Mere Town Council

At the January town council meeting it was good to have members of the public there to tell us of their concerns. Whether we will be able to respond in the way that they want remains to be seen but it is so important to hear their opinions and for them to hear how we deal with matters. In the same way, we as a council can go to air our views at Wiltshire Council meetings, mostly through our county councillor who also acts as a town councillor. I feel for George who has to work sometimes on both sides of an issue, indeed sometimes more sides as he also represents Kilmington, Zeals and more.

It is my ambition to try and persuade you, the reader of this, to think if you can join in with others and help to manage the needs of Mere residents and enterprises. We are fortunate to have an excellent team of staff both in the office and outdoors who make things happen. But - the fifteen town councillors are there to represent the needs and desires of residents in the town. Can you see yourself taking on an important but unpaid role? Do you have clear and workable ideas on how Mere can progress and how it can be a better place for all who live here? Are you the sort of person who can go out and gather opinions? Can you put your own personal viewpoint to one side and support the consensus view after a vote has been taken? And - most importantly, do you care about how this town provides the best it can for residents young and old and. also, how it supports the enterprises that provide goods, services and employment opportunities locally? I often hear, usually while walking about town, about what should be done for this or that issue (and, good grief, why hasn't something been done!!). I sometimes read, in letters or on social media the same sorts of thing. Well, to those people who bend my ear in the street or grace the screen of my computer with their typed comments - the opportunity to put some effort behind your words is coming in the next few months. Wiltshire Council will be putting up the notice of election on the 11th March and Nominations can be made from the 12th March until the 2nd April. I look forward to seeing some new names on the voting list and, who knows, may have to concede to those who attract more electors than me.

Realizing some of the bigger tasks, like removing the old flagpole, does involve help from volunteers and we are grateful to Dave Hill, Simon Nutt, Barry Hansford and Tony Shepheard who helped our grounds staff and also to Danny Weeks who helps with the Xmas Lights. Thank you to them. We have taken advice on keeping our flag in good

order which means taking it down when very strong winds are forecast – this was very difficult with the old flagpole but is now manageable with the new.

I would also like to thank our grounds staff Simon & Paul for their help with gritting our roads, pavements and footpaths during the icy weather we experienced recently – their efforts were much appreciated. Wiltshire Council no longer salt the minor roads but they do supply the Town Council with a small supply of salt which we can use on priority areas. Wiltshire Council should fill the numerous yellow municipal grit bins around the town with rock salt so that residents can use this in icy areas and we are aware that there are some community-bought grit bins which should be filled up too.

I hope this finds you well and looking forward to 2025. I hope you found and enjoyed the many bright and beautiful decorations over the Christmas period. I and my family certainly did, many thanks to all who were able to contribute. Wiltshire Councillor ~ George Jeans Writes

I was pleased to receive a New Year diary at Christmas which had a atlas showing Andover, Mere and Exeter along the A303 and no other settlements along that stretch. Mere was and is a stop off point, however I was pleased to see it is highlighted.

Wiltshire are at present preparing the budget for the coming year. The government have stopped the rural grant. Wiltshire was not fully covered against employers' National Insurance contributions especially for contractors etc. It was stated Wiltshire are £8m short of total grants from central government including the increase in national insurance contributions. £15m in savings are being sought. Government had previously confirmed that councils can continue to increase council tax in 2025/26 by 3% and a further 2% solely to support adult care services, making 5% in total. The Community Charge for Wiltshire Council is being proposed to increase by 4.5% which is approximately 0.5% less than could have been.

In the local government finance settlement for 2025/26 announced on 18 December, Wiltshire Council has seen an increase of 4.3% in its Core Spending Power, which is the amount the government assesses the council needs in funding. This is lower than the average increase seen across large rural unitary and county councils, which is 5.6%. These increases assume that council tax rises by 4.99%.

The Police and Crime Commissioner has stated last week that he feels he could be left with no choice but to ask for the maximum precept increase which will see a Band D property pay an additional £1.16 a month (£14 per year), due to the government settlement leaving funding gap of £11M with no precept increase, and a gap of £6.8M with the maximum precept increase of 5.2%

The Leaders of Dorset, Somerset and Wiltshire Councils are optimistic that they can work with Government to progress proposals for the Heart of Wessex Mayoral Strategic Authority following the publication of the Devolution White Paper. Government has made it clear that if strategic authorities are going to maximise the funding opportunities available, devolution deals will require a mayor and ministers will be able to impose mayors and geographies on local councils. This may offer the opportunity for increased funding and investment to our council regions.

If the devolution proposal is approved, Dorset, Somerset and Wiltshire councils will continue to exist and are expected to have the same responsibilities as they do now. The offer to BCP Council and Swindon Borough Council to join the Heart of Wessex partnership remains open. The Heart of Wessex, if formed, will have a population of approximately 1.5 million. Following an extraordinary full council meeting on 16 January, BCP Council (Bournemouth and Poole) has submitted a letter to the Government to confirm they wish to be considered as part of the Devolution Priority Programme, joining Dorset, Somerset and Wiltshire Council and would see Wessex encompass a population of approximately 1.9 million. Swindon Borough Council met on Thursday 16 January and agreed a motion which saw them commit to cross-party working with all 57 elected members and neighbouring councils, to ensure the best possible long-term resolution to devolution. Currently, they are not requesting to be part of the Devolution Priority Programme and are yet to decide if they wish to join the Wessex partnership.

Support has been given for Wiltshire to provide a letter of support to Visit England, as part of an application to establish a Local Visitor Economy Partnership (LVEP) for Wiltshire. Wiltshire's visitor economy generates significant revenues for the county, creating jobs. Being part of the LVEP programme will give Wiltshire access to Visit England support including expertise, data, knowledge, and experience sharing, access to future grant funding and opportunities to influence national visitor economy strategy. If successful the resultant LVEP would be overseen by a private-public sector Board.

Progress has been made to plant at least 20 community orchards throughout Wiltshire as part of a government tree initiative to celebrate last year's Coronation of King Charles III. Wiltshire Council was awarded a £50,000 grant from government and invited applications from those interested in taking part. As a result, the council distributed the fund among eligible projects. Orchards are already being planted and others will soon follow.

Wiltshire Council is keen to work with parents and carers to support children and young people who are struggling to attend school and is offering support and advice to help them get back into a routine. If a child is struggling, parents and carers can

speak to the school so that they are aware of what is happening. They may be able to offer additional support or adjustments. Contact Wiltshire Education Welfare and ask to speak to one of their advisors for guidance and support.

Wiltshire Council has invested in a 100% electric Refuse Collection Vehicle (eRCV) which will be trialled around the county by its waste collection contractor Hills in support of its objectives to reduce carbon emissions and modernise its fleet to include low carbon vehicles.

The Wiltshire Marque, a new county-wide food accreditation scheme has launched. The program that supports local businesses in Wiltshire. The program aims to increase the visibility of Wiltshire-made food and drink, and to help local businesses grow. Mere Town Council are informing local businesses.

On 12 December 2024 the Government issued an update to the National Planning Policy for Local Planning Authorities who are now required to demonstrate a deliverable supply of housing sufficient to meet five years against their housing requirement set out in adopted strategic policies Previously Wiltshire was only required to demonstrate a four-year housing land supply because its draft Local Plan had reached an advanced stage. Now assessed against the housing land supply which can be delivered within five years, the recalculation shows a significant reduction in the number of years supply. The council cannot demonstrate the requisite five-year housing land supply and can demonstrate a 2.03 years supply. As the housing requirement in the emerging Local Plan will meet less than 80% of the revised Local Housing Need, the council will be expected to begin work on a new Local Plan promptly, under the revised plan-making system provided for under the Levelling Up and Regeneration Act 2023 (when the relevant provisions are brought into force in 2025), in order to address the shortfall in housing need. The changes introduced on 12 December 2024 mean that the council now has a substantial shortfall in its housing land supply position (2.03 years). This alters the weight to give to housing supply when giving consideration to planning applications for residential development.

A series of recent trading standards raids have resulted in the confiscation of a significant amount of counterfeit and unsafe goods. Illegal cigarettes, hand rolled tobacco and vape products were seized by officers who were responding to complaints to Trading Standards about the sale of illicit tobacco at these premises.

Wiltshire Council has agreed additional investment in speech and language services, addressing the growing demand for support in educational settings. The service assists children and young people with speech, language and communication needs providing direct therapy in schools and early years settings while supporting educators with training and resources. At a cabinet meeting it was agreed to invest a total of £2,280,000 over the lifetime of the contract period of two years, plus one to meet the growing need when the current contract expires in March 2025.

Wiltshire Council's Cabinet has confirmed a strategy that outlines its library service's vision, purpose and key areas of focus for the next five years. A high proportion of older people use library services and therefore demand is predicted to increase in the

coming years and therefore the library service is ensuring it can support the council's prevention agenda and help reduce demand for council health and wellbeing services where it can. It was a successful and productive year for the library services throughout 2023/24, which included 1.8 million items loaned, 1.27 million visits to its 30 libraries and mobile libraries, almost 30,000 children attending rhyme time sessions and more than 6,700 events attended by almost 129,000 people.

Ever-evolving technology also results in many of us throwing away unwanted electrical items as we receive new electrical items as gifts. Recycling these old or unwanted electricals is easier than you think! Some electrical items smaller than a 'shoe box' can be recycled using the small electricals collection service. You can simply leave these items beside their blue-lidded bin or recycling sack in a supermarket carrier bag. Large electrical items should still be recycled at household recycling centres. The council won the Environmental Campaign of the Year Award at the 2024 awards, this is the second consecutive year that the council's efforts to reduce flytipping in Wiltshire have been recognised.

Wiltshire Council is sharing first-hand experiences of sleeping rough and the difference support can make to encourage more people to contact Streetlink if they see someone on the streets. Streetlink will get in contact with the council's Rough Sleepers Team, which can then go out and support.

In the last 12 months the team has supported more than 275 people sleeping rough in Wiltshire. Through additional government funding, the council has added an additional 15 bed spaces and through the Building Bridges Programme a number of individuals have been supported to return to employment, voluntary work and college courses. Three long-term rough sleepers who in total had slept rough for a total of 54 years were moved into accommodation.

The future changes to the current collecting recycling arrangements are necessary as the council, and all local authorities, need to comply with new statutory requirements under the Environment Act 2021, which confirms that councils must offer households a regular collection of the following recyclable items: Glass, Metal, Plastic (including flexible plastics from 2027), Paper and card, Food waste (from 2027), Garden waste (charges for collection may be applied). Aside from food waste and flexible plastics, Wiltshire Council already collects all of those materials. It has been agreed with Defra to begin collecting food waste from August 2027 and flexible plastics must be collected from households by April 2027. Based on the evidence assessed, the council's waste service has recommended to Cabinet that Wiltshire Council adopt 'Three Stream' recycling collections during the next contract period. This means from 2027 it is anticipated that residents would be asked to present recycling in one wheeled bin or weighted reuseable sack for paper and cardboard, a second wheeled bin or weighted reusable sack for mixed plastics, cans, cartons, and bagged flexible plastics, and a box for glass. Currently, most Wiltshire residents already use a bluelidded wheeled bin for mixed recycling and have a box for the collection of glass.

The Division I represent covers Zeals, Stourton and Gasper and those residents read local publications and will be interested to know Lisa Gilby is the new Parish Clark for Zeals PC and Stourton with Gasper PC.

A planning appeal for changes at Boyes Transport Yard, B3092, Zeals, BA12 6LJ - was Dismissed.

Wiltshire Council has shared an update on funding for Special Educational Needs and plans to provide a sustainable future. At a cabinet meeting on the 21st January, the latest progress on the Safety Valve programme was discussed. This is a multi-million-pound agreement with the Department for Education (DfE) to support SEND in Wiltshire. Originally the plan was for five years but the council is asking DfE to extend to seven years to help meet targets. The agreement means providing an additional 500 special school places to ensure children stay closer to home in Wiltshire, as well as investment in more resource bases which provide SEND support in mainstream schools. It is also funding teams to provide early support for children and young people with SEND, and their families.

Penny Fennon gave December rainfall for Salisbury Street as 17.5cm with the wettest day being on the 5th with 6cm. 2024 total 237cm with February and September the wettest with 8cm. The 2023 rainfall was 250.5cm.

Pam Baldock reports Lordsmead driest December for 5 years. Only 13 days could measure rainfall. The wettest day being Wednesday 4th December with 22mm. Total for the month 53mm.

The New Year began with the Churches Together Week of Prayer for Christian Unity service which was held at Mere URC on Sunday 19th January and the Catholic community was well represented and did two readings. The Liturgy was prepared by the ecumenical monastery at Bose in Northern Italy and to celebrate 1,700 years since the Council of Nicaea in 325, so it was a bit special! The Holy Father, Pope Francis has proclaimed that 2025 will be a year of Jubilee, something that happens every 25 years. The theme is "Pilgrims of Hope" and it will be a year of hope for a world suffering the impacts of war, the ongoing effects of COVID-19 pandemic, and a climate crisis. 

Mere School

It is lovely to share good news about our school with Mere!

During the Christmas break there was some excellent press coverage about our KS2 SATs outcomes.

Government figures were released revealing the best-performing primary schools in the county based on the number of year 6 children who reached the expected standard across reading, writing and maths when assessed at the end of the 2023-24 academic year.

The latest performance figures show 61% of children across England reached the expected standard across those subject areas. In Wiltshire this was only 57%.

The national figure is a small increase on the 60% who reached the expected level in the 2022-23 academic year. However, both represent a decrease on attainment pre COVID when 65% of the 2018-19 cohort attained the expected level of reading, writing and maths.

Girls continue to outperform boys at the expected standards in all subjects except maths, where boys outperformed girls by 1 percentage point.

Mere School's outcomes were excellent with us being in the top 5 Wiltshire schools with 91% of our children meeting the required standard in maths, reading and writing.

As well as incredible outcomes we had a very exciting festive period in school. The

Friends funded a trip to Salisbury Playhouse for us all to watch Sleeping Beauty and organised a grotto and visit from Father Christmas. Christmas Lunch was delicious – thank you Mrs Gulliver. Families and friends enjoyed our two Christmas performances and our Carol Service in St Michael's Church.

Why is your group called a "Jelly". This is a question which is always asked!

From Times Gone By!

We had a very heavy fall of snow on Friday night last, and so great was the drift in the neighbourhood of Hindon and Mere that eight coaches travelling that road were blocked up together at the former place, until a passage could be cut through the snow for a mile and a half. The passengers by one of these coaches suffered much from the cold, remaining so long unassisted. On Marlborough Down the snow drifted in some places, on Saturday morning, to the height of 12 or 14 feet; the road was altogether undistinguishable, and nearly impassable; but through the persevering efforts the driver and guard of the Bath mail, that coach arrived within half hour of its regular time. The True Blue Coach, unable to make its way, had been abandoned.

Both the Ashfield and Shreen flowed well and coped with the flood waters, although parts of the bank in the upper Shreen washed away and caused a wall to fall.

It will be interesting to see the effect of a continuous stream flow when both streams in the past have had periods of dry due to over abstraction.

Still a lot of fish, Bullheads and Sticklebacks, both the Egret and Kingfisher have had plenty of food.

December marked a shift away from the wetter weather of the previous three months with an average of 54mm of rainfall across Wessex, 58% of the long-term average (LTA). Despite the drier end to the year, 2024 was the fifth wettest year on record since 1871. Soil moisture deficit (SMD) remained close to zero during December. In river catchments on the Chalk most monthly mean flows recorded were notably high except on the Dorset Stour which recorded normal mean flows. Monthly mean flows recorded across all catchments not on the Chalk aquifer were normal. Groundwater sites monitoring to the north of Wessex reported notably high and exceptionally high levels at the end of December while those further south including sites monitoring the Chalk reported either normal or above normal levels. Reservoirs ended December at around 99% capacity and 94% capacity for Wessex Water and Bristol Water respectively. For Wessex Water this was similar to levels this time the previous year. Bristol Water levels were slightly lower than they were in December 2023.

Let's hope for a normal spring, (whatever that is)!


