Wiltshire Councillor ~ George Jeans Writes

At present Wiltshire Council have to organize the largest number of local elections in the county when compared to nationwide. At present local perspective or current Parish and Town Councillors in this area have to print out a nomination pack and for this area they have to hand deliver the pack to Salisbury by appointment as the preferred way, or sit and wait hoping for a slot. If the nomination should get seriously rejected, another trip is required, reinforcing from last month's news note new postal vote applications deadline is 5pm on the **14th of April**. 11th April deadline to register to vote.

Wiltshire Council budget for 2025/26 has been approved. The confirmed budget for 2025/26 is around £527m, compared to last year's £490m. There will be a net £37m increase in spending on services.

Dog fouling, I am getting increasing numbers of complaints about, by highlighting it here, hopefully it will send out a message again to reduce the problem, however any improvements always seem to be forgotten in a short time.

After Salisbury Street Mere has been resurfaced, I was hoping the yellow lines would be painted back as the traffic regulation order (TRO), as it has been annoying for some receiving parking ticket and to have to get them void, as in places the yellow lines are not enforceable. I have been informed the lines will get removed where they should not be, hoping this happens. I was informed "The lines have been placed there after the road was resurfaced and they should not have been. I have raised this with the person overseeing the resurfacing work and asked that they be removed as a matter of urgency." There is not a prescribed maximum length of the zig zags as they are not required to be on a TRO. If they have been extended, I am not sure this will be altered, I have asked for it to be looked at as if they are longer, it impacts on parking. With the extra £20 million plus becoming available for highways I am sure the Town Council will be pushing for our share of it, as Mere and the surrounding villages which include West Knoyle need improvement. To repeat from last month, an officer said we do not have the money for good maintenance, therefore we have potholes and have to repair them. Wiltshire has put £22 million towards highway repairs, which is extra this year to the Government's contribution of £20.7 million. Potholes are a problem nationwide.

Kilmington Common and others will see a reduced speed limit, which will be implemented by Traffic Orders 24th March 2025. The relevant orders for reference are, TRO 3590 - The County of Wiltshire (Various Roads, Kilmington and Stourton with Gasper) (30mph Speed Limit) Order 2025. TRO 3591 - The County of Wiltshire (Various Roads, Kilmington and Stourton with Gasper) (40mph Speed Limit) Order

2025. Stourton have been promised (or next to a promise) to have the 30MPH limit extended across its parish from Kilmington Common to the B3092 at a later date.

I attended Police Headquarters in Devizes with a fellow councillor, where we discussed speed enforcement on some roads in South West Wiltshire. I also was informed regarding Operation SNAP. Operation (Op) Snap allows members of the public to submit any type of footage directly to the Police Force where an offence occurs. Operation SNAP is a response to increasing submissions of video and photographic evidence relating to driving offences that members of the public have witnessed. Until now, these reports have been submitted to the police in all sorts of ways and so a streamlined process has now been developed to deal with them. This will hopefully make it easier for all involved. You can upload your footage to the Police.

Wiltshire Councillors did not debate the Gypsies and Traveler's Development Plan Document at the Full Council meeting on Tuesday 25 February, which had been on the agenda, as the item was deferred to a future date. The Cabinet Member for Strategic Planning, said: "This is a difficult decision, but we felt it was right to defer the decision about whether the Gypsies and Traveler's Development Plan Document is ready to be submitted for examination. We feel we need more time to further consider the plan and the points raised by our local communities. This is an important document for Wiltshire, so it is vital that we get it right and that sufficient time be given to scrutinise and consider local residents' concerns."

At the same Full Concill Meeting the local transport plan (LTP4) was discussed. The plan which is a statutory requirement, was agreed, however some councillors wanted more detail in the plan. At the request of a local resident I have informed a officer besides public transport, cycle and vehicle use, horse use should be considered, that is all forms of transport. It was stated most accidents in Wiltshire occur on rural roads.

I attended a disability event at St Thomas's in Salisbury organized by Karen Linaker from the local area boards. It was well worth attending, examples of stalls were Adapted Cycling for all ages and abilities. Program commences summer 2025 at Salisbury Athletics track from 3pm to 4-30pm. Another stall was All Together, if you are a parent or carer or young person needing support and advice, for more information contact 08009704669. The same afternoon I attended a Wiltshire Council statutory function, at which I learnt that to provide a taxi for a person continuously is a large expense to the council, with sums sometimes approaching £100K over a period of time.

For information the Wiltshire Council has just launched a Traffic Surveys page on its website. The page can be accessed here - https://www.wiltshire.gov.uk/traffic-surveys . If you require a survey you need ask through your Parish or Town Council.

The Snooker club benefitted from AIM (Activities in Mere), which has now made the club viable. At its AGM it was stated both rooms are now used, membership has increased from 15 to 28 which includes 4 ladies.

There are currently around 590 staff car parking spaces available at County Hall. Following the decision to build the new Trowbridge Leisure Centre on the County Hall East Wing site, there will be a reduction in staff parking spaces of around 270 spaces. This change will take effect in the spring.

Wiltshire Council seeks more Shared Lives carers to provide a welcome home. Shared Lives and Shared Days Carers work from home, providing support and care for people while they live with them in their own home as part of the family. Placements can be either long term or for a shorter period of time. Alternatively, Shared Days Carers support someone for a few hours during the day. Shared Lives supports a wide range of individuals with varying abilities and support needs. Some are fairly independent and only need guidance, reminders or explanation, others need assistance with most day-to day needs. "Carers get lots of ongoing training and support. Support is available 24/7 and the training is very flexible, it's a mixture of face to face and online so you can do it when you've got time."

Every month I publicise the fact Wiltshire Council is recruiting foster carers, (children are waiting) with a range of flexible roles on offer including full time, short break or emergency care. Grove Building Audio Visual System

An outline specification for a complete replacement system with surround sound and a permanent remotely controlled projector was circulated to several suppliers and three quotations received. It was to be easily operated by non-specialists, accommodate hearing aid users, and have a life of at least ten years. A cost of around £13,000 was indicated. We are most grateful to Wiltshire Council, through the South West Wiltshire Area Board for a grant of £5,000, and Mere Town Council for a further £500. This funding encouraged other users of Grove Building to come forward with varying amounts, which with some £3,000 from Grove Building funds, accumulated over previous years, was sufficient to go ahead.

The system was installed in November last year by Audio Visual Direct and has been used to the benefit of Mere residents several days a week since. It has also stimulated the setting up of CineClub Mere which has brought film shows back to Mere.

The other funding contributors were Mere Historical Society, Mere Gardening Club, Friends of Mere Museum, Merely Women, Mere Art Group, CineClub Mere, and Grove Building.

Personally, and on behalf of Grove Building, thank you to everyone for this massive show of support for an asset which will benefit the community for many years to come.



We welcomed Andrew, from the Wiltshire & Bath Air Ambulance team, to Mere School and all of our children received emergency life-saving skills training. They had a lot of fun but also learned some important life-saving skills.

From Times Gone By!

The Beech Clump Memorial Mystery

Many readers will know of the memorial on Beech Clump/Knoll, a wooded prominence on the track heading west from White Sheet Hill. It commemorates the airmen who died when their Dakota crashed shortly after taking off from RAF Zeals. (Even more tragically, the accident happened just three months before VE Day.)

On board were twenty-one men – mostly RAF personnel who had been attending a glider training course. Beneath the list of names on the memorial we are told that the pilot, F/Lt M.R.S. Mackay, survived but 'sustained severe injuries and subsequently died'. However, I have discovered that this is almost certainly not true.

The Accident Investigation Board blamed the pilot - but I was intrigued to read on the website where the report can be found says that Mackay (who had been awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross for operations in Arnhem) did not die of his injuries, but went

on to serve in the RAF in various posts for several more years. He eventually committed suicide, though whether this had anything to do with the crash isn't known.

Obviously, both versions of the story can't be true – and the answer may lie in an article by a modern researcher who received information from Mackay's descendants.

One clue is that Mackay was apparently thrown clear of the wreckage, indicating that he was not in the pilot's seat when the Dakota came down. (Bear in mind that there were other pilots on board.)

The key revelation is that Mackay told a family member that he wasn't flying the plane. Sensing that something wasn't right (probably the Dakota's extremely low height) he was making his way forward to investigate when the accident happened.



The Accident Report doesn't actually name Mackay, referring only to 'the pilot'. It's conceivable that, knowing the disaster would be put down to pilot error, he put the story about that he wasn't at the controls at an early point in order to save his career. However, it is my belief that there is a far more honourable and likely explanation – the story he told his family was true, but F L/t Mackay shouldered the blame in order to protect the posthumous reputation of a colleague who actually was responsible for the terrible loss of life on Beech Clump.

Letter from the Churches: Easter Song

More than 1700 years ago Saint Augustine of Hippo said of the Church, "We are an Easter people, and alleluia is our song." This is a phrase that has become so ingrained in me ever since Pope Saint John Paul *II* quoted it: "Do not abandon yourselves to despair. We are the Easter people and 'Hallelujah' is our song!".

The phrase has such a celebratory feeling, capturing something of what Christians experience on Easter Day (20th April this year). Christ is risen, our life is changed forever and a natural response is to rejoice and praise God for this gift – new life undreamt of.

Yet what happens in the weeks as Easter passes? A friend rings to tell you of a close family bereavement, your child has to go into hospital, you hear that a neighbour has been burgled. What does Resurrection mean in daily life; the mixed bag of our existence with its crises, its joys and its sorrows?

This has been true from the earliest days of the Church: the apostle Thomas doubting, the Church being persecuted and having to go into hiding, the martyrdom of early Christians for their faith, disputes between Christians about the way forward, about doctrine and behavior.

One of the most important aspects of Christianity is that it has a strong focus on hope; not a sort of blind optimism or the empty smile designed to smooth over even the most difficult situation. Rather it is something that might only be a tiny grain, a seed; with God, however, it is a distinct promise to us from an eternal future. The light of Resurrection shines in the world, however dimly it might be in some places. Our sense that God's love for creation goes to unfathomable depths makes it possible that human love can propagate like ripples across a pool.

Challenging, and emotionally draining life may be but where there is Resurrection hope there is also new life. And there are many signs of hope in our world; our hope this year for a new future for the people of the Middle east, Ukraine and Russia; our hope for fairer trade at home and abroad; our hope that fear will become a thing of the past. We may feel insignificant in the face of such need, but the message of Resurrection is that we are not. We can be bearers of hope, lighting beacons that will shine in the world's darkness. In the reality of our world, Christ has died for us and has been raised for us: "We are an Easter people, and alleluia is our song."



Merekits - Women's Institute


