Mere Town Council

It seems, at times, that progress is slow with the work of the Town Council but there are hurdles to overcome which can seem endless. My appreciation goes to our staff who persevere with these matters. It is our ambition that Salisbury Street car park has a couple of charging points for electric vehicles but getting the legal side of this has taken so long. I hope that we will soon have an agreement and that charging vehicles there will be commonplace. Likewise, we have been working on improving the public conveniences there. At the moment we are getting advice on the costs for a design which will provide a disabled toilet open to radar key users and two other toilets, one of which will be open at night by payment. Following public consultation, we will then arrange a loan so that we can have a modern and suitable provision in the town.

I have been pleased to hear from so many people that the resurfacing of the path from Angel Lane out to Clements Lane has made such a difference to that route. There are still a few snags to finish and we await agreement between Wiltshire Council and the electricity providers to see the light on the southern end of the route. As I mentioned previously, we have adopted the suggestion raised at the public part of a Town Council meeting to name this path, the Eric Mitchell Way. It will be a great pleasure to have an opening ceremony in honour of Eric, who had done so much for Mere in his role as Councillor for many years.

The Activities in Mere (AIM) event, that I mentioned last month, is taking shape and there is an exciting list of activities for the over 50s on the way, in this year's occasion which will be held $9^{th} - 11^{th}$ August. Some of which I feel will introduce us to new activities and some which will challenge us. I hope to try walking football for the first time and to re-acquaint myself with climbing (though not too high). I may leave the

axe-throwing to others but hope to watch them take part. Watch this space and further publicity to find some things for you!

I had the pleasure of trying out a walk devised by the Cranbourne Chase National Landscape (used to be the AONB) with 20 members of the Mere Walking Group. Although Mere is not in the CCNL they are including us in the development of local walks and a Heritage Trail. I am going to meetings to aim for greater involvement for Mere in how the CCNL develops. For those of you who want to get out and walk locally, I strongly recommend coming along with the Walking Group – details of the next walk will be in this issue.

I like to finish with a thank you, and that goes to the volunteers who came out last month to litter pick around Mere. Our town council team do a great job but these extra hands do help and are much appreciated, well done and thank you.

 <u>Get Wiltshire Walking</u> is a funded project which aims to ensure every community within the county has access to a free weekly led walk. Each walk has its regular starting venue on the same day and time each week. Routes are varied and always ensure that the slowest walkers are looked after.



The free, graded, weekly walks are led by fully qualified walk leaders, who are predominantly volunteers, and are both friendly and fun. They are a great opportunity to get fit, meet new people and get to know your local area.

Across the county many walks take place every week and offer three grades, for either Starters, Strollers or Striders. So, there's a walk for every level, you pick the one which suits you best.

- **Starter walks** are a 30 minute walk across largely flat, stable terrain at a gentle pace with frequent pauses. Suitable for those wishing to become more active or those recovering from surgery, illness or injury.
- **Stroller walks** are a 45-60 minute walk across varied terrain with some pauses.
- Strider walks are 60-90 minutes, largely continuous across varied terrain including some gradients. A walk intended to offer a more rigorous pace and workout.

Sorry, no dogs, other than sensory dogs are allowed.

We are delighted to announce that Mere will be offering **Starter walks**, beginning on **Wednesday 8th May**. Each week we will meet at the **surgery car park on Salisbury Street for a 10.00am start**.

If you would like to take part but would prefer a **Stroller** or **Strider** walk then please look at the following website for these level walks in other parts of the county.

From Times Gone By!

Inquests held by George Sylvester Esq May 10th, at Maiden Bradley, Jane Young, aged 62, who accompanied a girl to a well near her residence to draw water; the girl in lowering the bucket let slip the handle, and the deceased, in endeavouring to lay hold of the tumbler, lost her footing and fell down the well, which was reported to be ninety feet deep with ten feet of water. On being taken out, the vital spark had fled but the only bodily injury she had suffered was a wound of the scalp. Verdict — Accidentally drowned by falling into a well

Devizes and Wiltshire Gazette, 16 May 1844

John Toogood, Mere, innkeeper, was charged on the information of John Perrett, Inspector of Police, with suffering certain persons to become drunk in his house on Sunday, the 26th of March last. Several witnesses were examined, and after carefully going through the whole of the evidence, the defendant was convicted in the penalty of 50s and costs.

John Toogood and Henry Hazard, were summoned for non-payment of poor-rates. Toogood, 21. 4s. 8d.; Hazard, 3s. 1d... Ordered to pay the same, with costs.

Wiltshire Councillor ~ George Jeans Writes

I spend many hours visiting local function across the Division from Kilmington to West Knoyle. I find this is a good way to find what people want, number one being good roads and housing. At Easter I was alerted to "The Welcome to Mere" sign on the B3092, which is the Mere to Frome Road, was coming adrift, has to be holiday time, therefore I personally secured it as best I could and I must thank the Mere Town Council for quickly repairing it.

The resurfaced footpath across the Meads which I continue to support, now called Eric Mitchel Way, has been well received by the majority of people locally. It is pleasing that Wiltshire Council, Mere Town Council and Mere Footpaths Group have worked together to achieve this supper enhancement, which I was not sure if I would have seen in my life time. It has been made possible by developers' money and grants from Wiltshire Council and indeed Mere Town Council and The Mere Footpath Group.

A further reminder from last month, you now need to show photo ID to vote at polling stations in some elections, including Parliamentary elections, general elections, local elections and by-elections, Police and Crime Commissioner election – which takes place on 2 May. If you want more information on Voter ID and what to do if you don't have photo ID, please visit **Registering to vote** - Wiltshire Council.

Building Digital UK (BDUK) has entered a contract with Wessex Internet to build gigabit capable infrastructure in South Wiltshire. Wiltshire Council have welcomed

the appointment and look forward to developing our working relationship with Wessex Internet, providing operational support to enable the build. Wessex Internet anticipate connecting 14,500 premises over the next five years. BDUK and Wiltshire Council are currently in the process of analysing the deployment phases and where Wessex Internet plans to start and finish infrastructure in South Wiltshire.

Wiltshire Council is hopeful for further flexibility through the BDUK Gigabit Voucher Scheme (GBVS). This scheme can provide vouchers worth up to £4,500 for homes and businesses in the hardest to reach rural areas to support the cost of installing new gigabit-capable connections to their doorstep when part of a group. Currently the voucher scheme is paused in Wiltshire and many other parts of the UK, although this can change.

As part of its continued zero tolerance approach to tackling fly-tipping, Wiltshire Council has successfully prosecuted a Calne woman who had dumped waste on a public footpath.

A Melksham man was given a 24-month Conditional Discharge and ordered to pay £1,465 in costs for significant fly-posting across Wiltshire. I am hoping enforcement do not see some of our very worthy local community groups impacted by this, they do not fly post across Wiltshire. However, I have made you all aware.

More additional school places for pupils with special educational needs and disabilities (SEND) will be available in Wiltshire following a successful bid by Wiltshire Council to secure a new free school.

Update on the next stages of Local Plan and Gypsy and Traveller Development Plan. Wiltshire had a huge response to the Local Plan Regulation 19 consultation, which closed on 22 November 2023. Since then, Wiltshire have been working through more than 10,000 comments from many different stakeholders and all parts of the county. Wiltshire are working to identify potential sites for allocation as part of the Gypsy and Traveller Development Plan, which is taking time.

Penny Fennon gave February rainfall for Salisbury Street in March as 27.5cm with 28th March being the wettest with 7cm of rain. Pam Baldock gave rainfall for Lordsmead area as 137.25mmmm, (5.49) To help clear the highway of water, you can report blocked gullies using the **My Wilts app**.

Wiltshire Council is encouraging families to access healthy lunchtime free school meals in reception and years one and two if eligible, and to check if they remain eligible in year three and above. The initiative helps to save families more than £350 per year.

Wiltshire are still short of placements for foster children and looking for those interested. There are situations that arise unexpectedly which mean young people need emergency care and support at short notice. Foster carers under this scheme provide temporary emergency care to any child or young person needing a safe place to stay until a suitable home is found. Young people in this situation are dealing with uncertainty and may also be traumatised and will need extra support. Emergency foster carers receive £900 per week per child when they have a child to stay with

them and £500 per week when they don't have foster children to care for. The council would like to recruit more carers to help meet the demand.

Mere School Welcomes Wiltshire Air Ambulance: A Day of Lifesaving Learning

Excitement buzzed through the corridors of Mere School as the Wiltshire Air Ambulance team made a special visit, bringing with them a wealth of lifesaving knowledge. The day was one of discovery and empowerment as children eagerly



engaged in hands-on activities and insightful demonstrations, immersing themselves in the world of emergency response.

Under the expert guidance of the Wiltshire Air Ambulance team, students dove into an array of practical exercises aimed at equipping them with essential skills for handling emergencies. From mastering the basics of making a 999 call to learning crucial techniques like CPR and the use of an AED, each lesson was met with enthusiasm and determination.

Paired up and armed with mannequins, the children practised various emergency procedures, from the recovery position to aiding someone who is choking. These interactive sessions not only imparted valuable skills but also instilled a sense of confidence in the students, empowering them to respond effectively in times of crisis.

In addition to hands-on activities, the visit provided insight into the vital role of the air ambulance in serving the Wiltshire community. Students learned about the dedicated efforts of the air ambulance team and gained a deeper appreciation for their lifesaving work.

Mere & District Link Scheme


Community First, which oversees the 42 Link Schemes in Wiltshire, produce a summary of the annual audit of Link Scheme activity. The 2023 details are shown in the infographic below and we are preparing one for Mere's Link Scheme. One figure which jumped out at me was the average mileage for each Link Scheme in 2023. This was 17,700. In 2023 Mere Link Scheme drivers covered an amazing 46,121 miles. A tremendous effort from all of our drivers.

In March we did 104 trips so we are still averaging 100 trips per month this year. As ever, Salisbury District Hospital was the busiest destination with 27 trips.

New drivers are always welcome. You choose when you want to drive, use your own car and we pay 45p/mile to cover your costs. If you are interested in volunteering as a driver please call our co-ordinator on 01747 860096.

If you want to use the Link, once you have an appointment please call 01747 860096 to book a driver. As a charity we do not charge for trips but ask for a donation. **Please remember that our co-ordinators work in their own homes – we do not have an office - so please keep calls to 9-5 Monday to Friday and only use the 01747 860096 number.** Also, it is a great help if you can give us a minimum of 48 hours notice (not including Saturdays and Sundays). Our co-ordinator has to ring round to find a driver who is available to take you to your appointment and we cannot guarantee our co-ordinator will be at home to arrange last minute requests.

Wessex Water Situation: March 2024

March was largely a continuation of the very wet weather of February. An average of 125mm rain fell in March, which is 178% of the long term average (LTA). This made March 2024 the ninth wettest since records began in 1871. The last 6 months have

been the wettest 6 month period (October to March) since records began.

Both our rivers have been flowing very strongly. The upper Shreen has burst its banks in a couple of places and along Waterside it was going over the bridges as well as under. Not all bad news as the Water Voles have enjoyed the extra water and have been seen most days with new holes appearing in the banks.

The stream support pipe line for the Shreen is

progressing well and should be ready for testing in May, although at the moment it seems unnecessary but I am sure that we will need it if we have a hot dry summer.

Our summer migrant birds are arriving slowly - Chiffchaffs and Willow Warblers first, followed by Swallows, Martins and Swifts. Apparently, migration is much slower this year due to the constant north-east winds. Hopefully this will change, bringing us better weather and our skies full of screaming Swifts.
