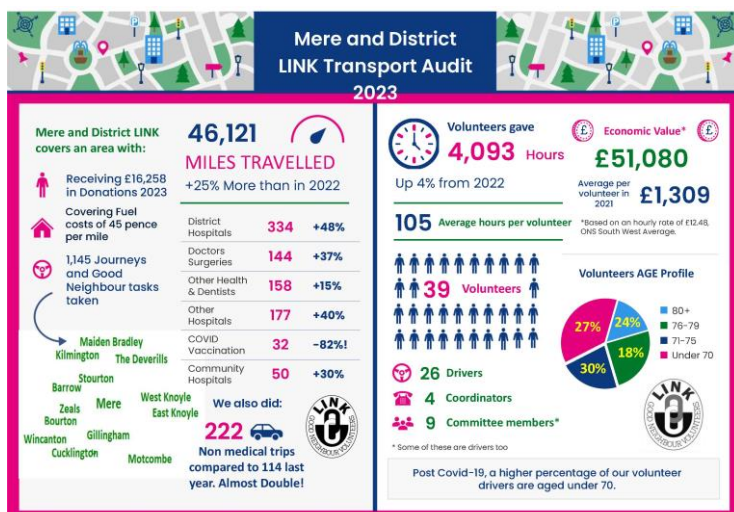

Top 3 tips for preventing tooth decay



1 Reduce the amount and frequency of foods and drinks that contain sugars.



2 Brush teeth twice daily with fluoride toothpaste (1350-1500ppm), last thing at night and at least one other occasion. After brushing, spit don't rinse.



3 Take your child to the dentist when the first tooth erupts, at about 6 months and then on a regular basis.

Parents/carers should brush/supervise tooth brushing until their child is at least 7.

Under 3s should use a smear of toothpaste.

Children and young people 7 years and older should continue brushing with a fluoride paste.
