Mere Town Council

I would like to start with a big thank you to the committee, the volunteers, the entrants and the sponsors for the splendid afternoon and evening entertainment of Mere Carnival. I hope that I sound like a broken record but it is pleasing to see how Mere benefits from the hardy groups of volunteers for so many enriching activities. If you go into The Square on a Wednesday morning, you will see a group of walkers setting off with volunteers leading and organising the walks. On Saturdays, you will see volunteers manning the Food Bank. At various times during the week, you can pop into the library and find it managed by volunteers and alongside them a museum wholly organised by volunteers. I could go on with more examples but I shall stop and ask an important question of you. Is there some way in which you, too, can enrich our town by giving a hand or sharing your knowledge? If so, then please do so.

One group of volunteers are the town councillors and last month we heard from residents about their opinions and then looked at planning applications. If there is a planning application that affects you, please come to a council meeting and talk to councillors in the public session but do make your feelings known on the Wiltshire planning website. We discussed the slow progress with our applications to Wiltshire Council Local Highways Improvement Group for traffic control changes to improve safety on Hazzards Hill and Edgebridge. On current form, I cannot see anything happening for at least a year!

We discussed what would be contained in a Town Council response to the public consultation on changes to the National Planning Policy Framework. I am indebted to a group of councillors who gave up their time to meet again with our Clerk to formulate a response. Decisions made to increase the supply of houses affects everyone in the country but we felt it important to stress how this should be done in the best way to suit small rural communities like Mere.

The Town Council will soon (November) have its annual budget meeting and I would ask you to let us know where you feel we should be allocating monies to maintain and improve Mere for the benefit of all residents. DO come along to a council meeting (the first Monday of the month at 7pm at the Duchy Manor site) and say your piece!

Wiltshire Councillor ~ George Jeans Writes

Those in Zeals and elsewhere may be interested that in times past, Zeals had a Prize Band which played in the Lake pleasure Grounds, Warminster in September 1924 taken from an extract of the Warminster Journal of that year.

The Family and Community Learning service (FaCL) at Wiltshire Council has had a record-breaking academic year with more than 1,000 enrolments taking place. The team offers a range of free single-session and short courses to help get adults back into learning and is open for eligible people to sign up now. FaCL tutors travel to teach learners in community venues around the county, as well as offering online courses for those who find travel challenging or have caring responsibilities that would make attending a face-to-face course difficult.

Listed buildings are not usually demolished. A structurally unsafe listed property in the centre of Warminster has been demolished. It had been a long-standing safety concern for the council's Building Control team due to a decline in its structural integrity and the dangerous state of its scaffolding.

At an event held in Westminster, an unprecedented cross-party coalition of over 100 council landlords, led by Southwark Council, jointly published five solutions for the government to 'secure the future of England's council housing'. They warn that England's council housing system is broken, and that urgent action is needed for the government to deliver its housing promises. The Leader of Wiltshire Council, said: *"It's essential that high quality affordable council homes are available for those who need them most, and the current system and model in place makes this challenging."*

The council's **We're Targeting Fly-tippers (WTF) campaign** continues to gather pace with the launch of dedicated fly-tipping webpages www.wiltshire.gov.uk/fly-tipping will provide people with a range of information about the WTF campaign including:

- What is classed as fly-tipping
- How to report fly-tipping and/or unlicensed waste carriers
- The witness reward scheme already used in Zeals
- Possible penalties for offenders
- Recent prosecutions
- How to access further information to comply with the laws around waste disposal.

The shortage of parking in Mere near housing is worsening in my opinion, with darker nights approaching and the only way out of some areas, is to reverse some distance, sometimes around corners in poor light conditions is challenging and possibly dangerous. I shall continue to request an improvement in parking arrangements where possible.

Following the UK's departure from the European Union, voting rights for EU citizens have changed across the country. To be registered to vote, EU citizens living in England must meet new eligibility criteria, based on their nationality and when they started living in the UK. You can find more information at

www.electoralcommission.org.uk/EU or if you have any additional questions please email electreg@wiltshire.gov.uk.

I have asked for Mere Library to be given information for the public to examine regarding planning consultations. It is given to many other libraries in Wiltshire and the head of planning has refused, saying we can go to Warminster etc or we can get Library staff to help use the PCs, this is not the answer for some of Mere's population. Mere Town Councillor Debie Beale has kindly agreed to print and take one consultation to the Mere Library, for which I thank her.

I have the following items if you have Community use for them, for short term free loan If you have any use at any local community function for a small free standing amp and microphone, or a buzz wire and stand that the user tries to get wand around without making a buzz, I have both for free borrowing, insurance not included.

Penny Fennon gave August rainfall for Salisbury Street as 10cm with the 24th August being the wettest with 4.5cm of rain. Pam Baldock gave August rainfall for Lordsmead as 35mm (1.4 inches). Wettest day Aug 22^{nd} and 23^{rd} , 11mm both days.

Seven foster families came together in Calne on Sunday (14 July) to celebrate the launch of the first Mockingbird family constellation in Wiltshire. Mockingbird is a pioneering programme led by The Fostering Network. The model is based around the support and relationships that an extended family provides, nurturing relationships between children, young people and foster families and supporting them to build a resilient and caring community. Wiltshire Council has worked with The Fostering Network to set up the first network. To form a constellation, foster carers join a network with other foster carers, each of which are described as satellite foster homes. At the centre of each constellation is a 'hub' home, with a paid, experienced foster carer able to provide resources and support for the satellite carers. Wiltshire Council is recruiting foster carers now, with a range of flexible roles on offer including full time, short break or emergency care. Stricter penalties to deter fly-posting

We have raised the amount of the Fixed Penalty Notice (FPN) people will have to pay if they are caught illegally advertising in Wiltshire.

Fly-posting or illegal advertising is defined as the display of advertising material on buildings or street furniture without the consent of the owner or occupier of the land for premises.

The penalty fine has increased to £500 from the previous amount of £75 and has been implemented following feedback from local communities reporting more incidents of fly-posting.

As I understand it Clubs/Groups etc should all take heed!! Fly posting on Telegraph Poles is definitely a no no as well.

Mere Rivers Group

Those of you who have walked the Ashfield and Shreen will have noticed that we have a good flow for this time of the year. This is due to Stream Support by Wessex Water who are pumping in sufficient water from deep bore holes at Burton to maintain good flows.

This summer we have had lots of visitors walking the upper Shreen which is not looking at its best. Those of you that are of a certain age will remember how the stream used to look and it was one of the most beautiful parts of our town. Thanks to all the Riparian owners who maintain the river banks not only on their side but the side which is not their responsibility.

August was a return to drier conditions following a wet July. An average of 44mm fell across Wessex equating to 67% of the long-term average (LTA). Despite the lower rainfall in August, the past 12-month period (starting in September 2023) has been the second wettest since records began in 1871. Soil moisture deficit (SMD) continued to increase for most of August until the last week of the month when it began to decrease in response to a period of rainfall. The flows in the south of Wessex were largely normal to above normal. Groundwater sites at the end of August were largely between normal and above normal. Throughout August, reservoir levels continued to decrease with Wessex Water ending the month at 63% capacity and Bristol Water ending August at 61% capacity.

The Link cannot function without good co-ordinators and we are delighted that Jean Booth has stepped into the breach so we still have a full team of five co-ordinators.

We remained busy in August with 101 trips which is just below our average so far this year of 106 trips per month. As ever, Salisbury District Hospital was the busiest destination with 32 trips.

A plea for some help where possible please. We have begun to see an increase in people requesting trips to e.g. the dentist or optician some distance away e.g. in Salisbury. As we are so busy and a number of our drivers only do local trips, it can be difficult to find a driver for such trips where these services are available nearer home. If you have a choice of location please select the one nearest to Mere.

Do you want to volunteer as a Link driver? New drivers are always welcome. You choose when you want to drive, use your own car and we pay 45p/mile to cover your costs.

If you want to use the Link, please call 01747 860096 to book a driver once you have an appointment. As a charity we do not charge for trips but ask for a donation. Please remember that our co-ordinators work in their own homes – we do not have an office - so please keep calls to 9-5 Monday to Friday and only use the 01747 860096 number.

Wiltshire Bobby Van's sustainable fundraiser set to break £10,000 barrier

The two-day Bag A Bargain event at Deverill Storage, Longbridge Deverill, on September 4 and 5 raised more than $\pm 9,800$ – with more revenue expected from the sale of unsold clothes via The Frock Shop in Warminster.

The funds will support the work of the charity, which needs to raise more than £300,000 a year to maintain its work keeping the elderly and vulnerable safe. It operates two vans, staffed by former police officers, who visit victims of crime, or those who are deemed to be at risk, to fit home security measures free of charge. It also has a team of Stay Safe Online volunteers who make home visits to give advice about online fraud.

Trust Director Jennie Shaw said she is delighted by the sale revenue, which is around £1,000 up on last year. "I'd like to say a huge thank you to Emily Tulloch who, along with a team of brilliant volunteers, organised the sale,"

From Times Gone By!

The return-match of cricket between the Mere and Knoyle parties was played on Monday last, on the down between Knoyle and Hindon, when the majority in favour of the Knoyle party amounted upwards of seventy runs. The day having been proposed by the Knoyle party only on the previous Friday, the party from Mere were unable to get their men together, on account of their having engagements at a neighbouring fair, and appointments which the brevity of the notice would not allow them to waive.

A Mere correspondent requests us to state that his townsmen attribute their defeat in the recent match cricket to the circumstance of their opponents, the Knoyle party, having, unknown to them, availed themselves of the services of crack Hampshire player. He adds that it is intended to refer the matter to some high cricketing authority, with the view of ascertaining whether the Knoyle eleven have not thus forfeited the game.



A Bed of Roses

While out shopping I had an unexpected meeting with a friend who knew my late husband and his family before I did. This resulted in a half hour coffee and chat about all that had happened since I left. This included the young woman who got divorced from a problem marriage after2 years brought up her daughter and after 20years married again, only to lose her 2nd husband to cancer 6 years later. I remarked 'I was lucky to have had nearly 21years' to which she retorted 'You would hardly have called yours a bed of roses.....' I thought about it- not my marriage, - a bed of roses. What comes to mind when we hear that phrase? An area of glossy green foliage topped with many different shaped and coloured flowers giving off a lovely perfume on a warm summer evening? When the weather improves next year, weed around the plants without damaging the roots that could send up suckers; watch for greenfly and black spot on the leaves treat if necessary, then feed and hope for good weather.

Perhaps my marriage was a bed of roses. Isn't life like that too, with God the caring attentive gardener ever ready to meet our needs?
